THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends,

Our own American Society of Adlerian Psychology, however impressed we may be ourselves by its growing pains, does manage to provide a generous share of leadership and encouragement to the International Individual Psychology movement.

Mrs. Dreikurs has written a report on the successful summer school, held in Portugal in July, to which one of our Past Presidents, Bill Pew, contributed a great deal in terms of planning and direction.

As one of the ASAP delegates to the Twelfth Triennial Congress of the International Association of Individual Psychology, I am pleased to report that three of the five elected officers of that body, now reelected for a second three-year term, are members of ASAP: B. H. Shulman, another of our Past Presidents, is again President of IAIP; our newly retired Treasurer, Marven Nelson, continues as Secretary-General; and Maurice Bullard, a former member of our Board of Directors, continues as Treasurer.

IAIP, as you know, has no individual members, but only member-societies. It serves as an international forum for local and national Adlerian associations of Adlerians everywhere in the world.

One of the many pleasures which I enjoyed at the IAIP Congress was to meet Paul Rom, who, perhaps more than any other one person, helps to keep the many Adlerian societies and individuals around the world aware of each other and in continuing contact with each other. He edits a charming, witty, informative international newsletter, which is sent out from London at a truly nominal cost. Elsewhere in this issue of our *Newsletter*, you will find information on how to subscribe. I heartily recommend that you do so.

The IAIP meeting was held in Milan, with the Italian Society serving as our most warm and friendly hosts. A new journal, *Rivista di Psicologia Individuale*, has had its

MINUTES OF ASAP ANNUAL MEETING, TORONTO, CANADA, MAY, 1973

The official minutes of the ASAP Membership Meeting on May 27, 1973, and the meetings of the ASAP Board of Directors on May 25, 26, and the Delegate Assembly on May 27, fill 12 pages. What the *Newsletter* presents here is a brief summary of some of the major decisions made at these meetings. The official minutes of the Board and Delegate Assembly meetings will be sent to the Acting Delegate Assembly members. MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS, MAY 25-26

1. The Board accepted the Special Constitution Committee report (By-laws) with the following additions:
 - a. to Article II, para. 1, purposes of the organization, add: "to encourage research and to stimulate the further scientific development of Individual Psychology."
 - b. to Article III, para. 3, add: "It is the obligation of an endorsing member to acquaint prospective members with the Purpose of the Society as it is set forth in Article II, and to assure himself that prospective members support this Purpose and are willing to work towards its accomplishment."
 - c. to Article IV, para. 2, add: "No Delegate shall serve for more than two consecutive full terms. After a second term, a Delegate shall not be eligible for re-election until two years have passed."
 - d. in Article VIII - SECTIONS, state: "Sections of the Society may be established. The determination of the nature and number of such sections, procedures for their establishment, membership qualifications and structure shall be reviewed and decided upon by the Delegate Assembly, pursuant to the request of ten or more members."
2. The Board will hold its Semi-Annual Meeting in Washington, D. C., beginning on Friday, Nov. 2, 1973, at 2:00 p.m. On Saturday, Nov. 3, the Individual Psychology Association of Greater Washington will sponsor a symposium. ASAP Workshops will be conducted on Sunday, Nov. 4.
3. The Annual Meeting of ASAP will be held in Chicago over the Memorial Day weekend, 1974.
4. A new directory of ASAP Members will be compiled by the Central Office.

MEMBERSHIP MEETING, MAY 27, 1973

1. The President expressed the Society's gratitude to the Special Constitution Committee (Pew, Chairman, Christensen and Gold) which prepared the new By-laws.
2. The Membership Committee reported the acceptance of 26 new Active Members and 22 Associate Members.
3. The President announced that the *Journal of Individual Psychology* will be continued under an Editorial Board, and that the Ansbachers will serve as Senior Editors and Consultants, and will supervise the orderly transition of the *Journal* to other editorial hands.

4. The *ASAP Newsletter* will be edited and published through the ASAP Central Office in Chicago.
5. The President announced the new members of the Board: Emmanuel B. Green of Chestnut Hill, Massachusetts; Gerald Mozdzierz, Le Grange Park, Illinois; and Dorothy Peven, Chicago, Illinois. Two members were reelected--Frank Walton of Columbia, South Carolina, and Don Welti of Cincinnati, Ohio. Board members who are completing their tour of duty and ineligible for reelection are Bina Rosenberg, William Pew, Marven Nelson, and Rowena Ansbacher. He announced the election of the officers for the following year: Robert Powers, President; Mae Belle Doty, Secretary; Leo Gold, First Vice-President; Bronia Grunwald, Second Vice-President, and Frank Walton, Treasurer. The officers constitute the Executive Committee.
6. The proposed new By-laws for ASAP, as amended by the Board of Directors (see above), were voted upon and accepted by the membership, with the following additions or changes:
 - a. that three words "either independently or" be inserted in Article VIII, after Delegate Assembly and before pursuant to (see Item d above).
 - b. that Article IX read "The Delegate Assembly shall initiate and act upon proposed amendments....Amendments may be proposed to the Delegate Assembly by petition of 25 members of the Society."
 - c. that the sentence in Article IX which reads that an unreturned ballot shall be interpreted as a "yes" vote be deleted and that instead there shall be a two-thirds vote of the voting members required for ratification.
7. It was moved, voted, and carried that if the host affiliate does not sponsor a full day in conjunction with the ASAP convention for their profit, the host organization shall retain 25% of the net profit of a convention, but that any losses shall be borne by ASAP.

MEETING OF THE DELEGATE ASSEMBLY, MAY 27, 1973

1. The Delegate Assembly voted that:
 - a. expenses of the Executive Committee will be borne by the Society when it is called into extraordinary session, and that at the Annual Meeting and Semi-Annual Meeting of the Delegate Assembly a formula shall be devised by the Executive Committee by which to reimburse the Delegates for a portion of their travel expense, in order to equalize the cost of travel for those who come from a greater distance.
 - b. Standing committees shall be Editorial, Liaison, Affiliations, Workshops, and Constitution.
 - c. Dues shall be established at \$25 for the first year, to be reevaluated at the end of the year by the Executive Committee and the Delegate Assembly.
 - d. The Workshop Committee shall be instructed to plan and to conduct educational workshops, one at the Semi-Annual Meeting in Washington, D.C., and one at the Annual Meeting to be held in Chicago next Spring, that a budget be determined, a faculty be recruited, that the workshops be announced and that the courses be taught irrespective of the number who sign up.
 - e. If there is a profit on registrations at Annual and Semi-Annual Meetings, 25% of the profit will be returned to the host organization.
2. The President appointed the Executive Committee to function as an Election Committee for at least the next six months.

4. The *ASAP Newsletter* will be edited and published through the ASAP Central Office in Chicago.
5. The President announced the new members of the Board: Emmanuel B. Green of Chestnut Hill, Massachusetts; Gerald Mozdzierz, Le Grange Park, Illinois; and Dorothy Peven, Chicago, Illinois. Two members were reelected--Frank Walton of Columbia, South Carolina, and Don Welts of Cincinnati, Ohio. Board members who are completing their tour of duty and ineligible for reelection are Bina Rosenberg, William Pew, Marvin Nelson, and Rowena Ansbacher. He announced the election of the officers for the following year: Robert Powers, President; Mae Belle Doty, Secretary; Leo Gold, First Vice-President; Bronia Grunwald, Second Vice-President, and Frank Walton, Treasurer. The officers constitute the Executive Committee.

 - that the sentence in Article IX which reads that an unreturned ballot shall be interpreted as a "yes" vote be deleted and that instead there shall be a two-thirds vote of the voting members required for ratification.
7. It was moved, voted, and carried that if the host affiliate does not sponsor a full day in conjunction with the ASAP convention for their profit, the host organization shall retain 25% of the net profit of a convention, but that any losses shall be borne by ASAP.

MEETING OF THE DELEGATE ASSEMBLY, MAY 27, 1973

 - If there is a profit on registrations at Annual and Semi-Annual Meetings, 25% of the profit will be returned to the host organization.

ICASSI 1973--THE RUDOLF DREIKURS SUMMER SEMINAR

A report from Portugal, by Sadie E. Dreikurs

In 1962 Rudolf Dreikurs organized and held an International Summer School in Denmark. The ICASSI (International Committee for Adlerian Summer Sessions, Inc.), consisting of people from various countries, with Rudolf Dreikurs as Director, was formed to plan and organize summer schools to meet every two years. Since then, such International Schools have taken place in Crete, Germany, Israel, and this year in Portugal. With the death of Rudolf Dreikurs, many people were wondering if the Committee would continue to function, and it is with great satisfaction that we are able to give the following report.

ICASSI of 1973 met for two weeks, July 17 to 30 in Espinho, Portugal, closing with three days in Lisbon. The staff consisted of 17 people representing Canada, Denmark, Germany, Greece, Israel, Switzerland, and the U.S.A. Including the staff, there were approximately 150 participants, who came from ten different countries.

The day began with a presentation of excellent papers geared to Rudolf Dreikurs' contributions to "Interview Techniques: Establishing Therapeutic Relationships and Training for these Skills," "Group Therapy and Multiple Therapy," "Life Style," "Diagnosis: Guessing, Hidden Reason, Two Points of a Line," "Changing Role of Women and other Ex-Slaves," "Group Process Techniques," "A New Direction in Human Functioning," "Community Mental Health, Social Psychiatry and Lay Movement," "The Four Goals of Mistaken Behavior of Young Children," "Psychology in the Classroom," and "A Biographical Sketch of Rudolf Dreikurs." These papers will be included in a forthcoming Festschrift.

Later in the morning, the participants met with special interest groups in their chosen areas, which included: Classroom Techniques, Family Counseling, Marriage Counseling, Life-Style, Dreams and Early Recollections, Psychodrama, Therapy Groups, Parent Education, Sex and other Life Tasks, Crime and Delinquency, and one session on Art Therapy. During the afternoon the groups attended sessions on Problem-Solving. In the evening there were some demonstrations, and, upon the request of many, a drop-in session was added after dinner for the purpose of exchanging ideas and experiences.

Thanks to the good services of Ruth Miller and Elayne Marcus, ICASSI members lived and worked in two modern and luxurious hotels, located on the ocean front in Espinho and in a favorable area in Lisbon, which afforded the added advantages of combining work with relaxation and sight-seeing, as well as sun-bathing and swimming for those who were brave enough to endure the cold water. Living, eating, and working together was conducive to getting to know each other. The spirit was high, promising and encouraging. What started as a memorial developed into a celebration.

Since a great number of people expressed the desire to have such summer sessions on a more frequent basis, the Committee voted to have the Rudolf Dreikurs Summer Seminar of ICASSI meet every year starting in 1974. ICASSI 1974 will be in Holland, probably July 28 to August 11, in Greece in 1975, and in Austria in 1976. We hope to be able to give University credit to ICASSI participants in the future.

With each seminar we are gaining in experience; as in previous summer schools, we are constantly learning and growing. Rudolf Dreikurs said on many occasions, "There can be no progress without death." This seminar was a living example of this statement.

Finally, it is a great personal pleasure to be able to give a first-hand report on the vitality and enthusiasm of the members of the Greek Society of Adlerian Studies. Neither my wife nor I had ever traveled outside of North America before this summer. Since both of Vaso's parents were born in Greece, we had long looked forward to visiting there and to meeting all of our Greek relatives. With the IAIP Congress in Milan as an added incentive, this was clearly the year to do it.

When the Greek Society learned of our plans, I was invited to give two public lectures in Athens, and, in addition, to conduct a two-day seminar for the faculty of a rather large school in one of the nearby suburbs. All these meetings were very well attended, and we were most warmly and cordially received.

Frosso Keni, the President of their Society, had first met Dr. Dreikurs when she was a graduate student at Northwestern University in Evanston. She and I enjoyed this very good opportunity to review the continuing relationship between the Adlerian movements in Greece and the U.S.A. A training institute is wanted there, and it may be possible to begin one as an "extension" of the Alfred Adler Institute of Chicago, which has been working out procedures for such arrangements with other groups. In any case, our experiences in Greece reinforced our sense of the extent to which others look to us in ASAP for encouragement and stimulation, and I thought you would be pleased to know about it.

Baltimore, Maryland--We share the pleasure of Anne Bergerson, Robert Lewis, Marsha Kalisch, and Forene Goldner in announcing the formation of the Family Education Association of Greater Baltimore (4607 Hawksbury Road, Baltimore, 21208), whose purpose is to disseminate and utilize the ideas of Rudolf Dreikurs as put forth in *Children: The Challenge*. Emphasis this Fall will be on establishing study groups throughout the metropolitan area, as well as opening a family education center where families will be counseled each Saturday in the Adlerian mode.

Bowie, Maryland--Bowie State College is proud to add its name to the growing number of institutions with an Adlerian-based instructional program. Bowie now offers eight graduate-level psychology courses which are taught from the Adlerian viewpoint, reaching about 400 students per term.

In addition, Bowie has instituted a series of workshops in conjunction with IPA of Greater Washington. Spring workshops with Bob Powers, Bill and Mim Pew, Manford Sonstegard, and Ray Lowe drew over 300 persons from all the helping professions. Bill Pew will give eight presentations for a course at Bowie this Fall.

Bowie-trained counselors are now functioning in virtually all of the school districts in the region. In Prince George County, the Supervisor of Guidance is working closely with the Bowie staff to establish a school-based practicum course.

The burgeoning growth of the Bowie program can be traced to Hal McAbee, formerly an associate of Raymond Lowe in Oregon. McAbee, now the Director of the Division of Graduate Studies, has taught Adlerian family counseling and minority group counseling at Bowie. McAbee added Bill McKelvie, who trained under Manford Sonstegard, and three part-time teachers, Andria Williams, Hank Raymond, and Fred Davis, to his staff to implement his Adlerian training program.

Towson, Maryland--Bill McKelvie will present "The Adlerian Approach to Counseling: A Day's In-Service Workshop for Baltimore County School Counselors, Nurses, and Pupil Personnel Workers" on Sept. 5 at Essex Community College, Towson, Md.

Minneapolis, Minnesota--The Adlerian Family Education Association of Minneapolis (109 E. Grant St., Minneapolis, 55403), convinced that parents are "the world's most unprepared professionals," offers training and other help for individual parents or groups in setting up Family Education Centers, forming Parent Study Groups, and providing a public forum for discussion of current family problems. To meet these goals: Mae Belle Doty conducted a workshop in the Fundamentals of Adlerian Psychology at Manhattan State College in July; Larry Mitchell conducted a two-day workshop in late August demonstrating the group process, geared specifically for persons involved in AFEA Centers and Parent Study Groups; and Rose Crannell is currently teaching a six-week course in the Basic Principles of Adlerian Psychology, especially designed for persons working in Family Education Centers.
