COUNSELING AND PARENT EDUCATION TREATMENT PROGRAM FOR ASTHMATIC CHILDREN - CAMP BRONCO JUNCTION

John West of the West Virginia College of Graduate Studies writes:

"Funding has been received to include counseling and parent education as part of the treatment program for children with bronchial asthma. Indications are that a number of environmental factors act as triggering mechanisms for bronchial asthma. Factors include: the presence of allergens, personality characteristics and family stress. Clinical impressions have indicated the creative use of asthmatic symptomology (i.e., receiving recognition, winning power struggles, obtaining revenge, avoiding challenges, getting a rise out of others and being treated as special). A consideration of the purposiveness in symptomology has enhanced the treatment of psychosomatic cases.

"Drs. <u>Bubenzer</u>, <u>West</u> and <u>Zarski</u> of the West Virginia College of Graduate Studies are spending the summer as consultants at Camp Bronco Junction, West Virginia (B.J.). Their work has been facilitated by the efforts of many graduate students. B.J. is the only long term resident camping treatment center in the United States which attempts to provide a normal environment for children who are chronically ill with bronchial asthma. These youngsters hail from all parts of the United States and some foreign countries. The principles of Individual Psychology have been implemented with the efforts of medical personnel and recreation specialists. A team treatment approach is emphasized and appears to be consistent with the holistic premise of Adlerian theory."

NATURAL HIGH TRAINING PROGRAM IN BLACK CHURCH

Mildred Bright is leading a Natural High training group (as a pilot study) at the Mt. Vernon Methodist Church of Houston, Texas. The members of the group are being directed in Adlerian principles of social interest and self-esteem. Buzz O'Connell is consulting with Dr. Bright on the program. They are planning, for the future, more Natural High training groups within the Black community.

NASAP WELCOMES CONVENTION INVITATIONS

It has been recommended that the site for NASAP meetings be approved at least one and one-half years in advance. The Society is open to invitations to the semi-annual meeting in the fall of 1978. The dates will be October 27,28,29. At the present time the D.A. meets on Friday. The host group sponsors seminars on Saturday, entitling them to receive all Saturday profits. Sunday profits go to NASAP.

Invitations are also welcome for our 1979 Annual Convention to be held Memorial Day weekend. Present plans call for a D.A. meeting on Friday, convention on Saturday and Sunday, and workshops on Monday and Tuesday. Convention profits are divided 75% for NASAP and 25% for local host. Post-convention workshop profits go to NASAP. Pre-convention workshop profits are split 50-50 if they are sponsored by the host group. All Friday profits go to the host if they sponsor an evening speaker.

DREIKURS FILMS AVAILABLE TO MEMBERS

NASAP has available, to Adlerian organizations, two Dreikurs' films: "Individual Psychology in Counseling and Education - I" (16mm., color, 35 min.) and "Individual Psychology in Counseling and Education - II" (16mm., color, 35 min.).

"Individual Psychology in Counseling and Education - I" features an interview with Rudolf Dreikurs. Discussion is based on the background and basic concepts of Individual Psychology. Thoughts emphasized are:

The "individual" in Individual Psychology stands for the indivisibility of the person as well as his uniqueness.

Every human being has the immediate potential of being different. Belief in the purposefulness of behavior and belief that significance of the purposes may be found in the behavior's consequences.

"Individual Psychology in Counseling and Education - II" - Dr. Dreikurs, in an interview, examines the major contributions of Alfred Adler. He explains how order of birth and siblings bear greater influence on a child than do parents. Dreikurs compares Individual Psychology with Rogerian, rational-emotional, reality, and other schools of thought in the field of psychotherapy. He expounds on Adler's concept of equality and early

childhood recollections for use as a key to personality; and speaks of utilizing early recollections as an empirical research tool to determine the effectiveness of therapy.

Dreikurs, in discussing school situations, reflects on the role of punishment; stating that it is effective only with children who do not need it. He gives some useful teaching techniques and relates his ideas on the proper function of school counselors.

FUNDING AND GRANTS

James J. McDonough, Jr., Special Advisor on Funding for NASAP writes:

"Approximately twenty members of NASAP attended and participated in a "special" meeting on "funding and grant proposals" at the Annual Convention in Chicago this past May. The need for funding of various Adlerian projects, such as Family Education Centers, Parent Study Groups, and other community services was quite apparent all across the country. In addition, the goal of eventually developing a nationwide project for NASAP was discussed and generated some interesting suggestions. Several individuals were either present at the "special" meeting or were designated by those present as having expertise in the areas of grant writing and the procurement of governmental or private foundation funding.

"This group of interested persons at the May convention in Chicago has formed the nucleus of a Committee on Funding with Jim McDonough as Special Advisor to the Delegate Assembly. These actions were recommended to and approved by the Executive Committee of NASAP.

"Other actions included:

The establishment of a regular "Newsnotes" section of the NASAP Newsletter which would contain information regarding grant/proposal writing and current as well as

potential funding sources. (This article is the first in the series of such communiques.)

- 2. The consideration of NASAP sponsoring regional workshops on grantsmanship and funding along with technical assistance which would be useful in procuring funds.
- 3. The gathering and organizing of funding information which will be useful for both local as well as national Adlerian activities.
- 4. A follow-up letter has been sent summarizing the above information and soliciting further comments and assistance from those persons currently considered as part of the NASAP Committee on Funding.

The Foundation Center makes information about philanthropies available at no charge to the public. To obtain a general listing of Foundations, the Foundations Directory may be your best source. Ask for it at the library reference desk.

- 1. The members of the research committee and their respective responsibilities are Richard R. Kopp (Chairperson), Jack Sutton (Research Information Bank project), James McDonough (Research Review Panel and Editor of "News and Notes" in NASAP Newsletter), Mark Mays (Data-Pool Project), and Thomas Edgar (Research Award Project).
- 2. It was decided to plan a second Research Review Panel for the 1978 Convention. Jim McDonough will be soliciting proposals to be reviewed at next year's convention. (See further information in this section)
- 3. Mark Mays will develop a list of Adlerians who are willing and able to be consultants for theses and dissertations. Once developed, the list (including the areas of expertise of each prospective consultant) will be made public in the "News and Notes" section of the Newsletter. Dr. Mays will also develop a list of Adlerians around the country who have access to various kinds of data pools which could be made available to researchers for analysis. A third task will be to compile those research instruments which are useful and relevant in Adlerian research.
- 4. <u>Jack Sutton</u> will take up the task of developing a Research Information Bank. Included in the task for this year are the development of an information form, to be ready by the next NASAP meeting. The form will be used to accumulate information about published and unpublished research which will be put in the bank. Dr. Sutton will also develop a list of dissertations sitting in university libraries around the continent which should be catalogued. (See special request.) Another goal is to

News Notes and Announcements: A CALL FOR PROPOSALS

The NASAP Research Committee will again be presenting a Research Proposal Review Panel at the Annual Convention in Washington, D.C., May, 1978. The purpose of the Panel is to stimulate and assist students, practitioners, and researchers interested in pursuing empirical research in the area of Individual Psychology. A Panel of research experts will review, encourage, and assist in efforts to design relevant and methodologically sound research proposals.

At the 1978 Annual Convention the Panel will provide a working "demonstration" in regard to those research prospecti and studies selected for presentation. The designated researchers will be invited to present their proposals at the convention and work with the Panel in discussing their proposals. For proposals or studies in which data collection has been initiated, comments and suggestions for interpretation and discussion of the results will be given by the Panel. Research efforts are divided into the following areas: a) Family education, b) School consultation and teacher education, c) Counseling and Psychotherapy, d) Theory development and exploration.

Interested students and researchers can submit a two-page summary prospectus of their study for initial review and selection to: Dr. James J.
