A letter was recently sent from a reader expressing his puzzlement over the objection of some people to the word "lady." I would like to take this opportunity, through the use of the word "lady" to discuss the subtle oppression of language.

Webster's Dictionary defines "lady" as "a woman whose conduct conforms to a certain standard of propriety or correct behavior." The difficulty for women has been to figure out exactly what is "correct behavior" and what are the "standards of proprietary." (Surely no one called the marching suffragettes of 1910 "ladies.")

It is, then, this unspoken code which is objectionable. It is this code that is forced upon women in order that their "conduct conform." To what? Women have spent many fruitless moments wondering, pondering and doubting their being a "lady" instead of acting, taking risks, being and utilizing themselves.

There is also the element of elevation implicit in the use of "lady." It is a way of putting a woman on a pedestal. (Again, the concept of confinement.) There is not much room on a pedestal except for "off" and "down" or "fallen." But then we have other words for "those KIND" of women. Those words are on the opposite end of the spectrum from "lady"...." "whore, slut, bitch."

Now we have created new words to continue the warfare of linguistic oppression. These, too, are on the opposite end of the spectrum from "lady." These new words which women should shudder at being called are "pushy," "aggressive," and "women-libbers."

The choice to use or abandon the word
"lady" belongs to each individual. But please
consider: some women will cringe at being
called a "lady." For them, there is no distinction between a pedestal and a shackle.-Nancy Cannon

COMMITTEE REPORTS

WOMEN'S ISSUES COMMITTEE

Sharon Percy Rockefeller reports that "Women aren't the better half--they're the other half. But in government they're the missing half. There are only 17 women in the U.S. Congress--and 518 men. Nationally, women hold less than 10% of all elective offices. There are no women on the Supreme Court--and there never have been. Men run America."

And not so well at that. Chicago, at least, has given a woman a chance to see what she can do with this unwieldy endlessly fascinating city. Jane Byrne made it! A woman mayor!

ERA is only one--very important--way to bring about women's equality. A lot of people are doing what they can in a variety of ways to help. The Region IV meeting in West Virginia included a panel discussion on "The Changing Relationship of Women in Society" by Gloria Lane, Janet Terner, Donna Tuites, and Sue McKelvie, with Jim Bitter as Moderator.

One new member of the National Health Federation sent us a copy of a letter calling their attention to use of the generic he on their membership card ("...as a member is endeavoring to exert his strength and influence in his city, county, state, and nation..."). NHF wrote back and expressed appreciation and promised to change the wording on the next printing.

Some people are making a special effort to support women in business, whether lawyers, accountants, real estate agents or whatever.

Marquita Hutchens, Harriet Tower, and I had a marvelous time telling a fascinated crowd at the Women-in-Business meeting about Adlerian ways of creating equal relationships. The women who designed and ran that meeting did a tremendous job of organizing it, and getting over 3,000 enthusiastic participants to come to discuss all aspects of careers.

The regular column written by Marie Hartwell-Walker on Adlerian ideas for parents and teachers has spread from one paper to four others already! Marie is making sure she'll have plenty to contribute, as a practicing "working mother." One more innovative way to combine the two.

What about our own organization? Where do we stand? \emph{Do} we stand? What do \emph{you} want NASAP to do?

Although many people will not be attending the convention in Las Vegas, for those who do, there are several programs on Women's Issues, and Weltha Logan will be doing a post-convention workshop called "No Longer--Not Yet" which is labeled "Not for women only."--

NEW ZEALAND

Marti Malterre of California writes, "I've just returned from a trip to New Zealand. I followed up on the Adlerian ideas that Loren Grey introduced when he was there two years ago. March 10 I did an all day workshop called Positive Parenting. In a country where their own textbooks describe New Zealand parenting as negative, it was encouraging to have almost 100 people try to get into a workshop limited to 50, all aiming for positive parenting.

Some of the same core group developed by Loren were at the workshop and continue to spread the Adlerian word in New Zealand.
