PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear friends:

The significant activity of Canadian members of the Society was recently recognized by the membership as a whole when the referendum on changing our name to the NORTH AMERICAN SOCIETY OF ADLERIAN PSYCHOLOGY was approved by an overwhelming majority. (Ed. note: Official documents will be changed in May so that the new name will be in effect in June.)

Space limitations do not allow for a complete summary of the action taken by the D.A. at its recent Special Meeting. The D.A. made use of a model for the structure of the meeting that included small and large group interaction. One of the significant results of the meeting is that the model proved so productive, both with regard to content and process, that its use will be continued at future D.A. meetings. In the future, but on a trial basis, much of the work of the Society will be conducted by six Standing Committees (see pp. 10-11).All members of the D.A. will belong to one of the committees and the chairperson of each committee will be a member of the D.A. Other members of the Society may belong to these committees or subcommittees.

Some actions of the D.A. that are likely to be of widespread interest to members and that are likely to influence the life of the Society in the future are as follows:

- 1. The Education Committee was asked to develop criteria and establish procedures by which training programs may be evaluated and accredited. The Committee was also asked to develop criteria by which individuals may be certified in a variety of functions; such as, psychotherapist, study group leader, family counselor, etc.
- 2. Among the recommendations designed to encourage regional development of the Society, one that was well received and is likely to receive final approval at the May meeting, is a revenue sharing plan by virtue of which NASAP would provide funds to each region that has developed a regional organization. The consensus of the D.A. is that the objectives of NASAP will be met in the future largely through the work of its regional organizations, while NASAP will provide supporting services. (n.b., several regions have no regional organization.) The development of publications would be just one of the supporting services provided by NASAP. Numerous recommendations with regard to the development of publications of a supportive nature were made.
- 3. The development of Adlerian perspectives regarding social issues (Advocacy) will be carried out in part in forums scheduled at each semi-annual and annual meetings. The first forum under this program will be held in the Fall 1977 meeting.

- 4. A membership campaign will become an annual activity of the Society. (Our present membership has grown to 961 and we stand a very good chance of meeting our goal of 1,000 members by the time of our May meeting in Chicago.
- 5. It was recommended that a seminar designed to relate innovative practices in psychology and education to the theoretical framework of Individual Psychology become a regular feature of the program at our annual meetings.
- 6. Very specific guidelines for the conduct of our annual and semi-annual meetings and workshops were developed and will be refined in committee prior to their final approval.
- 7. The D.A. directed the Executive Committee to bring recommendations to the May meeting with regard to a program for the development of federal and other sources of funding for NASAP projects.

These are just a few of the many recommendations developed at this Special Meeting. The hundreds of ideas generated at the meeting will provide grist for the mill for some time to come. Thank you for your ideas. Every letter received was studied by the appropriate committee. See you in Chicago.

TRAVELS OF"TEE" Chicago, IL 3-31-77

I have just returned from my trip abroad and I am wondering if the readers of ASAP Newsletter would be interested in reading what I have to report. While in Tel-Aviv I visited my friend, Chaya Ben Sira. I see her as often as I can because she is full of wonderful memories of her early days in Russia, Tel-Aviv, and most importantly, her days in Vienna in the late twenties when she followed Alfred Adler and attended his Erziehungsberatungsstelle (Parent Education Centers). Some may remember her by the name of Chaya Hurwitz Suckerman. She was preparing to open a pre-school kindergarten in Tel-Aviv.

During my work in Zurich, Athens and Salonika I probably had close to 300 participants-some novices to IP, and others quite sophisticated. I conducted 33 workshops and gave two lectures. The outstanding impression for me was the experience of how culturally bound we are in our habits. This was strikingly demonstrated in each country.

In Israel, as in previous years, I learned that in Art Therapy I can now work on two other techniques--1. "Dreikurs' anti-suggestion"; 2) the understanding of the continuation of the enactment of the place in the family constellation--through the choice of a working companion and/or group and the reaction therein--but this needs elaboration not in place in this report.

I was curious about the formation of a group of 35 members in Salonika. This is its origin--In 1962 when Rudolf Dreikurs was conducting a series of courses for teachers at Pearce College in Athens, two teachers introduced themselves as coming from the "Israeli School". Dr. D. asked them if they were visitors from Israel. They responded that they came from Israel to teach in the "Israeli" school in Athens, a recognized school through the high school years. The Jews of Athens sent their children for general education plus preparation to go to college in Israel. These teachers introduced Dreikurs' approach to the classroom and also formed groups for the parents of

their pupils to introduce them to Adlerian psychology. When Juliette Cavadas and Frosso Kenis started an Adlerian group in Athens, some of the mothers joined and have remained devoted workers. They in turn introduced IP to their cousins in Salonika.

A whole long interesting story should be related about the history of the Jews in Greece--perhaps another time.

NEW PUBLICATION

PSYCHODRAMA: REHEARSAL FOR LIVING, Adaline Starr, B.F.A.

Psychodrama is a form of psychotherapy that uses acting to help a patient solve mental and emotional problems. While many professionals have extolled the virtue, value, and importance of psychodrama in group therapy, too few psychologists, clinicians, health workers and concerned laymen know exactly how to apply the technique in actual clinical settings.

Step by step, chapter by chapter, the procedures and methods of psychodrama are revealed, simply and clearly, by Adaline Starr as she demonstrates how communication through acting can reveal personality traits and specific modes of action. She shares the skills and techniques she and others have developed and gives practical examples of the playscript form psychodrama takes, the techniques that often work best, and those that often do not work. Each situation and its outcome is analyzed in detail.

The in-depth explanations of and directions for the application of psychodrama in the treatment of alcoholism, mental problems, drug abuse, psychosis, and depression, coupled with some twenty-five case histories, result in a humanistic guide that identifies and clarifies the important function psychodrama performs in the total therapeutic process.

If the host group sponsors pre-convention workshops, the profits are split 50-50 and if the host group has a speaker on Friday evening, all the profits go to the host group.

IN MEMORIAM -- G. Edward Stormer

Word was received of the untimely death of G. Edward Stormer in March. He was killed in a plane crash in West Virginia. Ed became a member of ASAP in 1966 while he was associated with West Virginia University in the Counseling and Guidance Training Program. He worked with Manford Sonstegard and during that time was co-editor of the ASAP Monthly Calendar and Newsletter and Assistant Editor of Individual Psychologist. He was very active in APGA and presented several programs at their meetings.

Ed came to Governors State University near Chicago in 1970 and was among the first professors at this new university. He was instrumental in developing the School Counseling, School Psychologist and Generalist Counseling Program at Governors State. He also was responsible for the development of an Entitlement School Counselor Program, whereby graduates of the program may become certified for counseling in the area in which they have their teacher certification. He and Kenneth Wieg were co-teaching in several Adlerian courses at the university. A unique program he developed was an independent study module for "Behavior Problems", collecting a series of tapes and readings for students so that they could study on their own time and at their own pace to fulfill the requirements for "Behavior Problems".

Ed was active in the community around Governors State and was very involved in the schools in the area. He will be sorely missed.

Eugene McClory of the AAI of Chicago said, "All of us were shocked and saddened by the sudden death of Ed Stormer, a member of the Institute's faculty. Just a few days before his death he attended an Institute faculty meeting and was, as always, generous and helpful with his advice on many issues discussed. The Board, faculty and administration of the Institute have expressed their condolences to his family. We miss him."

SPECIAL D. A. MEETING

The President's Message gives a summary of the Special Meeting of the D.A. and some of the action taken at that meeting. Minutes of the meeting and copies of the reports of the seven Task Groups are available upon request.

Bob Powers, Chairman of the By-laws Task Group, will be working on a new Constitution and By-laws to be presented later. Powers will collate the ideas, suggestions and recommendations of each of the Task Groups and individual members and will prepare a written document to be circulated. In the meantime, he presented a proposal for Standing Committees to carry out the work of the D.A., which was approved on a trial basis. This proposal is printed in its entirety since it will serve as a guide for the May meeting.

- The work of the Delegate Assembly shall be conducted through a structure of Standing Committees whose names and responsibilities shall be defined as follows:
 - a. The Standing Committee on the Constitution
 All questions regarding constitution and by-laws, elections, ethics,
 delinquency, suspension, and expulsion.
 - b. The Standing Committee on Development
 All questions regarding Advocacy, public relations, and liaison "with
 other groups, associations, and schools of thought in the fields of

psychology, education, etc." (cf. Article II.)

- d. The Standing Committee on Education
 All questions regarding Annual Meetings and other meetings of the Society,
 training, workshops, consumer education, accreditation, certification, and
 professional standards and competencies.
- e. The Standing Committee on Publications
 All questions regarding scientific development of theory and practice in
 Individual Psychology, publications, and research.
- 2. Every delegate shall accept assignment to a Standing Committee, excepting only the officers, who constitute the Executive Committee.
- No delegate shall be barred from participating in the deliberations of any standing committee, whether or not that delegate is assigned to membership in the committee.
- 4. Every meeting of the Delegate Assembly shall begin with the D.A. sitting as a committee of the whole, to review minutes of the preceding meeting, to establish procedures for the present meeting, and to assign agenda items to the appropriate standing committees for review and deliberation.
- 5. No meeting of the Delegate Assembly shall continue until each of the standing committees has been given sufficient time to meet, review, deliberate upon, and prepare action proposals in the form of motions or otherwise, which shall then be laid before the D.A. for final debate and action.

Some other items approved by the D.A. include the following:

- 1. Authorized the Executive Secretary to employ additional secretarial help up to 20 hours a week.
- 2. Authorized \$100 for each Standing Committee to defray expenses of the committee, if needed.
- 3. Approved a statement on Functions of Executive Secretary that will be used as a guideline for the operation of that office.
- 4. Approved a document presented by the Advocacy Task Group that will serve as a guideline for the Public Relations Committee in the implementation of an advocacy process.
- Approved two recommendations of the Expansion Task Group regarding the organizing of regions into operational groups and the development of regional resource lists and workshops.
- 6. Approved the recommendation that the membership drive be continued.
- 7. Approved the recommendation that the site selection for ASAP meetings be made at least one and one-half years in advance.
- 8. Approved the recommendation that seed money be made available upon request for both the May and November meetings, said request to be accompanied by justification and addressed to the Executive Committee; that a segment be available 17 months in advance, if necessary.

Of General Interest, Special D.A. Meeting cont'd

The Election Task Group recommended that the same governing structure be maintained for the Society. Clarification and changes in the By-laws were suggested for the election process, which will be encorporated into that document.

A number of items were referred to the various Standing Committees for the May meeting.

The D.A. is appreciative of the services of <u>Evelyn Klyve</u>, who helped to type the proposals of the Task Groups so that each member of the D.A. had a copy before leaving the Chicago meeting.

An article appeared in a recent issue of the Honolulu Advertiser indicating that the Department of Education (DOE) reportedly will consider pilot-testing a locally developed approach to education that stresses "the 4 R's" of student respect, responsibility, resourcefulness and responsiveness. The concept, called Individual Education, was developed by Ray Corsini and is being used in three Oahu private schools. The Hawaii Department of Education has invited Corsini to fully explain the concept to DOE curriculum specialists and other decision-makers who could ask Superintendent of Education Charles Clark and the State Board of Education to give it a try. The meeting was scheduled for April 13.

Corsini indicated "the DOE is so completely bound in tradition that they are giving us this much official attention is really surprising....We believe at this end of the world that if IE comes into the schools that it will increase interest in things IP immediately and immeasurably.!..as far as I am concerned--and I am not a neutral observer--this is probably the biggest Adlerian news in the decade."
