THE PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Dear friends,

Dark and light, winter and summer, the contrasts between them and the contrasts in our responses to them have all provided themes for the imagination of our race from earliest times. The origins of "yin and yang" have been traced to the concerns of our most remote ancestors to make sense of these contrasts.

Recently, I have become aware of a non-technical, but vividly expressive, diagnostic category under which a lot of people class their psychological condition at this time of year. They are (they report) suffering from "the februarys." A slump in morale, a restlessness which combines a yearning for spring with a gloomy expectation of more winter to endure, even though we've already had more than enough, characterize the malady.

As with all difficulties, this one grows worse if attention is focused on what we can't do about it. It is relieved by focusing on what we can do in spite of it. (Whoever designed our calendar did what he could by limiting February to 28 days - 29 at the very most, and then only every four years!)

Valentine (of blessed memory on February 14th) could not free people from prison, but decided that he could cheer them up with little notes that reminded them that someone outside their cells remembered them and cared about them, hence the heart-bedecked greetings of love we were taught to send on his day.

"Winter's here," an English professor of mine used to say, in conscious abuse of Shelley's sentiment, "and Spring is still too far behind."

But we can look forward to it and prepare for it and do what we can do until then. For example, our Annual Meeting is being planned now (as the call for papers in this issue of the Newsletter reminds us). If we thought we could never wait for Memorial Day, that call may help our spirits to turn around and consider how soon that meeting will be upon us and how little time remains for us to prepare for it. Let's do what we can.

SORRY, OUR MISTAKE - Apologies to Bob Powers for inadvertently omitting an important sentence in his last "President's Letter." The corrected paragraph reads:

Communities have shared memories, expressed in myth, legend, and history. They serve the same kind of purpose for large numbers of people which is served for individuals by their personal recollections in the past life of the community, the members of that community are reminded of the character of the group to which they belong. In time of optimism and success, the remembered events are romanticized, or sacralized, and each member of the community is, thereby, encouraged to think of himself/herself as being privileged to share in the continuing life of the group. In times of setback or failure, the events of the past are recalled with uneasiness, or even shame, and individuals are thereby challenged to consider what may need to be changed or reformed in the organization of their common life. Attention turns away from the Lexington Green and the Bridge at Concord and is directed instead to Wounded Knee and the Trail of Tears.

"LET THERE BE LIGHT SHED" - A CRITIQUE

Sunnyvale, California, Jan. 6

Regarding Ray Corsini's research suggestion ("Let there be light shed") dated Oct. 22, I wish to both support and criticize it. I support it objectively because it does seem to have the potential of leading to interesting and meaningful clarifications. I support it subjectively because he put in words an idea I have been hatching for some years (great minds work along the same paths, except that his seems to hatch faster). My paper on Contemporary Adlerians in the Nov. 1972 issue of JIP is in effect the outcome of such a survey Ray is suggesting; but, of course, in a much more simplified version. But it does represent the first phase of what I thought some day might be a similar survey of practitioners of other schools, with the ultimate aim of comparing them to each other. Ray's suggestion is a neat, more comprehensive, and statistically more rigorous sequel to something I myself got involved in. So, if for no other reason, I support it.

Now to the criticism. 1) While testing Adlerians' "profession of faith" as it were (by subscribing to or objecting to certain standardized statements or "dogmas"), it would be more in the spirit of Adler to seek not for what Adlerians are saying, but where their feet are pointing - not what beliefs they subscribe to, but what practices they engage in. (And the same goes for the survey of other schools too!) It was this survey of practices that my paper, primitive as it was, attempted to do. I'd like to modify Ray's suggestion so that it would search for practices rather than beliefs, or at least a combination of the two. 2) While he suggests a rather specific "democratic" (actually it's more a republican) way of selecting the 20 "authorities" to be tested, Ray seems to leave the making up of the test questions to university people, to be chosen by some undefined process. I submit that, to the extent that the measuring instruments, which by the very nature of things, always influence the measurements, it might be better if these test statements are made up a) not by Adlerians alone, but by a statistically significant cross section of all schools, and b) based on suggestions made by the membership at large (i.e. in addition to submitting the names of ten Adlerians, each would also submit 10 test statements as "raw material" to be used by the "experts" who will compose the final 1000 statements.)

3) While the test may lead to much interesting clarification, I'm worried that it

may lead to much very un-Adlerian chauvinism a) emphasizing the differences between Adlerians and non-Adlerians, and b) within ASAP itself leading to some sort of "Inquisition" guarding the doctrinal orthodoxy of the Adlerian "congregation" and possibly censuring and "excommunicating" (even posthumously) some errant members. That this is not mere fantasy, is shown by point #10 of Ray's plan. In it he suggests that the result may serve to help decide whether Postel (why is he picking on him?), Dreikurs, or even Adler himself is Adlerian! I'm not sure how this can be avoided, nor do I believe that just because a tool can be misused it, therefore, has to be misused or not even created. But I do think we should be aware of the danger; maybe somebody can think of a proper safeguard.

With the above reservations and modifications, I wish to lend my moral support to Ray's proposal (I wouldn't want you to assume automatically that I'll give my time and work too...).

The text of the article is as follows:

"... MALE AND FEMALE CREATED HE THEM"

Are sex differences "from the beginning," as the second creation myth in the Book of Genesis suggests, or are they somehow "added" after birth, as the "Adam's rib" myth of sexual differentiation implies? Does the child first develop a concept of maleness and femaleness and then try to fit his/her behavior to the one dictated by genital endowment? Or does one feel one's sexuality first and, then, seek approved ways to express it? What effect, in other words, do thought and feeling each have in determining our sense of our own gender? And is it possible to have a sense of our own gender without developing, at the same time and to the same extent, a sense of the complementary (not "opposite") gender?

These and many other questions are wrestled with in the current series of "HAI" discussion groups... Discussion leader, George H. LaPorte, is a pastoral psycho-therapist.

Mary Ann also addressed a general membership meeting of the Rudolf Dreikurs Unit of the FEA on the topic "I Just Can't Seem to Get It Together" on Feb. 8.

Fort Wayne, Indiana. On Jan. 4, Harold Mosak taught the third session of the Neuroses Course.

Harold Mosak will give a one-day workshop in "The Neuroses" for the Individual Psychology Association of Fort Wayne on Feb. 22.
