PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear NASAP Member:

This will be the last President's letter that I have had the privilege to prepare. A new president will be elected during the May Convention. That I have concluded my term as president will "gratify some and astonish the rest," if you will allow some paraphrasing from a famous Mark Twain quip.

My term of office has resulted in many contrasting personal reactions--from extreme pleasure to extreme pain, from keen encouragement to despair, from the feeling at times that this was the best year for me to serve and again that it came at the worst time. Nonetheless, the Society has survived a severe financial crisis, strengthened its program of organizational development, and stimulated a great many members to become involved in the work of the Society.

In the meantime, I will continue on the Executive Committee for an additional year and pledge continued efforts in achieving the purposes of the Society.

It has been a rigorous year but being involved in and helping to move the Society forward has been one of the most gratifying experiences of my life. Thank you for the privilege of service and for the tremendous assistance that many of you have rendered.

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TRAINING PROGRAM AT CSPP

Word has been received from Richard Royal Kopp about the current training program at California School of Professional Psychology. He reports that CSPP--Los Angeles is now accredited by both the Western Association of Schools and Colleges and by the American Psychological Association. The current program is as follows:

1st year Master's Program

Advanced Theory of Personality & Psychopathology: The Adlerian Approach (2 courses, 3 units each). Thorough introduction to theory of personality (life style) and psychopathology emphasizing conceptualization skills applied to clinical cases. The relationship between the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual (DSM) and Adlerian psychopathology theory is explored.

2nd year Master's Program

Theory and Technique of Psychotherapy: The Adlerian Approach (2 courses, 3 units each). Adlerian methods for developing the therapeutic relationship, investigating dynamics, stimulating insight, and promoting cognitive and behavior change are presented and demonstrated. Emphasis is on skill development by students. Thus, roleplaying, exercises and other experiential learning techniques are emphasized.

Holistic Research Seminar (2 course sequence, 2 units each). Students learn to develop a research proposal on a topic in holistic personality. The Adlerian viewpoint is emphasized as a research approach to a question of interest to the student.

1st year Doctoral Program

The Life Style System: Theory Research and Practice (3 units). Theory of life style is discussed in comparison with other approaches. Research on life style, early recollections and family constellation is reviewed. Students are trained to assess life style using early recollections, family constellation and holistic interviewing techniques.

2nd year Doctoral Program

Prevention Approaches with Families (3 units). The Adlerian approach to family education and family counseling is presented. Students are trained to lead parent study groups and to use Adlerian counseling techniques within a clinical or family education center settings.

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IN MEMORIAM--ANTHONY BRUCK

Sophia J. de Vries reported that Life Member ANTHONY BRUCK died while working at his desk. He studied with Alfred Adler and had a certificate from Adler himself, stating his competence. Ms. de Vries submitted the following obituary.

"One of the few remaining psychotherapists who studied with Alfred Adler passed away. On March 11, 1979, Anthony Mark Bruck, almost 78,

died of a heart attack in New York, NY, where he lived with very close friends. Half a year earlier he had moved from Mill Valley, CA, where he lived alone after his wife's death.

"Anthony knew Adlerian psychology in all its aspects, in the way Adler wanted it to be used. He had become a teacher and practitioner who understood, applied and lived what he taught. His knowledge of languages--he spoke and wrote in French, Spanish, English, German, Arabic and his native Hungarian--facilitated his teaching and practising in different countries. During World War II this facility with languages helped him and his wife escape from the Holocaust.

"Between 1942 and 1949 he was a Professor of Psychology at the School for Social Work, San Jose, Costa Rica; at the Colegio San Louis, Cartago, Costa Rica; at Mexico City College, Mexico City; and Assistant Professor of Psychology at the University of Kansas City, Kansas City, Missouri.

"He taught courses in Adlerian Psychology and lectured at the Arab University of Cairo, the National University of Mexico, and Purdue University. In these courses he usually demonstrated how children could be helped with the participation of a whole class. As he taught, he clarified what he talked about with illustrations on the blackboard. He called his series of illustrations 'visibilization of Adlerian Psychology.'

"He published articles in the Internationale Zeitschrift für Individual Psychologie, American Journal of Individual Psychology, and the Individual Psychology Bulletin.

"Anthony possessed the loving, giving attitude Adler expected of practitioners. With colleagues he shared his knowledge and wit. He loved music and the theater. Part of his extensive library was about works of art. He is deeply mourned by his many friends, his clients, and the colleagues who knew him."

Judy Bradford reports there were around 250 persons in attendance at the Region IV Conference in March in South Charleston, WV. Harold Mosak opened the conference with an address on their theme of "An Invitation to Better Living." The community was very supportive and some 50 businesses and organizations in the area contributed door prizes, flowers, ice, name tags, cups, even lemons & limes for the bar, etc.

Of particular interest, reports Judy, was the Saturday 3:30 workshop on "Relationships in Transition--the Changing Role of Women," which 150 persons attended.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

WOMEN'S ISSUES

Jo-Anne Hahn reports the following as some items from the mailbag:

"I would like to see us building networks with other women's organizations (i.e., we are helping the Women's Health Collective with a workshop in Woonsocket, and are beginning to establish links with Opportunities for Women, a job placement service)."

"How about having at least one Women's Issues program at each NASAP National and Regional Conference?"

"I would very much like to see a panel presentation on Women's Issues as a keynote feature at a coming convention."

"Read TOWARD A NEW PSYCHOLOGY OF WOMEN by Dr. Jean Baker Miller...Adler couldn't have done it better himself!"

"My idea is to open up NASAP and AAI to teachers, which will bring in lots of women. One way is reduced membership fee, with only the IP and the Newsletter going to them. Another way is to have courses for teachers at the Institutes."

I would like to see workshops at NASAP meetings that would educate educators on materials for schools, i.e., Women's Educational Equality Program."

"I am swallowing my principles for several priority reasons and will be at the NASAP convention in Nevada, and will be staying at the Aladdin Hotel. (How did you like the application for room registration? The voluptuous female genie rising from the lamp?!)"

"As Adlerians we claim to hold/share similar basic beliefs and yet it seems to me that there are some gross misunderstandings among us (evidenced in Providence and various letters in the Newsletter). If we truly believe with Adler and Dreikurs that equality is essential to cooperative, democratic relationships, then we must emphasize that equal rights and women's issues are human issues essential to us all. If we follow conflict resolution guidelines, we must practice mutual respect, hear the others' point of view and get to the basic issues. Using a study group format, we might discuss basic Adlerian ideas (perhaps use the new Ansbacher book) and apply these concepts to ourselves."

The National Association of Women Business Owners is publishing the first national directory of women in business! If you are one, get your name in to them at 2000 P. St., N.W., Washington, DC 20036. They're dedicated to changing the fact that for every 30¢ earned by a woman business owner, another business owner makes \$100. Seems like an alive and energetic and creative group.

REGION I--FAR WEST

BRITISH COLUMBIA

Surrey--Great news from Discovery Elementary School in Surrey, where teachers and parents work cooperatively for the benefit of their children's education, where the democratic classroom is the model used and where the School for Parents has just completed its second successful year. They have won a 1979 Hilroy Fellowship Award and will receive \$1200 at the provincial level and \$3800 at the national level. NASAP members involved in this project include Mervine Beagle, Adel Gaba, Della Irwin and Edna Nash.

OREGON

Portland--Floy Pepper and staff received a \$7,000 grant to finance the Family Education Center at Multnomah Education Service District. This Center operates from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. on Tuesday nights and programs a study group for parents of emotionally handicapped youngsters as well as another study group for parents having "garden variety" problems.

WYOMING

Torrington--The Wyoming Society of Adlerian Psychology was established in January of this year.
