THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends,

At this writing I have just returned from Washington, D. C., where our Board of Directors/Interim Delegate Assembly members were guests of the Individual Psychology Association there. The Washington IPA sponsored a very interesting Symposium in connection with our meeting, and the enthusiasm and interest in Adlerian Psychology, and the hospitality of their members, made for an exciting and pleasant weekend for all of us.

As you know, the XXII Annual Meeting of ASAP will be held in Chicago next Memorial Day weekend. Elsewhere in this *Newsletter* you will find more information about that. What you may not know is that the Delegate Assembly is planning to hold a meeting sometime next Fall, which, though it is not a requirement of the By-laws, continues a tradition of Semi-Annual business meetings. I mention it here because so far we do not have an invitation from any local group (except for one, which will have us if no one else will, but which hosted our meeting just last year, and so is willing to share the honors with someone else, if there is another group that would want to have us come).

That, in turn, leads me to say that it is not too early for some local societies to begin thinking about 1975, either in connection with the XXIII Annual Meeting or the Semi-Annual business meeting in the Fall of that year. If you are able to think that far ahead, you may even be able to be as forward-looking as our Historian Dr. Joseph Meiers, who, far from being lost in the past, has urged us all to plan ahead through 1976 to 1977 when ASAP will be 25 years old, and when Silver Anniversary celebrations will be appropriate. Since the "Centennial Volume" of essays, gathered by ASAP to honor Alfred Adler's memory and work on the 100th Anniversary, is only now making its appearance, three years later than our target-date, none of us should be inclined to regard plans for 1977 as premature!

For the present you will doubtless be interested to know something of the decisions reached in our meeting in Washington, even though the minutes of that meeting are not yet typed up and will have to wait for the next issue of the *Newsletter*.

Most important is a decision to regard the Delegate Assembly called for in the new By-laws as a new entity, and to qualify all members of ASAP, no matter how recently they may have completed terms of service on the old Board of Directors, as eligible for election to the first ten places to be filled in that body in 1974. Since Kurt Adler, Oscar Christensen, Leo Gold, myself, and Manford Sonstegard (who is serving the unexpired term of Rudolf Dreikurs) are each at the end of a second three-year term on the old Board of Directors, and since there may be some desire to have some of us continue to provide some leadership to ASAP during a time of transition, it was decided that we should all be eligible for election to the new governing body. In the months to come you will be hearing more about election procedures, and about how you can decide the question of future leadership for yourselves.

One more issue should be of interest to you. Until now the members of the Board of Directors have all paid all their own expenses in connection with attendance at meetings. The only exception to this rule was made in favor of paying the expenses of the Secretary. The work of this officer in recording minutes and in handling correspondence was considered to be indispensably requisite to our ability to function. Therefore we would not allow possible questions of expense to stand in the way of the Secretary's attendance at meetings.

With the increasing reliance upon the Executive-Secretary, who is an employee of the Society and not an elected officer, this dependence upon the "official" and (for purposes of meeting the requirements of incorporation) "legal" Secretary of the Society is no longer so absolute. In the place of our concern to have the Secretary present at our meetings, therefore, a more general concern regarding attendance has moved to the fore.

Now that we are open to anyone's membership, we do not want to have our affairs managed only by those who are wealthy enough to travel to meetings. In order to assure that the cost of serving ASAP will not burden anyone unfairly, the Board has decided to reimburse each of its members for a small percentage of the expenses incurred in traveling to attend such meetings. A somewhat larger percentage of these expenses will be covered for those who are required to travel greater distances to attend. Further, the Board has decided that the Society shall bear all the expenses incurred by the Executive Committee in connection with travel and lodging whenever this smaller group may convene apart from the Delegate Assembly meetings, which is likely to occur at least once each year.

As your President, and as a member of the Board of Directors for the past six years, I can assure you that these decisions have been taken wholly in the interest of equalizing the possibilities for serving in a position of responsibility in ASAP. Until now it was a very costly business to be elected to the Board, and in my own earlier years of service, I was as often forced to give my proxy to others as I was able to afford to attend Board meetings in person.

I hope that you will consider these decisions to be responsible, and responsive to your interests and to your interest in the future of ASAP. If they are not, there is no lack of opportunity for you to make your opinion known to me or to some other member of the Board, and any one of us will be happy to hear from you.

## CONVENTION IS COMING!

The annual convention of the American Society of Adlerian Psychology will be held May 24-26 at the Ambassador Hotels, 1300 N. State Parkway, Chicago, followed by two days of post-convention workshops at the same place.

Co-hosts will be the Alfred Adler Institute of Chicago, Eugene J. McClory, Director; Rudolf Dreikurs Unit of Family Education Association, Hope Hornstein, President; and the Individual Psychology Association of Chicago, Edward J. Laude, President. Ed Laude is serving as Convention Coordinator.

Among the other persons who have assumed leadership responsibilities are Gerald Mozdierz, Program Chairman; and Evelyn Wachman, Registration Chairman. Shirley Gould is handling publicity, and Dorothy Peven is in charge of post-convention workshops.

On Friday, May 24, beginning at 8:00 p.m., there will be an open meeting of the Board of Directors/Interim Delegate Assembly. Adlerian program presentations will occupy all day Saturday and Sunday, with concurrent sessions on many topics of interest to members. The concluding function of the convention will be the gala banquet on Sunday evening.

One of the major tasks of this convention will be the initiation of "interest sections" within ASAP in such areas as psychotherapy, family counseling, community education, teaching, guidance and counseling, or whatever other groupings may emerge.

To facilitate fun, recreational events will be offered for Friday afternoon and other free time. Chicago, with its magnificent lakefront, museums and shops, offers many diversions which will enhance the enjoyment of those who attend the convention, as well as their families. Throughout the convention period there will be ample opportunities for communication, discussion, film and videotape viewing, and socializing.

The post-convention workshops will be led by a broad cross-section of competent teachers of Adlerian principles, drawn here from throughout the country, in addition to local experts. They will offer an unusual opportunity for all members of ASAP to learn principles and techniques of the application of Adlerian psychology so as to increase their individual knowledge and competence.

A convention packet with registration information will be sent to all members of ASAP early in 1974 with information on proposed programs and workshops. See the attached "Call for Convention Program" pull-out sheet and submit your ideas now. We will need them before December 15 so that we may incorporate all members' suggestions.

At the 1973 convention in Toronto, decisions were made and action was taken to enable the greater growth and development of ASAP. It is now the task of the 1974 Chicago convention to implement those decisions with action. Be a part of it--and enjoy yourself too.

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## WORKSHOP REVIEW

Rowena Ansbacher, Coordinator of the University of Vermont's workshop on Sex Roles and Marriage Counseling last summer, offers a report on the successful one-week course: Of the 80 participants, 50% had professional status, 35% had had considerable study of Adlerian psychology. Forty-five percent were from out of state.

The main part of the workshop consisted of demonstrations: Helene Papanek interviewed a husband, a wife, and the two together; Ray Corsini demonstrated his techniques of self-monitoring contracts and the marriage conference with a couple; and Bill Lederer demonstrated the reduction of marital incompatibility by using tapes, and videotapes for observing nonspoken behavior. The theoretical fundamentals and their relationships to specific cases were presented by H.L. Ansbacher.

Students, faculty, and the couples who were counseled commented favorably on the workshop. The opportunity to demonstrate counseling with three "live" couples (one for each practitioner), although involving some difficulties, undoubtedly intensified the learning experience.

To quote from student statements, "the openness of the staff and the students," an "understanding and appreciation of the richness and varied personality of each instructor," "made for exciting interaction." "To be able to apply Adler's concepts from his time with the technology of our time proves Adler an eternal guide in any time of man."

Negotiations with the State Superintendent of Public Instruction continue, as the Institute moves closer to degree-granting authority--Master's in Counseling and Guidance. Task Forces are meeting to implement many of the recommendations of the Institute's Self-Study Report. In the meantime, AAI continues to offer a certificate program in Counseling and Guidance, as well as in Psychotherapy and Child Development.

The Candidates' Association has recently been reorganized and expanded to become the AAI Students Association. A meeting of students on Oct. 28 followed an intensive poll of student opinion on every aspect of the Institute. The enthusiasm and constructive proposals of the students bode well for the continuing growth of the Institute. Newly elected officers are Jo-Anne Hahn, Mary Ann Pappas, Ann Scott, Helen Glick, and Irene Daniels, plus an extensive Board of Working Members. AAISA activities began with a party Oct. 13 graciously hosted by Sadie Dreikurs. A series of informal monthly Faculty-Student Seminars has been set up, the first one to be led by Bernie Shulman on Nov. 29. Subsequent Seminars will be held at the homes of Sadie Dreikurs on Dec. 9, Bronia Grunwald on Jan. 31, and Dorothy Peven on Feb. 15, with others to follow.

Fort Wayne, Indiana. The Fort Wayne FEA (Ann Kilgore, 801 Greenlawn, Fort Wayne, Ind. 46808) recently sponsored a lively panel discussion on Open Marriage. Next general meeting is Nov. 20, with a parent-study "check-up" session on Nov. 12.

Minneapolis, Minnesota. The Alfred Adler Institute of Minnesota (400 Shelard Plaza South, Suite 209, Minneapolis, Minn. 55426) announces that beginning in the Winter quarter AAIM will be able to offer graduate credit through the University of Wisconsin at River Falls for five more courses in their curriculum. 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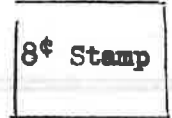

## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

It is true that the *ASAP Newsletter* is "primarily an in-house publication," as the Editor stated in the NEWSNOTES. However, it is not so exclusively, and as the Adlerian-Dreikursian movement, with ASAP as its center, steadily grows, its newsletter must be expected to get into more and more hands outside the immediate membership.

It is, in my view, *not* "the title and degrees" that matter but that the function of the person reported in the news should be unmistakably made known to the reader; that is, his/her skill and experience, whether it be "housewife, leading a discussion group" or M.D. or Psychologist, or what not.

As an example, on p. 9 of the October *Newsletter* it says "James Croake and James Keller, Adlerian psychologists and faculty members of Virginia Polytechnic Institute..." etc.-- would anything be won by omitting these identifying markers? Do we have, indeed, such a super-abundance of skillful functionaries ("nonprofessionals" as well as "professionals") that we should hide them under a bushel?

Whether it would be such "omissions" which would *best* serve the democratic nature of this Society--which was just recently strengthened by its equal-voting structuring-- would have to be further discussed (perhaps in articles, not just in necessarily brief Letters to the Editor), if, really, so many would believe so.

ASAP has just democratically opened its doors wide to anyone who supports its purposes, and proclaimed "You are welcome--as long as you are rich!" It seems a bit absurd to move towards "democracy" in admission policies, then raise the membership fee so as to effectively limit membership to the relatively affluent. In an organization committed to egalitarianism and expansion of membership, \$25 dues per year seems to me to be excessively high. The FEA housewife on a limited budget, for example, who might *like* to join, will often be hard put to justify that kind of yearly expenditure, above and beyond her contribution to local FEA fundraising efforts. So will an individual on a fixed income, in this day of rapidly increasing inflation. I would urge that membership fees be kept at \$10, and that other sources of revenue be found to finance ASAP's activities.
