PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear fellow members:

Our Semi-Annual Meeting in Boise, Idaho will find changes. More time than previously has been set aside for Delegate Assembly and Committee meetings. We are hoping that the added time will enable us to have more opportunity for additional creativity and problem-solving and give the Delegate Assembly an opportunity to get input from the newly formed President's Advisory Committee, consisting of Past Presidents. Committee meetings are given considerably more time and more flexibility so that various committees can choose to meet together for portions of their agenda. The Ad hoc Committee for the '80's is scheduled to meet without conflict from other committee meetings since that sharing of ideas will have impact and influence over virtually every other committee meeting.

Some disappointing news: the income from our Annual Convention in Amherst, Massachusetts, was less than budgeted and currently NASAP is experiencing a cash flow problem and a deficit of approximately \$3,000.00. The Executive Committee, in last month's conference call, therefore decided that the proposed dues increase

is necessary and a \$5.00 increase will accrue to all categories. In addition, regions and local groups have been and are being asked to make contributions to the Society. The new dues notification will have a request for contributions. Names of contributors will be printed in the Newsletter.

Now some good news: the new Mosak Bibliography funding request has been met due to the generosity of many contributors, including the International Society of Adlerian Psychology. News of its publication date and availability will be forthcoming. Porothy Peven, Chair-person of the committee exploring the formation of a section for clinicians, has held several meetings with clinicians to gather ideas for presentation to the Ad hoc Committee for the 80's. One of the ideas is to hold another congress as was held in 1972. That congress brought about the changes which resulted in NASAP's growth and development over the past eight years. NASAP has come a long way and is developing in many exciting areas. The future is unlimited; we hope to see many of you in Boise so we can plan together.

LETTERS TO EDITOR

Chicago, IL--

Dear Members:

When I resigned from the Society, I did so quietly because I did not wish to disrupt the Society in any way. I made my reasons known only to the President, Edna Nash, and three or four of my friends. Since my resignation became a matter of public knowledge at the recent convention, numerous rumors have reached me about my reasons and my plans. People have quoted me and attributed certain views to me. They have agreed with my stand and disagreed with it—without knowing what my stand is, since I have only discussed it with three or four people.

- So, to clear up some of these rumors, I will say this:
- 1. While I don't believe there is sufficient clinical emphasis in NASAP, I did not resign for that reason. Some members, pointing to some of the clinical workshops at Amherst, have argued that now that this has occurred, I should now re-apply for membership. They might look at the Boise program; but I reiterate, that is not the reason.
- $2.\ \ \text{I}$ did not resign because the Society owes me money which it refuses to pay. How that rumor got started eludes me.
- 3. I did not resign to form $\ensuremath{\mathsf{my}}$ own organization.
- 4. My resignation does not mean, as some people have indicated, that I have ceased to be an Adlerian. I continue to identify myself as an Adlerian. I still plan to continue my practice as an Adlerian therapist, to write, to spread the Adlerian "gospel" every weekend of the school year at some university, hospital, clinical or Adlerian society, and to help bring into existence at the Alfred Adler Institute of Chicago our proposed Ph.D. program.
 - 5. Rumors to the contrary, I did not

Radio Programs

One of the most effective means of letting people know about Adlerian ideas and of helping them with relationship problems is through both AM and FM radio programs. We have reached hundreds of thousands of listeners in the past 15 years in the greater St. Louis area. Tom Allen, Bill Little and I (Cameron Meredith) have done hundreds of one-hour "At Your Service" live call-in programs on our St. Louis clear channel station KMOX (1120). The listening audience is as high as 250,000. KMOX can be heard coast to coast at night. Bill Little is often on at 11:00 P.M. (CST) Thursdays. Tune in and give him a call.

In the late 60's, Fred Crimenger, our station director, and I made 100 fifteen-minute tapes in our WSIE-FM studio at Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville on "Parent and Child." These tapes were aired by dozens of radio stations both in Illinois and Missouri. They were eager to receive such material. When used on call-in programs, I would appear live periodically to respond to callers. The National Public Radio Network expressed an interest in the tapes. We edited them down to five minutes and they were aired weekly for two years on hundreds of AM and FM NPR stations.

Even small FM radio stations reach thousands of people. We are in our fourth year of a one-hour weekly call-in program on Marriage and Family over WSIE-FM. We are live on Tuesdays at 10:30 A.M. and on tape Thursday at 7:00 P.M. We are often surprised at how many people listen in.

Now is the time for us Adlerians to become more involved in radio programs. Programs of 2 and 3 hours are becoming increasingly popular seven days a week. It is an educational and therapeutic venture and we know we have ideas and techniques which really help. It is one way to show our social interest and to make a unique contribution to people who are looking desperately for better ways to relate to their spouses and their children.
