OF GENERAL INTEREST

IN MEMORIAM -- Danica Deutsch (1890-1976)

The funeral for <u>Danica Deutsch</u>, Executive Director Emeritus of the Alfred Adler Mental Hygiene Clinic and Charter Member of ASAP, was held December 26, 1976. She died peacefully in her sleep on December 24.

At age 86, she had spent more than 58 years as a devoted pioneer of the cause of Individual Psychology which she had learned as a student and associate of the famous Viennese physician Alfred Adler. Her devotion to this cause led her to found the Clinic which bears his name.

Born in 1890 in Sarajevo, Jugoslavia (then part of the Austro-Hungarian Empire), Danica Bruckner grew up in a community of cultural diversity which included Moslems, Jews, Catholics, Protestants and Greek Orthodox. Although she was the daughter of Jewish parents, Danica attended a Catholic convent school to train to become a teacher. There was no other school in the area that would accept girls at that time. In 1909, she went to a special school in Vienna to study to become a language teacher. After spending some time teaching language in Sarajevo, she studied French and psychology at the University of Geneva.

Returning to Vienna as a teacher, Danica Bruckner met Alfred Adler and became a member of the group of people who met regularly at his home. As a result of these meetings, she decided to devote her time to psychology. Soon, she began to work with Adler in the child guidance clinics which he started in the schools of Vienna. This work instilled in her a profound concern for children and their families which was always apparent in her work at the Alfred Adler Mental Hygiene Clinic in New York.

While working in Vienna, Danica met a young planist, Leonhard Deutsch, who was a student of Freud. "In the course of animated discussions about Freud," Danica once wrote, "Leonhard Deutsch and I became engaged." They were married in 1912 and both became ardent followers of Adler's teachings.

To escape Hitler's occupation of Austria in 1938, Mrs. Deutsch and her family left Austria to take up residence in New York. While Leonhard taught and applied Adlerian psychology to music, Danica began work as a nursery school counselor. With the help

of Alexandra Adler, M.D., she founded the Alfred Adler Consultation Center in 1948. In 1952, the Center became licensed as the Alfred Adler Mental Hygiene Clinic with Mrs. Deutsch as Executive Director and Alexandra Adler as Medical Director. In 1973, she retired to become Executive Director Emeritus, but she continued to teach at the Alfred Adler Institute and do psychotherapy until June, 1976.

As a licensed psychologist, Mrs. Deutsch achieved international status in her field. As a lecturer at the Alfred Adler Institute, she was one of the favorite teachers. As a humanitarian, she never missed an opportunity to use her knowledge and professional skill to help those in need. As a writer, she published the first Individual Psychology Newsletter, the Mitteilungsblatt für Individualpsychologische Veranstaltungen; co-edited with Kurt A. Adler, M.D., the volume Essays in Individual Psychology: Contemporary Application of Alfred Adler's Theories (Grove Press, 1959) and wrote many articles for the Journal of Individual Psychology.

SPECIAL MEETING OF DELEGATE ASSEMBLY

A Special Meeting of the Delegate Assembly has been called for the weekend of March 18-20, 1977, at Chicago, Illinois. This meeting will provide an opportunity for ASAP to benefit from greatly increased involvement by delegates. The work of the delegates will be directed towards developing new methods and revitalizing old methods that ASAP can use to increase its impact on society. The work will also be directed towards improving the efficiency and effectiveness of the D.A.

In order to accomplish our objectives, the Executive Committee has suggested that the D.A. divide into the following task groups for the Special Meeting:

- 1. Administration -- to look at the structure and function of governing body, officers, and central office; committee structure; semi-annual meeting.
- Advocacy -- to develop issues on which society should take a stand; develop mechanism for action and ways of implementing within local groups; consider priorities for action.
 - 3. By-Laws -- to review the constitution to find ambiguous areas that need clarification; to review Article VII and consider establishing standing committees; to incorporate any changes suggested by Task Groups and review completed document to be sure intent is clear.
- 4. Convention/Workshop -- to develop a manual of standard operating procedures, reworking existing guidelines; to develop a guideline manual for workshops; to consider format of convention and various aspects of convention planning; to pinpoint areas where program development should be expanded.
 - 5. <u>Elections</u> -- to examine the procedures for electing Delegate Assembly members and for electing officers of the Society.
 - 6. Expansion and Regional Development, Affiliations -- to review affiliation requirements; to review the portion of the By-laws referring to regions and to suggest ways of organizing regions to meet those purposes; to explore sources of increased revenues, to discuss membership drive and promotion; to discuss how the Society can be useful to all of its subgroups.

7. Training (includes Ethics, Consumer Education and Professional Standards) -to specify the purposes and activities which would assist the Society in
fulfilling the purpose concerning training as stated in the By-laws;
to consider training in independent institutes and societies; to consider
training centers in institutions of higher education; to consider ethics
in practice and training; to consider standards for various levels of
expertise.

As President Walton indicated in his letter, each member of ASAP is invited to participate in this Special Meeting indirectly. This may be done by contacting your regional delegates with your opinions or by writing a position paper of not more than 1,000 words and sending it to the central office at least one week prior to the meeting. Remember that the central office is now located at 159 North Dearborn, Chicago 60601.

ACRONYM REACTION

John J. Bradwell received a response to his letter about adopting an acronym for use with study groups, which he would like to share with the Society for further reaction. The letter is from Shirley Gould, Chicago--

I like the idea of an acronym for the Dreikurs system, but "Hope" is overused. There was the Hope ship and around here there's an organization devoted to the City of Hope, a medical facility in Duarte, California. Besides, we offer much more than hope.

ACT is great, but the slogan is a little cumbersome. The slogan should encompass the idea of "ACT, don't just talk." Adlerian principles make it possible for parents to live with children in such a way as to minimize problems. I'd rather call attention to the continuous patterns of living in harmony than to the behavioral problems. To act is also a good remedy for emotional distress such as depression.

The slogan should be short, snappy, and accurate. You've made a fine start.

PUBLIC RELATIONS COLUMN by Carol Arnold

P.R. (People Reaching) Ideas SUGGESTIONS FOR SPEECH-MAKING

We have discovered in the Northern Virginia area that the way to make Children:
The Challenge discussion groups is to make lots of speeches. When you develop a
thought-provoking and entertaining speech you will find that you become very popular,
especially if you speak at no charge.

- 1. Choose an interesting title, like "Understanding Why Children Misbehave", or "Winning With Children", etc.
- 2. Get the audience involved. Don't just talk AT them. Ask them what kind of flying lessons they want their children to have before they leave the nest at age 18 or 21, etc. Then ask what they--parents--have been doing to provide these lessons. (Don't expect them to answer that one--it puts them on the spot too much.)
- 3. Explain a little bit about <u>Children: The Challenge</u>. Talk about the child's desire to find his place through family constellation and mistaken goals. Bring out the idea that all behavior has a purpose. Don't get too complicated. Keep it simple.
- 4. Point out the fallacies of punishment: We infringe on our child's rights to show that infringing on other's rights is wrong. We demonstrate power over the child but then do not expect him to use it on us. We want a child to MIND and prevent him from developing a MIND OF HIS OWN.
- 5. Give the audience something to really think about. Ask, "How many of us have children who forget (be sure to raise your own hand)? How many of us remind those children (raise your hand)? Now, think back, how did you learn to remember as a child?" Bring out in discussion that Lessons are Learned--not Lectured. Parents can decide when they will permit their children to learn how to remember by beginning to forget. Point out that the problems only get bigger as the child grows. Will he forget his lunch now or his job resume on his first interview? You can also do this with paper routes, homework, etc.

P.R. Ideas cont'd

- 6. Answer a few questions -- cautioning that you can only give general principles without investigating each specific situation.
- 7. Leave a brochure or other material indicating how, when and where to sign up for a Children: The Challenge class. If the group really shows interest in starting a group, try to get one volunteer who will take names and help get things started. Choose a night and starting date; in other words, get a commitment before you walk out the door.
