PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The Delegate Assembly has received unanimous support of the new dues structure with its apparent potential for increased membership. COOPERATION BETWEEN THE SEXES: Writings on Women, Love & Marriage, Sexuality & Its Disorders, By Alfred Adler; Edited and Translated by Heinz and Rowena Ansbachen, published by Anchor Books, Doubleday & Co., 1978, Paperback, \$3.95.

Advocacy Sub-Committee

The Advocacy Sub-Committee met during the 1979 Semi-Annual Meeting in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada. The Committee spent some time considering its proper role and purpose, and redefining its mission and charter. The following statement seems to represent our goals adequately: the Committee will serve to gather and distribute information related to community action needs and projects. The Committee sees its purpose as one of providing information as opposed to establishing and promoting a given stand.

The Committee received approval of the Delegate Assembly to reduce the number of Advocacy Forums from two a year to one; this Forum will will be presented at the Annual Convention. The Fourth Annual Advocacy Forum will have the theme of "Politics and the Family" to emphasize our support of the White House Conference on the Family. Donothy Bickling was selected and agreed to serve as Coordinator of the Forum in Massachusetts, and she will be submitting a proposal for the Forum.

Bill McKelvie reported on the progress of the White House Conference on the Family. A copy of his report is available through the Central Office. Bill is urging each of us to get involved in our state meetings related to the White House Conference. Members can write to Bill for information related to the appointed state representatives, or they may call or write the state department of each state government for information. It is possible that very little has been initiated in many states, and this is an excellent opportunity to get national attention for Adlerian concepts and principles and practices.

Bill McKelvic will be preparing and announcing in up-coming Newsletters a file available from him for cost related to corporal punishment (in the home, schools, and community). The file will contain court briefs as well as action information. Another file is being prepared by Jim Bitten on Nuclear Energy. It, too, will be made available to NASAP members at cost and announced in up-coming Newsletters. ARIZONA

BRITISH COLUMBIA

P. now has an office at #210-2525 Manitoba Street in Vancouver. Many Wilson, Sales Coordinator, will be available on a partime basis for book sales and volunteers are offering their services to staff the office. Plans are being worked out for having several psychologists offer counselling in the office. \\ \end{array}$

The Family Enrichment Association of Vancouver, a registered society in B.C., recently completed an 8-session STEP programme on Channel 10, the community education channel, under the title, "Kid Control". (From July B.C.A.A.P. Newsletter). Reduction from 9 to 8 sessions was accomplished by combining the chapters on communication and also those on consequences. A family in focus session was added. Bob Poburko, Many Keenan, Lois Smith presented the series, the first in B.C.

This enterprising group is the outgrowth of parenting groups started by Edna Nash in the Vancouver Schools and has had leadership training with her. They have been speaking to consultative committees comprised of teachers, principals and parents, to Preschool parent groups and others to promote parent education programmes.

CALIFORNIA

Elk Grove--Hundreds of parents and teachers are being trained to be Adlerian parent and teacher study group leaders in California thru Project ACCEPT two-day workshops by Jane Nelsen and Vicky Zinkle.

Teachers at several schools are so enthused about the Adlerian positive approach to discipline and encouragement that they have been willing to attend the ACCEPT workshop Friday evening and Saturday. The entire staff and parents participate in the training at many schools, including janitors, secretaries, cafeteria workers and aides.

Eleven schools have federally funded adoption grants to implement the ACCEPT program and ten schools so far are adopting the program with district funding. All are doing preand post testing to investigate the effectiveness of the program. Other workshops are offered for representatives from many schools throughout the state due to word of mouth demand.

Two-day workshops are scheduled as follows: Jan. 8,9-San Diego; Jan 16,17-Rio Linda; Jan.30,31-La Mesa; Feb. 13,14-Chula Vista; Feb. 27,28-Chula Vista.

UTAH

Provo--G. Hugh Allred and Carolyn C. Allred participated in Brigham Young University's annual Campus Education Week Program. An average of about 700 people attended their presentations on each of the four topics: (1) Reaching the Rebellious Child, (2) Rearing Responsible Children, (3) Obstacles to Moral Maturity: Abuse, Punishment and Rewards, (4) Building Self-esteem: Avoiding Depression.

Parent Education is beginning to make headway in the New York City area and suburbs. Bob Meyers is leading parent study groups in Eastchester; Ann Givner is doing the same in Lawrence. Anna Sten gave a talk on "Developing Social Interest in Children" at the American Medical Writers Assn. in New York. Det Eberhardt is leading mature and retired people in improving self esteem by developing social interest in Staten Island.

Upstate N.Y. -- The Dreikurs Association of Rochester ran their annual conference in October dedicated to the Year of the Child. Gladys Moskowitz is teaching life-style analysis at the Woodbourne Counseling Center; Linda Watson is teaching a graduate course at Elmira College in January: "Maintaining Sanity in the Classroom" and, as director of the Central School Family Education Center, runs Parent Drop-in Groups and conducts family counseling demonstrations once a month. In January, Sutvia Robbins will introduce Adlerian parent and family education concepts to 30 women in the Junior League of Rye.

ENGLAND

London--Manford Sonstegard is in England again this fall and sent a report on what is happening there. It follows in his words--

First to be mentioned are the courses being taught at the University of London. I suspect I can safely say that "Understanding the Family in Crisis" and "Current Theories in Psychotherapy" are the first courses, based on the Adlerian psychological formulation, ever taught at the University of London. Over 50 students are enrolled.

Next is the Quarrandon Parent-Children Association which meets every Monday evening in the Quarrandon Clinic and operates much as do the Centres in the U.S. and Canada. The parents who attend usually number 25 or so.

There is a third undertaking worthy of mention. Ten social workers in the London Borough of Haringay are being educated in group approaches. More specifically, they are being taught the methods of counselling teen-agers in groups. The training session runs for ten weeks. The plan is to follow the initial training course with several in

On a less formal basis is the effort made by several people to better themselves. includes Opportunity Playgroup directors, speech therapists working in prisons and doctors. Two groups, one in London and one in Aylesbury, are being trained as paraprofessionals

The Chiltern Branch of the British Society of Adlerian Psychology meets once each month at the home of Dr. Lilian Beattie in Wendover to discuss Adlerian Psychology theory and practice.

A meeting has been held with a group of medical doctors who are interested in training in procedures of Life Style Assessment. This will probably not be initiated until next year. however.
