THE RETURN OF ALFRED ADLER. In Fall, 1926, Alfred Adler visited Providence, Rhode Island and spoke at Brown University as part of a very successful cross country lecture tour. Although there are still a few people who remember, as little girls, the dynamic doctor speaking to their class at the Mary C. Wheeler School in Providence, Adlerian Psychology did not progress in the area, and Adler remained virtually unknown in Rhode Island. The current situation differs. ROBERT POSTEL, RAYMOND E. TROYER

Robert Postel. "I recently heard the news of Bob Postel's sudden death. I would like to express my regrets, through the NASAP Newsletter, to all those who were associated with Bob and may feel the same sorrow and sense of loss.

Bob was not an easy person to know or work with: he was a polarizer—people either loved him or hated him. He easily created 'enemies' (to use his own term), and from a traditional Adlerian perspective he was clearly a 'heretic' — changing some basic approaches so radically that many would no longer consider him an Adlerian.

But Bob was also a very talented person, a creative therapist who touched the lives of many people — challenging, encouraging, and transforming. He was especially skilled with groups, and he developed many new methods, trained many young therapists, and made a large social contribution to life. His death was especially tragic because his ideas have not yet become well known, and they may never be incorporated into the growing body of Adlerian Psychology.

To all who, like myself, feel a great sense of loss, let us join hand in reverence, and memory."

Arlington Heights, IL: I'd like to comment on the most recent issue of the Newsletter. Why all the moral outrage at holding NASAP '79 in Las Vegas? I found it interesting that of all the letters condemning the convention choice and with all the talk about boycotts, none of the writers offered to host the convention in an "approved" state.

To my mind, the conventions are important educational tools for us as well as a chief source of funding for the organization. To wrap them up in a political cause, however legitimate, at this late date seems to be hurting us more than anyone else. This whole notion that NASAP ought involve itself politically seems to me to be more appropriately discussed in the Delegate Assembly. I would favor a well constructed position statement. Otherwise, how will we know for the future what issues are considered "non-Adlerian," "offensive," and the like?

I support ERA, but I do not support a Las Vegas boycott. The Las Vegas group needs our support, not our superior attitudes. I think

it is insulting to tell them that we will support their efforts if they will move to an "approved" state.

I favor Las Vegas because we need to educate ourselves as well as be of help to a new group of Adlerians who have and will be investing much of themselves in the upcoming convention. Let's learn, make some money for NASAP and have a good time. Sincerely,
