THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends,

As I was saying, no matter how bleak February is, May finally comes. Regular readers of this space will have noticed that I was unable to compose letters for the March and April issues. Chicago had its worst snowstorm of the winter on April 4, and somehow my "februaries" just kept going right into the first weeks of Spring. Also, I kept hoping that Gene McClory and I would be able to announce that we had found someone to take on the job of Executive Secretary for ASAP. But until now, that was not possible. The process of searching for someone, as is often the case in efforts of this kind, was not at all encouraging until the end. Badly-typed resumes with words misspelled, from people claiming to be able to type and to spell, are somehow dispiriting to read.

Now comes Neva Hefner to save us from all that. After a number of years in which her full-time employment was the job of raising three school-age children, she is returning to the kind of secretarial and administrative work for which she is very well prepared by education, experience, and temperament (if there is such a word as temperament among Adlerians). Until the time of the Annual Meeting in New York, she will be serving the Society as an assistant to Gene McClory, and from the time of the Annual Meeting she will be serving as his successor and our first "full-time" Executive Secretary. The word "full-time" is, of course, still descriptive of a half-time job, since that is the most which the Society can afford to offer her at this time. With the prospect of our continuing growth and a continuing increase in her responsibilities, we hope to see this position develop into a truly full-time occupation for Neva.

So, to a line of succession that includes Meg Goldman, Ruth Katz, Sue Blons, Reba McCoy, Maria Pappas, and Eugene McClory, who all served in helping to draw the affairs of the Society into a manageable condition, and who must often have felt discouraged and frustrated by the meager finances available to support their dedicated efforts, we have added the name of an Executive Secretary who will be able to continue the development of a truly effective Central Office for the affairs of our Society. It is possible for us to take this new step with Neva only because of the excellent way in which Gene McClory built on the work of his predecessors in establishing that Central Office in a spirit of cooperation, combined with clear-headed administrative skill and attention to every detail.

As I conclude my three years of serving as President of the Society, and write the last of these "Presidential Letters," I salute you all for the work that you have done during these years in transforming ASAP into a new kind of association. The elimination of invidious comparisons between classes of members; the creation of voting regions to assure widespread representation in the Delegate Assembly; the continuation of the JOURNAL OF INDIVIDUAL PSYCHOLOGY under new editorial management; the exchange of news, information, and encouragement through this NEWSLETTER; and the services available through the Central Office to inquirers and members alike have all combined to make a new chapter of growth possible for the Individual Psychology movement in North America.

Speaking personally, the most satisfying result of all our efforts is the involvement of a whole new generation of younger Adlerians, actively committed to the application of Adler's work to the life of the human community. There is still much to be done. We are still tiny, and our name is not well known. But the signs indicate that we are capable of doing much more, and that we intend to do it.

BOOK REVIEW

(The following book review was published in "American Montessori Society News" Vol. 5 No. 4, 1974.)

CHILD GUIDANCE AND EDUCATION - Rudolf Dreikurs, M.D., Alfred Adler Institute, Chicago. The late Dr. Dreikurs, twice an invited speaker at AMS Seminar/Conferences, was highly regarded by many Montessori teachers. Numbers of them attended his workshops at the Alfred Adler Institute and this newly published volume of his collected papers will be welcomed.

Dr. Dreikurs' ideas on classroom management and discipline, held particular appeal for Montessorians, and his ideas have been the basis for AMS Teacher Section workshops and parent education programs.

Twenty-one papers, deliberately unrevised, published from 1950 to 1968 are included in the compilation. Unlike many books and papers written by psychologists, this one is distinguished by a lack of obscure, technical language, and is illustrated with many interesting cases.

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REGION II--MIDWEST

INDIANA

Fort Wayne--Three faculty members of the Alfred Adler Institute of Fort Wayne, Indiana recently taught an 8 week course at Purdue University, Fort Wayne, sponsored by the Mental Health Technology Program. The program was well received and filled to capacity. The course was titled "Introduction to Adlerian Psychology" and was designed to acquaint the students with various techniques utilized by Adlerians. A Life Style, a family counseling session, a psychiatric interview focusing on encouragement techniques were demonstrated.

ILLINOIS

Champaign -- Since mid-January, forty-five individuals and nine families participated in three Parent Study Groups and the Family Counseling Group, sponsored by the Family Education Association of Champaign County. Many of these parents expressed an interest in meeting to talk about concerns not directly related to child-rearing. Therefore, an Adult Counseling Group began April 10 to meet through April and May under the guidance of FEA Counselors Joyce Lohman and Eva Blum.

The Champaign School Board is looking for about 100 parents to work on 10 special committees to lay the groundwork for the middle school slated to begin in fall of 1977. The middle school will emphasize student oriented programs instead of the high-school stylized curriculum-oriented programs. The FEA suggests that this is an opportunity for "Adlerian input" and asked members to contact Dr. Turner at 337-3800.

Chicago -- The AAI of Chicago announces nine Summer Workshops. Four four-day workshops have been scheduled. Each of these is the equivalent of a course of one full quarter at AAI. Over the weekends, between the four-day workshops, Art Therapy

and Psychodrama will be offered. Out of town AAI students will welcome this opportunity to take some courses not generally offered through Adlerian organizations elsewhere, and to complete them within a period of four days.

Two special workshops this Summer are "Adlerian Psychotherapy" (including demonstrations) with Mosak, O'Connell, Allen and Mozdzierz. This will immediately precede the APA Convention on August 29. The other special workshop is a two-day "Awareness Training Institute" with Raymond Corsini and Dorothy Peven (July 19-20). Corsini, a primary developer of ATI, describes it as "an exciting amalgam of ideas, exercises, procedures and self-revelatory activities designed to help the participants break up their old patterns of thinking, emoting and behaving, helping them to move rapidly toward behavioral and emotional changes....a jolting invitation to a creative new way of experiencing and actualizing oneself."

Tee Dreikurs' 75th birthday was celebrated by the Institute with a dinner in April at Sage's East Restaurant. An Art Therapy Scholarship was established in her honor by AAI, the Rudolf Dreikurs Unit of FEA and her many friends.

MISSOURI

Midwest Society of Individual Psychology -- Fourteen parents are about to complete the first MSIP Advanced Parent Study Group. The group meets at St. Catherine Laboure in Sappington. The group is led by Jean Alessi and Anne Steele. Parents are from their first study groups in Lindberg School, Parkway United Church of Christ, St. Mathias, as well as St. Catherine Laboure.

Mary Powell and Mary Wilson, both Counselors in the Pattonville School District, have announced that they are conducting an eight week Parent Study Group at Pattonville Heights School. Over twenty parents are in attendance.

Columbia -- The "Practical Parenting" (Adlerian) education program was presented by Ken Marlin to about 60 University of Missouri extension workers from all parts of the state attending a three-day staff workshop on parent training approaches, April 28, 29 and 30. Ken also has been busy in the central Missouri area giving a talk titled "How to be a lucky parent" to PTA and other groups.

Guidance counselors are leading mini "Practical Parenting" courses at Ridgeway, New Haven and Grant Elementary Schools. Seventeen parents at the University of Missouri Lab School (covering kindergarten through 6th graders). Fifteen parents just finished a mini course at Calvery Episcopal Church (moderated by a lay volunteer) and are getting set to start a maxi course, using CHILDREN: THE CHALLENGE as their study text.

Kansas City -- Along with spring, parent education is blossoming out all over in the Kansas City area. About 150 parents are or have been recently enrolled in "Practical Parenting" mini courses (some moderated by counselors, most by volunteer parents) in elementary school systems. Southeastern Jackson County Mental Health Center is starting several mini courses with staff members as moderators. The United Methodist Church seminary has 16 parents finishing a mini course led by a seminary student.

MINNESOTA

Minneapolis -- Adlerians at the Alfred Adler Institute of Minnesota have been "getting good ink" lately, as the saying goes. Mary Shea was the subject of a 2-page article in a publication of Minnesota Metropolitan State College, from which she recently received her degree. Fae Moog was interviewed for an article about her Family Education Center work and her involvement in Adlerian psychology for the North Memorial Hospital newsletter. Dwight Townes was the subject of one of a series of reports in the Minneapolis Tribune on people searching for something to believe in. The article was headed "Doctor finds psychology alternative to pills." Also quoted in recent newspaper articles have been Bob Bartholow, Gisela and Karl Hertzke, and Janice Weiner.

Bob Willhite has been authorized by the AAIM Board of Directors to direct a pilot project developing a treatment program for families with alcohol and chemical addiction. The program will run the months of July and August.

Bob Bartholow gave the keynote address at a Human Relations Workshop in Crystal, Minnesota, on April 19. His topic was "The State of the Union: A Look at Contemporary Marriage and Family Life." Within the last month Bob has also spoken to the Faribault FEC on "Adlerian Family Counseling", to the St. Louis Park chapter of Parents Without Partners on "Readjustment through Involvement", and at Fairview-Southdale Hospital on "The Role of the Single Parent in a Changing Society."

Mary Shea, AAIM Board member, and Bob Bartholow shared the platform in a joint talk before the National Home Fashion League on April 17. They spoke on "Changing Roles of Women; Women in the Work World."

Jean Ballou and Pat Davis gave an overview of Adlerian Psychology and a demonstration of family constellation to 80 faculty members of Park Center Senior High in Osseo for in-service training on April 22.

Ruth Katz spoke to a group of High School students who are training to be Girl Scout leaders and counselors. She also spoke to children, ages 6-14, dealing with discipline and behavior problems from the Adlerian point of view.

Ethelyn Cohen and Jeanine Hall presented a seminar on "Human Sexuality-The Intimacy Gap" in Jonathan. Ethelyn also spoke on Human Sexuality at a Girl Scout all-day workshop on April 26.
