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LETTERS TO EDITOR

LAS VEGAS CONVENTION

Arvada, CO

I am not opposed to holding our convention in Las Vegas. I am not opposed to demonstrating "our beliefs about equal rights by going to Nevada with a strong, positive program and workshops that will demonstrate to the people of Nevada the theory and practice of Individual Psychology." (Dec. '78 NASAP NEWSLETTER) I am not opposed to sharing my Adlerian philosophy with Nevadaans, or anyone who cares to listen. It is not my ideas which I object to leaving in Nevada.

I am opposed to lending financial support, personal and institutional, to any non-ERA-ratified state. I am opposed (and even mystified as to how it might be possible) to holding an Adlerian convention, with our emphasis on mutual respect and social equality, in the meat market atmosphere of the Las Vegas Strip. How far can we bend our integrity before it breaks altogether?

I have some suggestions which might allow us to hold our convention in Las Vegas without

an irreparable compromise in integrity:

1. Change the site of the convention from the Strip to the University campus, for both convention rooms and lodging. (Ed. note: Bill Marchant checked this out and it is not possible to hold our convention at the University. One of the suggestions from the Convention Site Committee is that a university campus or retreat center be considered by hosts whenever possible.)

2. If we can't be housed on campus, double up in rooms, bring sleeping bags, bring tents. Most campgrounds have showers. If not, those with rooms let the campers shower there. A Colorado/Wyoming contingent is planning to rent an R-V "pad on wheels" to drive down in and use it for our lodging while in Las Vegas. IF this plan or some other plan can be implemented, it will allow us as a group to leave many ideas and very little money in Las Vegas. Other Westerners could make similar plans.

3. Eat fruits, nuts, cheeses, vegetables, etc. from the supermarket rather than spending lots of money in restaurants. We could even gather at a local park Saturday evening for a communal dinner--make our convention a real

family affair--and leave Las Vegas healthier and lighter than when we arrived--also wiser, closer, and only a little poorer (financially) --and with our words and actions embroidered into a pattern of integrity. We could even have the meal catered for far less than we'd spend for dinner and a show on the Strip! And if you've never seen a desert sunset, well....

4. Don't go to the shows. Bring musical instruments, lawn games, cards, jogging shoes, etc. Let's be creative and non-sexist about our entertainment!

5. Stop confusing the ERA with only "women's rights"--the ERA is dedicated to human rights. For those of you men who still don't see through the myth of male privilege, you might consider re-examining your health records for starters, and proceed all the way down to your right to die years sooner than your female counterparts. Rigidly defined stereotypes are only maintained at great cost to us all. Sexism is a social problem and it robs us all, male and female alike, of developing toward our fullest potential. There are no personal solutions to social problems. We must act as a group, in concert with other groups committed to the philosophy of social equality (like the approximately 350 organizations who are already committed to not holding conventions in unratified states) in order to influence social progress. In numbers there is strength. Let us not cop out just because we're not a large, rich organization.

In the future, perhaps we would do well to take the example of Kurt Adler and the Ansbachers, who are probably some of the best qualified to interpret what might have been Adler's suggestions to us in any given situation, and commit ourselves to holding conventions only in ERA-ratified states.--

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COMMITTEE REPORTS

WOMEN'S ISSUES COMMITTEE

Women's Issues have made the international scene, with Queen Elizabeth being made "an honorary man" in order to tour the Middle East without being discriminated against. We've come a long way? (There are still so many places on the globe where a woman would have to be a queen to achieve even this kind of token equality.)

Donna Tuites of West Virginia writes, "I work in an organization for battered women and rape victims, and would like to work on these two concerns specifically, developing an Adlerian-centered approach, if possible. I'd like to know more about what other Adlerians are doing in these areas (domestic violence and sexual assault)." Write her at Rt. 1, Box 202, Maudsville, WV 26541.

On the discouraging side, too, is the news from Wilmington that the men's awareness group folded, although 40 enthusiastic woman signed up for the women's discussion groups. What are the men so afraid of? I wish some of them would write and tell us. [One man said, "They're not afraid, they're just indifferent."]

If so, the situation is even more discouraging than I thought. What will have to happen for them to see that equality is essential for men and women to live and work happily together? Let us know your thoughts on the subject.]

There is some good news, however. On the positive side, educational efforts go on. March 23-24, the Chicago and Illinois Women-in-Business groups sponsored a large meeting in Chicago to celebrate Women-in-Business Week. JoAnne Hahn, Marquita Dulin, and Harriet Tower presented a program called "Creating Equal Relationships In and Out of the Office: Practical Adlerian Ideas."

Harriet Tower, just back from a trip to Mexico, reported her delight at seeing posters of Jimmy Carter and Rosalind Carter, and of the President of Mexico and his wife, on the street light and telephone poles, all four of them posted separately and alternately on poles along the Avenida Reforma. A lovely metaphor of equal partnership of the Presidential pairs, and an excellent role model for the citizens of their countries to follow!

The wild good news is that Jane Byrne, a woman--and a maverick at that--was elected in the Democratic Primary to run for Mayor of

Chicago! It will be a hard choice for a lot of people--either a Republican or a woman. Gee, if Chicago elects a woman Mayor, maybe Illinois will even pass ERA....but we haven't reached the millenium yet. A survey in People's Magazine reported that 91% of respondents would vote for a Jew for President, 90% would vote for a black, but only 80% would vote for a woman for President!

Albany--A \$15,000 state grant was approved for a special delinquency program at the Salamanca branch of the Olean YMCA. The funds will be used to facilitate a Family Education Center in the Salamanca YMCA. The program will be designed to provide a preventative measure in reducing the growing number of problems caused by juvenile delinquency. The center will highlight family counseling, teen talk groups, individual consultation, parent-study groups and the National YMCA Father-Son Program. NASAP member Anne DuBois is Director of the Salamanca YMCA and the Family Education Center will be based on an Adlerian-Dreikurs model. Congratulations!

ONTARIO

Toronto--AAI of Ontario: By the end of May, approximately 40 Parent Study Groups will have been held through AAIO and the Continuing Education Departments of local Boards of Education.

From September, 1978 to the present, Stan Shapiro, Steven Moore, and Pearl Cassel have made approximately 350 presentations to parent groups, clinics, universities, community colleges, and Boards of Education throughout Ontario and the United States. The demand for Adlerian workshops on days assigned to professional development by the Ontario Ministry of Education is tremendous and over 7,000 new people have been reached this year. Steven Moore will bring in \$8,000 to AAIO by means of his workshop honoraria.

The average attendance at the Master's Level courses has been over 80 per course. More than half of all the participants in the AAIC programme in North America are from the Toronto area. The 12 electives and special events average 75 participants per programme.

Plans for an Adlerian private school in Toronto have produced a very positive response and they are moving ahead with plans to secure a vacant building from one of the local Boards of Education.

Arrangements for the Annual May Conference have been finalized, featuring Stephen Lewis, former Leader of the Opposition in the Ontario Legislature, as keynote speaker. Over 700 conference participants will attend 27 workshops given by local Adlerians.

Adlerian Psychology is booming in Toronto, says Steven Moore, Executive Director of AAIP, and it would certainly appear so.
