The reprint relates experiences which would seem to be extremely difficult for children to overcome. However, the environment provided by the OSE homes helped many of them to become well adjusted citizens who have sincere compassion and empathy for their fellowman.

Special commendation goes to Mrs. Carrie Sonstegard and Valerie Sonstegard who put up the display, arranged the exhibit materials, and answered questions of convention participants - especially Sunday afternoon. Those who volunteered to help at the booth were Mrs. Dorothy Stormer, Bill McKelvie (the Ohio McKelvie), Bill McKelvey (the St. Louis McKelvey), Debbie Pew, Becky and Jim McDonough, Ike Owen, Mrs. Oscar Mink, Bob Tures, and Genevieve Painter. We could not have operated without their help.

Mrs. Evelyn Wachman deserves special recognition for packaging the materials and books at the Alfred Adler Institute in Chicago and shipping them to New Orleans. The packages were waiting for us when we got there. Also, Mrs. Sue Blons forwarded mimeographed handouts from the Minneapolis group. What wonderful management!

We are grateful to the New York group for forwarding the Bulletins of Information of both the Alfred Adler Institute and the Alfred Adler Mental Hygiene Clinic. Heinz Ansbacher provided reprints of The Journal of Individual Psychology, Vol. 25, No. 2 a

monograph - "Individual Psychology in the School."

The audio-visual material for the exhibit consisted of two sets of colored slides prepared by Park Johnson and accompanied by a narration prepared by Robert Nelsen. Lee Martin did the narrating. All are graduate students at West Virginia University. Their contributions to the exhibit was invaluable; it was the continuous showing of the slides that attracted people to the exhibit.

By utilizing a psychological theory emphasizing an action approach to counseling, we are able to look at the purposes and goals of misbehavior and thereby formulate a reorientation program that can be implemented by students, teachers, and parents. Much emphasis is placed on working with groups, including groups of students, teachers and parents; and in the consulting role of the counselor with teachers.

This institute takes the position that training counselors is not enough; a systematic program of dissemination, and training in a practical setting is needed. These objectives will be achieved through culminating the counselor's training with a team training experience for the first 5 weeks of the 1971 summer session. The team will be composed of pupil personnel workers, principal or other administrator, and the counselor in an integrated learning experience during the second summer and in inservice programs in the sponsoring schools during the year.

### Schedule:

July 16 - August 15, 1970 August 26- May 16, 1970-71 June 14 - July 15, 1971 (Pending Funding)

Enrollees live on campus for 5-week summer term (second five weeks) and a 32-week academic experience. The supporting team members will be on campus for five weeks during the first five-week term, summer of 1971. The latter provides six hours credit: Behavior Problems in the School (3 hrs.); Seminar in a Pupil Personnel Approach (3 hrs.); The institute program is a <u>full day</u> experience not necessarily following typical class hours but encompassing lab experiences, seminars, and regular classes within the weekly schedule of the five days. Counselor trainees will complete requirements for the master's degree. The usual allowable stipends of \$75 per week plus \$15 per week for each supporting member. Enrollees must purchase required textbooks; however, no fees will be required to devote additional time to weekend practicum or marathon experiences. These experiences may infringe upon commitments to family, commuting arrangements, etc.

### Eligibility:

(1) Applicants shall be non-trained counselors entering the field, but having completed an introductory course in Counseling and Guidance and 3 hours of graduate psychology.\* Special consideration will be made for school districts strongly committed to program development with minimally trained counselors who may have more than six hours of work in counseling and guidance.

\*Prerequisites can be made up during the first five weeks of summer school at the enrollee's expense.

- (2) Counselors must meet the general requirements for admission to the WVU ... Graduate School, including an overall grade point average of 2.5 plus an GRE verbaliscore of 400 and AGC 3 and a second account of the country of the co
- (3) Counselors must submit evidence of a valid agreement of employment with the sponsoring school for the school year 1971-72 and guarantee the fulfillment of that agreement.
- (4) Counselors must also hold an elementary school teaching certificate.
- (5) Priority will be given to participant's from sponsoring schools agreeing to develop an elementary school counseling and guidance program using this team in 1971-72. The team consists of pupil personnel workers, and administrator and a counselor.
