PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear fellow members:

On behalf of our membership, I wish to express support to Leo Gold, former NASAP President, long-time Executive member, on the untimely death of his wife, Janet. Our heartfelt wishes for peace and continued strength are extended to Leo and family.

From this note of sadness, we turn to encouraging spring activities throughout the continent. A recent call from Dick Huddleston of Red Deer, Alberta, made the point once more of the value of different groups exchanging ideas in this newsletter. I encouraged him to share his experiences of teaching psychology and to invite members to share ways of taking a strong stand to include Adlerian psychology in university level courses.

By now you have received registration information for the ANNUAL CONVENTION in AMHERST, MASSACHUSETTS. Decide now to travel from near and far to participate in a workshop or course of your choice. The rich and varied program offers 116 presentations equally divided between clinical and educational areas of interest with similar programs scheduled sequentially. The local group has worked hard to make it possible for families to attend by providing day-care for young children and supervised trips for those of school age, as well as individual care for infants. with Bob Powers for the local association. Recently, a young, typically discouraged teacher attended her first BCAAP workshop. She was surprised with the positive experience of meeting with such a supportive, encouraging group. The Annual Meeting is a similarly inspiring experience, only much more. Whether you take a friend, a spouse, or your family, all will return embued with the social interest that permeates the setting.

When the Executive Committee conducted the Society's business (reported elsewhere in the Newsletter) through a conference call on February 24, Pon Kelly and Hal McAbee were on the location of another very successful annual Region III meeting. Hal reported that in a very short time in the hotel lobby, he had signed up six new NASAP members simply by asking them. At the time of printing, membership totaled 1,016 with 54 Participating, 83 Family, 65 Students. If each of us reaches ONE new member, we will reach our goal of 2,000 by the convention. Make a dream a reality. Do your part to help the Society grow by carrying membership forms with you at all times.*

Executive Committee Summary

The Executive Committee conducted its business via a Conference Call in February. Items covered included:

- 1. Approval of Stefanie Necheles as $\underline{\text{Life Member}}$
- 2. Approval of <u>annual audit</u>, which includes preparation of <u>Balance Sheet</u>, Statement of Operations and Form 990.
- 3. Approval of appointment of a special committee to establish criteria for annual awards at the Convention. President Nash will appoint the committee, who will also help in selection of people to be honored at the 1980 convention.
- 4. Agreed to provide for a social gathering on Thursday evening, June 12, for those $\overline{\text{D.A.}}$ members present at Amherst. It will be a social hour with some structure.
- 5. Accepted progress report of 1980 Convention Committee with appreciation for the work that has been done thus far.
- 6. Membership report was received along with progress report on membership drive. Several mailings have gone out and brochures are being prepared. Membership is ahead of last year in numbers but slightly behind financially due to broadening the dues scale and lowering the minimum amount.
- 7. Special Committee on Funding, chaired by $Ha\ell$ McAbee, is considering a concentrated donations drive and the advisability of using professional fundraisers.
- 8. Progress report was received regarding the possible receipt of \$10,000 from the Clonick estate. (Announcement will hopefully be made in next issue of Newsletter.)
- 9. Figures for the 1980 Budget were revised to take into account the membership trend and increase in rent and some other office expenses. Projected Budget shows a possible balance of \$157.48. There will be a cash flow problem in April or May and again in the fall.

The 1979 Financial Report was received as information. Actual cash balance December 31, 1979, was \$2,902.48. The only pending item was IP—the last two issues were not published in 1979 so funds were not expended for them. That will come out of 1980 funds.

10. The Financial Report for the Semi-Annual Meeting in Edmonton in 1979 was accepted with resolution of gratitude for an excellent report and job well done. The conference netted \$6,268.00 for the Individual Psychology Society of Edmonton and \$5,500.00 for NASAP (all in Canadian funds).

Attendance figures for Semi-Annual Meeting 207 for Saturday meeting; 159 for pre-convention workshops; 162 for post-convention workshops.

11. Edcuation Committee, chaired by Eugene McClony, will be working on plans for the $\underline{\text{Work-shop Series}}$ and will report in June.

12. Agreed that a <u>survey</u> of the membership to ascertain support for modifying <u>regional boundaries</u> should be included in the <u>Newsletter</u>.

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Outgrowth of Donahue Show

A local station in Fort Wayne re-ran the family counseling program from the Donahue Show on January 4 because of local interest. The station asked Ron Pancher and Homen Kiracofe to be on "Morning Break," following the Donahue tape, to give further interpretation and present the local Adler Program. Some twenty local persons, many who have participated in the local Adlerian Program, made up the audience and asked questions or gave testimonies. Questions and testimonials also came in by phone.

Calls came into the AAI of Fort Wayne office before the program left the air and there were 50-60 calls for various kinds of information. The class on Child Guidance that started on January 9 was full to overflowing.

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Elementary School Guidance and Counseling

The December 1979 issue of Elementary School Guidance and Counseling, published by the American School Counselor Assn., a division of APGA, was devoted to Health, Wellness and Transpersonal Approaches to Helping. Adlerian contributors included Raymond J. Consini on Individual Education; Don Dinkmeyer, Jr. and Sr., on Holistic Approaches to Health.

Jon Carlson, editor, wrote the lead article on the theme for this special issue. Carlson stated: "Transpersonal psychology has its roots in the work of Abraham Maslow and his teacher, Alfred Adler. It was their belief that health was something more than the absence of disease and pain. An underlying assumption was that physical, emotional, intellectual, and spiritual growth are interrelated. They also

realized that a counselor needs to be able to use a variety of approaches to help each individual reach his or her unique wellness lifestyle."

Region I -- Far West

CALIFORNIA

Petaluma.—The Family Education Center of Petaluma, CA has had a successful year with 1400 client contacts the first ten weeks and increases in the last two ten-week periods. "Adults Night Out" has been going on since January and the exploration of adult relationships has been well received. They have a course through Sonoma State University for 3 C.E. units called "Parent Training and Marriage Enrichment," which may be taken by nurses for relicensure.

The Director of F.E.C., Lynn Lott, has been busy with one-day seminars in the area; including Ottawa University in Fairfield and Dominican College in San Rafael. She and the interns are doing training sessions in area high schools.

COLORADO

HAWAII

Honolulu--Raymond J. Consini has received the 1979 Freedom Award by the Honolulu Sertoma Cluf for his contribution to education by his development of Individual Education--an Adlerian school system. Individual Education is now in use in six schools, and was recently evaluated by the Hawaii Department of Education following its first year at the Haaheo School in Hilo, Hawaii, and given a favorable evaluation.

The name "Sertoma" is derived from the words, "SERvice TO MAnkind" and the organization may well be called a "social interest group."

Corsini was invited to be the featured speaker at Teacher's Day on the island of Molokai with the topic of Individual Education. A group of teachers have been studying this system and are attempting to start an Individual Education school on the friendly isle.

OREGON

Portland--"Conflict Management" and the "Classroom Meeting Model," two novel approaches to solving problems between adults and children, will be presented at the OSIP Spring Conference. John Platt will be the primary conference presentor. It is scheduled for May 9 and 10 at the Holiday Inn, South Portland and will begin with a humorous Friday evening banquet speech followed by workshops on Saturday. ILLINOIS

Chicago--Helen K. Cooley, a graduate of AAI of Chicago and a counseling psychologist, has developed a unique combination of psychological encounter and social dancing to give participants the opportunity to communicate with each other on a social level through dance, as well as verbalization.

She held a dance clinic in February and will have another May 5, 12, 19, 26 at the Oasis Center for Human Potential in Chicago. The titles for the sessions are: "Dance: A Basic Human Need," "Dance as Conversation: Expressing Ourselves in an Organized Manner," "Dance as Distance-Keeping; Dance as Distance-Closing," "The Magic of an Altered State of Consciousness."

Another Chicagoan, Shirley Gould, has been kept very busy in January and February on talk shows, both TV and radio. On February 25, she was interviewed by Radio KTOK, Oklahoma City. She sat at her desk in Skokie, connected via long distance, and their listeners called in with comments and questions about How to Raise an Independent Child. SWITZERLAND

This is being sponsored by the Swiss Society of Individual Psychology.

SURVEY ON REGIONS

At several meetings of the Delegate Assembly over the past several years, problems have been pointed out in regard to our current regional boundaries. These objections take several forms.

- 1. Membership from developing areas, particularly western part of Region II, feel that their opportunity for election is minimal because there is such a large number of members in more urban areas, such as Chicago, that it is virtually impossible to become known sufficiently to gain election.
- 2. Our regional boundaries are not consistent with natural barriers, such as, mountain ranges and thus make collaboration difficult on a regional basis. Often this also separates states and groups which traditionally work together because of proximity.
- 3. Because of increased cost of transportation, perhaps smaller regions should be instituted so that meetings will necessitate less travel distance and not necessitate flying.

The groups which have verbalized requests for changes are as follows:

- 1. Ohio wishes to be associated with Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky and Michigan because of the natural barrier of the Allegheny Mountains and traditional ties to the Mid-west.
- 2. It was suggested that Western states East of the Rocky Mountains be joined into a new region to include Minnesota and other states not closely tied to the Chicago Institute.
- 3. New Jersey members have expressed a desire to be associated with New York.
- 4. Virginia has expressed desire to be in the same region as Washington, D.C.

It is recognized that there may be difference of opinion in members of the states mentioned, and therefore it was suggested that a study and a survey be conducted.
