SHOULD CORPORAL PUNISHMENT BE ABOLISHED?

Joseph Meier, M.D. sends us an article in the London Evening Standard Newspaper of September 28, 1972, which raised the question as to whether or not Britain should continue the cane in their schools. A book entitled, "Last Resort?" edited by Peter Newell mentions that physical punishment was abolished in the schools in Poland in 1783, in Holland during the 1850's, in France in 1890, in Norway in 1935, in Sweden in 1958, in Denmark in 1968. In 1971 Inner London, amid shouts of protest from some teachers, banned the use of the cane

in local primary schools, although it still remains in the secondary schools and most authorities still allow its use in both sectors.

Several countries in Europe also, such as Switzerland and Germany, apart from the United Kingdom, advocate the use of corporal punishment. However, it seems as though the campaign to abolish the use of physical punishment in the public schools in Great Britain is getting renewed support.

THE RUDOLF DREIKURS UNIT OF THE FAMILY EDUCATION ASSOCIATION, CHICAGO

The Family Education Association is an educational facility serving the community through the introduction of the Adlerian philosophy. Family counseling is offered to parents who seek effective methods of raising their children. The counseling is done in a group setting so that all parents may learn and offer support and encouragement to each other.

In addition, mother's groups and two mixed groups of men and women are offered wherein members discuss personal problems and relationships with others. There are three groups for children from five to seven years of age and for the first time this year a group for parents of teenagers and for the young people themselves.

The Family Education Association also offers classes in the Fundamentals of Adlerian Psychology wherein Adlerian philosophy is studied. Classes and groups are led by trained counselors with the exception of the study groups. Fees are required for all classes and counseling groups but not for the study groups.

NEWS

Dorothy Peven is now engaged as the psychological consultant for Augustana Hospital, Chicago. She is involved in staff training and development.

A one-day training session working in rational-emotive psychotherapy and counseling was held on November 5 at the Institute for Advanced Rational Psychotherapy in New York City. Albert Ellis, Ph. D. was the leader.

Dr. Heinz L. Ansbacher, participated in a symposium on "Nietzsche's Impact on Western Thought" held at Syracuse University, New York. In connection with this symposium Dr. Ansbacher has also been asked to speak to the psychiatrists' staff at the Upstate Medical Center on "Adlerian Psychology: the Tradition of Brief Psychotherapy", and to the staff of Hutchings Psychiatric Center on "Man's Natural Aptitude for Social Living", both in New York.

Donald Crannell and his wife, Rose, presented a workshop in Toronto, Canada for the Toronto Association of Individual Psychology, which was exceedingly well received, according to reports from Toronto. They also did a series of demonstrations in South Dakota and Don addressed the Huron College student body and faculty on the subject "Cooperation or Chaos—The Choice Is Ours".

West Virginia University graduate students in the Counseling and Guidance program will be taking courses from the Alfred Adler Institute in Chicago, starting January, 1973. These courses will be given through the Counseling and Guidance Department at West Virginia for credit. Courses taken at the Alfred Adler Institute in Chicago will in the future be credited at West Virginia University.

New Jersey Society of Adlerian Psychology, an organization that dates from June 1, 1972, has made tremendous strides. Sunday, October 22, NJSAP, in cooperation with Seton Hall University offered a workshop on Adlerian Approaches to Community Problems. Lilly Ehrlich, Harry Benson, Jeanne Ginsburg, William Fuerson, George Jackson, Donald Lombardi, and Rev. George H. White, Jr., Assistant to the President of Seton Hall University, gave the welcoming remarks. Over 400 people registered to observe demonstrations, to listen to lectures, and to hear keynote speeches by Kurt Adler, Leo Gold, Bob Powers, Manford Sonstegard.

Maurice and Eva Bullard presented Dr. Dreikurs film, "Individual Psychology: A Demonstration with a Parent, a Teacher and a Child", to a public audience of 65 in the Bellingham Guild Theater.

Dr. William L. Edwards accepted a position as a therapist and family consultant with the Albany County Branch of the Southeast Wyoming Mental Health Center in Laramie, Wyoming. His work includes consulting with elementary schools, individual and group work with children and young adults, consultant with Cathedral Homes, and marriage and family counseling.

A Fundamentals of Adlerian Psychology course is being taught by Homer Kiracofe, in Fort Wayne, Indiana. The Indiana Adlerian Association, Dr. Ronald Pantner—President, has recently applied for affiliation with the American Association. The headquarters is in Fort Wayne, where there is an active organization. A curriculum consisting of the beginning classes in Adlerian psychology is being formed with the advanced courses being taught by persons from the Chicago Institute commuting over the weekends three or four times a year. The Indiana Society has available a series of six tapes of Dr. Shulman interviewing clients that demonstrate the Adlerian technique of counseling for a variety of personality difficulties. The third workshop in a series of six will be offered by the Alfred Adler Institute with Harold H. Mosak and Bernice Grunwald. The workshops will be held January 20 and 21, 1973 at the Midland Hotel. Dr. James W. Croake, ASAP adviser for FAS (Florida Adlerian Society) and a Florida State faculty member, participated in a demonstration of Adlerian counseling with an individual giving a life-style analysis on October 22.

A family treatment unit was organized by S. Richard Sauber. Some interesting work has taken place in the school systems of Florida utilizing Adlerian principles. Class councils were initiated in the spring in a number of local Tallahassee schools and teacher groups began during the fall.

An attempt has been made in Florida to use the Parent Study Group Format in helping parents of handicapped children, i.e., hearing impaired. The group has been using the text, "Children, the Challenge". Currently research is going on in the area of parent study groups. Those of you who may be interested in gathering data on the groups you will be leading so that a national sample might result please contact Richard D. Dr. Ed Stormer presented a workshop at Prairie State Community College for child-care workers in conducting parent's interviews and group counseling sessions from the Adlerian viewpoint. Dr. Stormer also conducted an Adlerian group counseling workshop for the New York Personnel and Guidance Association State Conference at Kianesha, New York. Governor's State University is offering some basic courses in Adlerian counseling and behavior problems with children for the people in the immediate area. Ken Wieg, from the University of Arizona, who has worked closely with Dr. Christenson is now a member of the counseling and guidance staff at GSU along with Dr. Stormer and Dr. John Carlson. Dr. Carlson is currently completing a book with Dr. Don Dinkmeyer. Dr. Carlson and Dr. Stormer also recently established an Adlerian private practice in the Chicago Heights area to serve the South Suburban Cook County Region.

Dr. Harold Masak has been appointed Community Professor of Human Relations Service at Governor's State University. He will teach principles of psychotherapy.

President of the Oregon Society of Individual Psychology for 1972-73 is Janet Mann, Floy Pepper—Vice President, Robert Kugler—Secretary and Joan Landsberg, treasurer. Mrs. Pepper is active as usual with parent study groups, totaling 60 parents at the Russelville school and giving inservice workshops to teachers on coping with behavior problems in the classroom and the use of Adlerian behavior principles in the classroom, as well as inservice training for the teachers in the east Multnomah County.

Bob Kugler and Roberta Kuuth are leaders of Parents of Teen study groups which meet every Tuesday evening for ten sessions. Parent Study groups are held at Edgewood Elementary School with Dorothy Cruickshank Tuesday evenings. She also has a group at St. Thomas Episcopal Church on Thursday afternoons at 3:30 P.M. Pat McReal and Dr. John Tayler are leaders of a parent study group at the YMCA in Salem, Oregon.

Gloria and Barney Lane of Wilmington, Delaware gave demonstrations in family counseling to 50 people at Colt's Neck, New Jersey. This is a new group organized by Mary Lou and Peter Walker. They have only been organized for about a year and now have 40 members in their program.

The Texas Society of Adlerian Psychology is in the process of founding an institute centered in Houston, directed by Father Ouellet. The institute will be an actuality in the fall of 1973.

A full day workshop will be offered by Dr. Masak in early December in connection with the Institute and the Family Counseling Center. Since early 1972 a Family Counseling Center has been in operation in Houston, also directed by Father Ouellet. It is the direct outgrowth of work done by volunteers over the past two years in the formation of study groups which have used a text written by Dr. Dreikurs. Dr. Walter O'Connell has been very much a moving force behind the Adlerians in Texas. He has lectured widely and has encouraged other members of the Texas group to undertake many of the above-mentioned programs.

SEMI-ANNUAL MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS
AMERICAN SOCIETY OF ADLERIAN PSYCHOLOGY
November 3-4, 1972

- I. Call to Order - The meeting was called to order by President Powers at 6:30 P.M., Friday, November 3, 1972 at Holiday Inn Central, 1313 Nicollet Avenue, Minneapolis, Minnesota. The following Board Members, Committee Chairman, and guests were present:
Board: Kurt Adler, Rowena Ansbacher, Milton Dewey, Mae Belle Doty, Leo Gold, Marven Nelson, Wilmer Pew, Robert Powers, Bina Rosenberg, Manford Sonstegard, Robert Willhite.
Committee Chairman: Joseph Meiers
Guests: Robert Bartholow, Robert Buntz, James Cooney, Donald Crannell, Rose Cranwell, Barbara O'Conner.
- II. Parliamentarian - President Powers appointed Marven Nelson Parliamentarian.
- III. Secretary's Report - The minutes of the Annual Membership Meeting (May 27-28, 1972) Houston, Texas were corrected as follows:
page 3 - This Society is organized and will be operating for exclusively educational and scientific purposes and will include the enlistment and involvement of all people who support the philosophy and principles of Individual Psychology.
page 9 - Robert Willhite reported for treasurer, Rowena Ansbacher.

Motion by Sonstegard that the minutes be approved as corrected.
Seconded by Ansbacher. Carried unanimously.
- IV. Treasurer's Report (Nelson) - Motion by Willhite that the treasurer's report be accepted. Seconded by Gold. Carried unanimously.
- V. Presidential Report (Powers) - The President's report was read, detailing some of the more or less chronic difficulties of the Society, namely: The limited effectiveness of a Board of Directors which meets only twice each year for a few hours; the need to address and resolve the questions of training, membership, affiliations, etc., which were studied by the Past President's Commission; the responsibility of ASAP to provide leadership to a larger movement of people committed to the principles and "common goals" of Individual Psychology. The President proposed that, in order to develop the work of the Society in the direction of meeting the real needs of the various individuals and local societies who look to us for leadership, the Board of Directors constitute itself as a committee to call a Working Congress of Adlerian Leadership which will be charged with proposing ways and means of doing so; and, further, that an amount not to exceed \$3,000 be budgeted to meet the expenses of such a Congress; and, further, that it be understood that this amount is to be used in large part to defray the expenses of those who will come from greater distances to attend this Congress in order to prevent the exclusion of people unable to meet such expenses out of their own resources; and, further, that the date and place of this Congress be January 26-28, 1973, in Chicago, Illinois.

Motion by Sonstegard to accept the President's proposal. Seconded by Rosenberg. Carried unanimously.

VI. A. Standing Committees and Appointments

1. a. Nominating Committee: President Powers announced that a Nominating Chairman would be appointed following the Congress. (January 26-28, 1973).
- b. Constitution Committee: President Powers announced that Welti had accepted to be chairman of the Constitution Committee.
- c. Liaison (APGA) Pew moved that the President be instructed to appoint a Liaison Chairman and empower this person to set up a booth at the APGA Regional meeting in St. Louis, Missouri. Seconded by Willhite. Carried unanimously.
2. Individual Psychologist (Sonstegard) - Motion by Willhite that the report be accepted. Seconded by Dewey. Carried unanimously.
3. Newsletter (Sonstegard) - Motion by Nelson that the Newsletter be continued through May. Seconded by Gold. Carried unanimously.
4. Affiliations (Gold) - Motion by Adler that the report be accepted. Seconded by Nelson. Carried unanimously.
5. Journal of Individual Psychology (Ansbacher) - Motion by Pew that the report be accepted. Seconded by Rosenberg. Carried unanimously.
6. Research (Allen) - Motion by Gold that the report be accepted. Seconded by Sonstegard. Carried unanimously.
7. Membership (Walton) - Motion by Adler that the report be accepted. Seconded by Pew. Carried unanimously.

B. Special Committees

1. Centennial Volume (Mosak) - Motion by Ansbacher to accept report. Seconded by Adler. Carried unanimously.
2. Workshop (Mosak) - Motion by Sonstegard to accept the report. Seconded by Dewey. Carried unanimously.
3. Historian (Meiers) - Motion by Pew to accept the report. Seconded by Gold. Carried unanimously.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:15 P.M. Friday, November 3 and reconvened at 6:30 P.M. Saturday, November 4.

8. International Association of Individual Psychology (Shulman) - Motion by Adler that the report be accepted. Seconded by Willhite. Carried unanimously.

9. Publications (Rattner) - Motion by Adler that the report be accepted. Seconded by Willhite. Carried unanimously.
10. Common Goals (Pew and Sonstegard) - Motion by Gold to accept the report. Seconded by Dewey. Carried unanimously.
- VII. New Business - President Powers informed the Board of the Memorial Fund for Dr. Dreikers' Papers at the Library of Congress.
