The Symposium, co-sponsored by the Charleston and Columbia Adlerian Societies, will be held on Saturday and Sunday, October 30 and 31, at the same hotel, with the theme Revolution in Human Relations. Registration will begin at 7:30 a.m. on Saturday. Bob Powers will give the opening address at 9:00 a.m., entitled "Revolution in Human Relations--New Images of Ourselves". BOOKS AVAILABLE

ADLERIAN COUNSELING by Thomas J. Sweeney. Boston: Houghton-Mifflin Co., 1975, 112 pp. \$2.60.

This is a paperback which provides an overview to Individual Psychology, including both the theory and methods as illustrated in child guidance, counseling, consultation and group work with children and adults. Unsolicited evaluations of it have been quite favorable, according to Sweeney.

PUBLIC RELATIONS COLUMN by Carol Arnold

P.R. (PEOPLE REACHING) IDEAS

This month we are beginning a regular public relations column. Through this we hope to share publicity ideas so that we can all learn how to reach more people. We would like to share successful promotional ideas from all across the continent. Please send your write-ups to me or to Neva Hefner.

Free air time is easier to get than many people think. This month, I will tell you how to get air time to publicize your activities. All radio and television stations are required by the FCC to contribute public service time to non-profit organizations in the community. Ten-second announcements are the most popular with the media. For radio, each ten-second announcement contains approximately 25 words. For television, ten seconds contain 20 words. Write your announcements in informal, conversational style. Use no abbreviations. Type them on $8\frac{1}{2}$ x 11 paper, triple-spaced, and in all capital letters. See the example below. At the top of the release, put your name, address, and phone

number. Also indicate when the release may be used, such as: "For use until Friday, October 15." Send two legible copies of the release at least ten days in advance of airing time to the Public Service Director at your local radio and television stations. Do not send carbon copies or onion skin paper. Type each ten-second announcement on a separate sheet of paper.

The final tabulations are not yet available as this NL goes to press, but there are approximately 250 registrations for Fall Quarter courses--substantially above last year's record.

The Site Committee has made its selection and it has been approved by the Board of Directors—the Institute will occupy two full floors at 159 N. Dearborn, three blocks north of the present location. One floor will contain classrooms, library, student lounge and consultation rooms and the other floor, the administrative offices. The building is being totally renovated. The move will be made in approximately four months, providing AAI with approximately three times the space it now occupies.

INDIANA

Terre Haute--The FEA in Terre Haute is a good example of Carol Arnold's PR article. Their publicity campaign began September 1 with six 15 or 20 second spots written for TV and illustrated by cartoon drawings. These will run approximately 70-80 times on each TV station as a public service of that station. They will also have six 30 second radio spots running on all local stations in their seven-county area. These will be heard about 100 times over each station. Press releases were sent to each local weekly and daily newspaper and posters have been printed and distributed. Sounds great!
