NEWS

REPORTS FROM DELAWARE. James Wiggins, State Director of Guidance and Counseling for the State of Delaware visited the Family Education Center of Wilmington recently. He was impressed by the skill and competence of the para-professional counselors who have been educated under the training program provided by the Associates for Study and Action. He urged that the para-professional counselors initiate similar programs in Delaware and that steps be taken immediately to set up satellite centers throughout the state.

DR. MANFORD SONSTEGARD presented a day-long program of demonstrations of family counseling, small group counseling, and a simulated Family Education Center at Seaford, Delaware. Mr. Wheatley, Director of Guidance and Counseling for the school system plans a program with the

holistic approach. The plan is to involve the entire community through the establishment of parent study groups, Family Education Centers, in-service training for teachers, etc.

MISS GOLDMAN TO PARTICIPATE IN IOWA WELFARE MEETING. Miss Margaret E. Goldman will participate in the two-day program for the Annual Conference of the Iowa Welfare Association on November 1 and 2, 1971. Miss Goldman will address the entire conference of 600 social workers in the opening hour on Monday, Nov. 1st. In other sessions during this two day conference Miss Goldman will present demonstrations of intake interviewing, child-guidance counseling, discussions with children and problem solving. James B. Cooney of Hillcrest, Cedar Rapids, extended this invitation to

Miss Goldman after attending one of her child guidance counseling sessions in Skokie. Mr. Cooney's committee on Family Life decided to utilize their seven hours of conference time entirely with the presentation of Adlerian material by Miss Goldman. The conference will be held in Davenport, Iowa.

MR. ROM TO CONDUCT THREE-DAY COURSE AT IPSDEN OXFORD. A three-day course titled, "Alfred Adler's Science of Living" will be conducted on Oct. 8-10, 1971 by Mr. Paul Rom. The aim of this course will be to understand and appreciate the contribution to the development of modern psychology made by Alfred Adler (1870-1937). This will include some consideration of his relations with Freud whose colleague was in Vienna in the early days of his work, and other psychologists. Having dealt with the dynamics of men as goal-striving, socially embedded, unique individuals, we shall discuss problems in friendship,

work and love as they confront us in our individual lives.

THE USE OF CHINESE SYMBOLS AS A MEANS OF TEACHING READING. Laura Evans reported on the work of Dr. Paul Rozin and associates at the University of Pennsylvania in The Sciences, Vol. 11, No. 6, June - July, 1971. Dr. Rozin and his group found that many children who have difficulty in reading cannot recognize the relationship between letter and sound. Chinese characters were used as symbols to which English words were related. With this method the children, who had been non-readers, were able to learn full sentences within five to ten minutes. Dr. Rozin concluded, "The relationship between symbol and word is easier to grasp than that between symbol and sound."

BEST WISHES FOR A SPEEDY RECOVERY VICKI! Vicki Soltz Statton suffered a cardiac arrest on August 19, 1971. Fortunately, it occurred while she was at her doctor's office, and she was immediately revived and is now recovering. This climaxes a very unfortunate year for Vicki, as she had abdominal surgery last fall associated with diverticulitis; then this spring had seven compression fractures of her spine caused by osteoporosis associated with her prolonged steroid therapy for porphyric arthritis. After the necessary reduction in steroids, constant pain of tendonitis, arthritis, bursitis, and porphyria have plagued her. Her consolations have been her family, her new "dream home" (780 Northcliffe Drive, Salt Lake City, Utah 84103) and the feeling that Children: The Challenge continues to help more and more families of the world.

INDIVIDUAL PSYCHOLOGY PROGRAM BEGINS IN OGDEN, UTAH. Attorney Paul Thatcher reports that he is working with two Adlerian Psychologists from Weber State College to establish a counseling and education program in Ogden. We will be interested in further information on this effort.

DANICA DEUTSCH WORKS WITH AGED GROUPS. In addition to her professional work at Alfred Adler Clinic in New York, Danica Deutsch has tried over the past years to encourage people to be prepared emotionally and practically for the extended life span. She has been visiting and lecturing to old age clubs in order to demonstrate, from personal experience, that life extension into old age should serve as an opportunity to share with others one's insights and knowledge. She spent the past summer at a hotel in Hunter, run by Self-Help, an exceptional organization for the assistance of people who found a haven there from Hitler's persecution. While at the hotel Mrs. Deutsch had an opportunity to engage in group discussion on problems from the Adlerian viewpoint.

CONFERENCE ON GAMBLING. The First International Conference on Gambling has been cancelled. N.B. Baird, Chairman of the conference expresses his sincere regrets for any inconvenience the cancellation may have caused.

FOOD ADVERTISING MAY BE KEY FACTOR IN UNBALANCED DIETS. A story in the Morgantown Post recently pointed out that "high pressure advertising has led American children to unbalanced diets, with too much milk, juice, and fruit, and too little meat and vegetables." This was the conclusion of a study conducted by Drs. Gokulanothan and Verghese

on 240 children in a Maryland suburban town.

DR. CHRISTENSEN AWARDED LARGE GRANT. Information has been received from the far reaches of the continent and Hawaii that Oscar Christensen has obtained a million dollar grant from the U.S. Office of Education. We have no details regarding the grant, but perhaps by the next Newsletter we will receive some information from Dr. Christensen.

GOOD NEWS STARTLES PARENTS. Principals and teachers in some schools near Mount Clemens, Mich., are phoning parents to relay the good news about their children. The "good news" program startles some parents, who generally expect to hear only about their children's mistakes. "Before you can even say anything," says Joe Clarkenord, a principal, "some parents anticipate trouble. Right away, they say, 'What's happened?' or 'Did he get into a fight with the bus driver?'" The fact that the school personnel too often communicate only news of a negative nature to parents may help create a negative attitude toward public schools. Consistent

positive communication should be made a part of every local association's -- and school system's ---PR program, WVEA NEWS, August 1971.

NEWS FROM WEST VIRGINIA UNIVERSITY AND MORGANTOWN. Four counselor educators from West Virginia University are teaching counselors in McKeesport, Pa., group counseling approaches. Gwen Piern, a graduate of W.V.U. and an Adlerian counselor, was given the task of securing assistance for the McKeesport counselors in order that they acquire group technique skills. She sought help from W.V.U. primarily because of the Adlerian emphasis. Drs. Duane Brown, William McKelvie, James Parks, and Manford Sonstegard are involved in the project which will terminate in mid December. . . .

A \$10,000 grant has been awarded to Dr. Duane Brown, Chairman of Counseling and Guidance at West Virginia University, to study the processes and outcomes of encounter groups. Drs. Brown, William McKelvie, James Parks and Dave Srebalus, are acting as the research team for the project. The specific purpose of the research program is to determine the impact of self-disclosure, group cohesiveness, and trust upon group outcomes. The grant period will end June 30, 1972, but preliminary results are expected by February 1972. The Counseling and Guidance Department of West Virginia University has been awarded a federal LEAA Grant and a West Virginia State grant to conduct two correctional workshops in probation and parole counseling. These workshops are in conjunction with the West Virginia Governor's Committee on Crime, Juvenile and Correction. The program will conduct

two intense, short-term (2 weeks) workshops with emphasis on the development of skills which may be utilized immediately in the agency setting. The first workshop, November 14, 1971, through November 24, 1971, will emphasize group counseling techniques. The second workshop, March 19, 1972, through March 30, 1972, will feature development of community resources. Both will emphasize the Adlerian theory. Dr. William H. McKelvie is directing the workshops. The project staff will be assisted by consultants who are experts in their respective fields. . . .

The Mid-Eastern Society of Adlerian Psychology is being reactivated in the Morgantown, West Virginia area. Initially the organization will train leaders for parent study groups. In the future the group will sponsor demonstrations, lectures, and other events intended to publicize and develop the teleoanalytic approach to human behavior. SCHOOL PERFORMANCE CONTRACTING.

One of the most controversial developments today in American education is "performance contracting" of school programs by private industry. Since the first contract between the schools of Texarkana and Dorsey Educational Systems in 1969, there have been 49 additional contracts generated across the nation.

"Performance contracting" is based primarily on the premise that the contractor gets paid consistent with the amount of achievement by the students in the school. This approach to education is thought by many to be too mechanized and that an "educational-industrial complex" has begun; advocates of the program hail this approach as a new "school-government-business cooperation."

Many approaches have been used by contractors, most of which are neither new nor innovative. Some of the methods are to: provide students with multiple types of tangible incentives; reduce the number of professionally trained teachers and replace them with paraprofessionals; and use more audio-visual equipment and mechanical devices.

Research findings will vary from very successful to unsuccessful on performance contract programs; however, the verdict is far from being decided. In a Saturday Review September 18, 1971, article, "Learning C.O.D." Mecklenburger and Wilson stated that results "should be regarded with the kind of hopeful skepticism that greets the first trial of any new invention."

DR. RAY CORSINI REPORTS ON ISRAEL

SUMMER SCHOOL. It may interest you to get a brief report on ICASS 71, the Israel summer school. Among the faculty were Adaline Starr, Bronia Grunwald, Bill and Mim Pew, from the United States --- from Israel, among others were Dr. Nira

Kfir, Shula Alschech and Achi Yotam. At one time there were 150 registrants, most of them from Israel. There were some 30 from the U.S. and 20 from Canada, with a sprinkling from various European countries, Germany, France, Greece, etc. The program was quite heavy: eight hours a day, with a full group meeting usually early morning and late evening -- and yet, none of us were able to meet the incessant demands for more special meetings. All of us worked hard, and hardest of all was Dr. Rudolf Dreikurs, who although recovering from his operations, was unrelenting in his activities. Enthusiasm and interest on the part of the Israeli group was very high, and I found a high level of sophistication. Many of the people had been in long term intense training with the Dreikurs over the past ten years. An active society exists, and in Tel Aviv there is an Adlerian institute with more business than they are able to handle.

PEOPLE, PLACES, AND ACTIVITIES.

DR. HELENE PAPANЕК. During the month of July, 1971, Dr. Helene Papanek attended The International Congress on Applied Psychology, which was held in Liege, Belgium. For the month of August, Dr. Papanek gave a paper on Pathological Powers and its Treatment at the Convention of Humanistic Psychology in Washington, D.C. This was the same convention at which Dr. Heinz Ansbacher lectured on Alfred Adler and The Concept of Power.

DR. D. LOMBARDI. In April, 1971, Dr. D. Lombardi presented a paper at The American Personnel and Guidance Association in Atlantic City, N.J. On Labor Day weekend Dr. Lombardi was in Washington, D.C. and spoke at the American Psychological Association. The subject

was Life Style Consistency and Demonstrations. At the invitation of the U.S. Armed Forces, Dr. Lombardi was asked to visit the Thule Air Force Base in Greenland, this coming Nov. to appear on a television show there. He will speak on Drug Addiction with an Adlerian message.

MRS. RUTH RONALL. On Sept. 16, 1971, Mrs. Ruth Ronall and Dr. Warren Garitano presented a joint paper at the North American Association of Alcoholism Program which took place in Hartford, Conn. Their subject was Understanding Life Styles of Alcoholics, and it was well-received.

DR. LEO GOLD. Dr. Leo Gold was elected a faculty member of the Alfred Adler Institute of Chicago in July, 1971. Starting Sept. 23, 1971, in East Orange, N.J. Dr. Gold and Mrs. Lillian Ehrlich will be giving supervisory courses teaching Adlerian Principles. In October, there will be a Teaching Workshop to be held at Mrs. Ehrlich's office in East Orange, N.J.

London - Discussions were held with

Paul Rom, Editor of the International Newsletter and member of the IAIP Council regarding the expansion of the Newsletter to bi- or tri-lingual issues. This plan has been suggested by Dr. Shulman, President of IAIP. The subject of Adlerian training in Great Britain and the problem of revitalizing the British Medical Society of Adlerian Psychology was discussed with Dr. Weissman, Dr. Perth and Mr. Rom. Discussions were held with Dr. Joshua Bierer who has suggested the International Association of Individual Psychology merge with the International Association of Social Psychiatry. Dr. Bierer, an Adlerian is founder of the British and International Associations of Social Psychiatry.

Amsterdam - Talks were held with Mr. van Aspern, IAIP Council member and Mrs. Gans of the Dutch Adlerian society regarding Adlerian training and the practice of Individual Psychology in the Netherlands. Further discussion with them examined the possibility of holding the next IAIP Congress in Holland as has been suggested by Dr. Shulman.

Vienna - In a visit with Dr. Baumgartel, it was learned that a second Adlerian Clinic has been opened in Vienna. It was also learned that the Austrian academic community prevented the issuing of an Alfred Adler postage stamp by presenting the argument that since "Adler was a student of Freud, he must get a memorial stamp after Freud."
