PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear fellow members:

The semi-annual meeting in Boise was a very positive experience. I will try to list some of the accomplishments. However, the positive experience was much more than decisions; it was the enthusiasm, mutual respect and camaraderie of those present.

As mentioned in the last Newsletter, two full days were taken for Delegate Assembly deliberation. The first day considerable time was allotted for the Ad Hoc Committee for the 80's which enabled all of us to look at the goals, purposes and concerns of the membership as a whole. While many ideas were presented, it was decided early on not to make decisions or motions, but to deliberate and give time for all suggestions. Hopefully, specific recommendations based on those concerns will be brought up for vote and further debate in Cleveland. Far-reaching changes were discussed, such as: other ways of choosing our Delegate Assembly, giving regions much more freedom in how they select their Delegate Assembly persons; and the establishment of sections in other areas of interest, such as Family and Marital Counseling. Frank Main is currently starting petitions establishing such a section.

The computerized Adlerian Research Bureau is now in operation at the University of South Dakota. While the number of articles abstracted is limited, additions are constantly being made. The Delegate Assembly voted to explore the possibility of establishing an Adlerian college which would utilize present training centers, universities, colleges and individuals around the country who could teach and supervise persons wanting to gain certification in Adlerian Psychotherapy, Marriage and Family Therapy, or Family Education. The section for clinicians was asked to prepare procedures, requirements and guidelines for the education committee for certification in psychotherapy. The Adlerian college would make it possible for individuals in most areas of

the North American continent to gain credits toward certification.

National Media: We received the good news that Lynn Lott of Santa Rosa, California has been interviewed on the Donahue Show with a family whom she has in counseling. This program is currently being shown around the country, and the central office has a schedule of when and in what cities. It is our understanding that she will also be interviewed on the Today Show at a later time.

The excursion for family physicians to Ixtapa, Mexico, entitled Applied Adlerian Psychology, is now being publicized in an attractive brochure. The members should have received their copies, and if any of you have access to mailing lists of family practitioners, psychiatrists or psychologists, this would be helpful in expanding the exposure to this program.

One of the most exciting developments of the Delegate Assembly was the decision to begin a fund-raising drive. Rex Corfman, who had helped the Chicago Alfred Adler Institute increase their donations ten-fold in the last year, made some specific suggestions to NASAP. The suggestion was first to conduct the fund-raising drive among the membership to ease the current financial deficit. However, then to use the commitment demonstrated by the membership as an example to foundations and corporations in order to gain funding from these sources. The Delegate Assembly enthusiastically supported such a program, and the Delegates present pledged over \$5,600. This sum exceeded the total donations of the whole Society last year. Seven Delegate Assembly persons made pledges of \$500 or more. The fund-raising drive will continue. The atmosphere created by statements attesting to the inspiration, growth and friendship gained through the association was truly an uplifting experience. I urge the whole membership to share that experience.

IN TRIBUTE-----Marguerite Beecher

No matter what the circumstances of its arrival, I always mourn and marvel at death's suddenness and finality. The shock of Margo's departure came to me with a penciled scrawl, "Deceased", almost masked by the heavy stamp "Return to Sender".

I missed seeing Margo after my Staten Island workshop in May. According to her last letter Margo was moving to a smaller apartment, still struggling with the unending task of saying goodbye forever to Willard's memories and searching for a publisher for Willard's collected papers. Over the years we kept in touch through our common concerns about institutionalized insanities and court hostilities and the pain of the helpless and the innocent, especially those co-persons, our animals. Like Willard, Margo was ever-seeking instrumental ways of communicating the destructive effects of "mistaken certainties" and "putting

other heads higher". Unfortunately for all concerned, they chose to avoid all institutional trappings, even with those who struggled to cooperate-as-equals.

I have always admired "old time" Adlerians' concern for the other and ability to forgo using personal predicaments for ego gains. Margo was such a person. Seldom did reports of her own pains and injuries intrude upon her wise efforts to keep me free from my own ego-constrictions.

I have committed to memory the quote Margo sent after our dog died. To me, it is a glimpse into Margo's soul and is an epitaph she would truly appreciate, I know.

*"Oh, God, my Master, should I gain
the grace to see thee face-to-face
when life is ended, grant that a
little dog who once pretended that
I was God, may see me face-to-face."

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IN TRIBUTE-----Hertha Orgler

Hertha Orgler, author of ALFRED ADLER--THE MAN AND HIS WORK, died at the age of 89 in January of this year. *Toni Towns* wrote of Mrs. Orgler "She always continued to do such wonderful work, even with failing health, to further the cause of Adlerian psychology in England, and I myself have very much to feel thankful to her for--both personally and professionally."

The Adlerian Society of Great Britain has decided to mark their appreciation and affection for her by inaugurating the *Hertha Orgler Memorial Lecture*, to be given each year on the occasion of their April public meeting. On April 7, 1981, their President, *Dr. Neil Beattie*, will give the first of these under the title "What of the Future?"

It was also decided to offer annually the *Hertha Orgler Essay Prize* of 10 pounds for the best paper submitted on an Adlerian topic. While thus paying homage to a great and much loved "standard bearer of Individual Psychology" (to quote Adler), they hope also to foster greater interest and study in Individual Psychology.

Very dear to Mrs. Orgler's heart was the setting up in England of an Adlerian Training Institute, and the Council of the British Society feel that their efforts and resources should now be directed at least towards systematic training in Adlerian theory and practice. They are, therefore, launching an appeal to their members and friends for donations to help build up the *Hertha Orgler Memorial Fund*. Some contributions have already been received and additional donations will enable the group to further Adlerian training and education.

LETTERS TO EDITOR

Denver, CO--

Fellow Adlerians:

I must put a question to you: If the Society is not serving the Adlerian interests and goals of the 3,000+ educators (and this is just in the Denver area alone) who have taken my Adlerian courses for graduate level credit over the past five years; and, if the Society is not able to meet its financial needs by continuing to cater to the interests those "other professionals" who comprise the majority of its membership; and, if the majority of professionals in any given area are educators rather than clinicians, perhaps that might lead one to ponder the possibility, ye-even the necessity, of beginning now to recreate our organization into an image which would more closely resemble what Adler seemed to have in mind years ago: to bring his ideas to the people. Since very few people are ever involved in clinical situations, and since almost everyone is involved in a family life and a school life, that means parents and teachers ought to be our primary focus. We ought to do more to encourage the proliferation of training programs for parents as well as for teachers, and that means developing Masters and Doctoral level programs of study for teachers-not just for clinicians, which has been the institutes' only focus for as long as I've been around and before. We need a monthly newsletter filled with helpful ideas for parents and teachers, and we need a reduced fee structure for them which would encourage them to join us. From a strictly practical standpoint, even if it weren't so Adlerian an idea, that is where the greatest number of people are. And if the Society is to remain viable and to grow, it must attract more people, people from every level of professional training, as well as parents who are committed to Adlerian ideals.

Some societies are more Adlerian than others-
me thinks it's time for our core U.S. Society
of Adlerian Psychology to re-create itself in
an even more Adlerian image.

ICASSI Scholarships

Three memorial scholarships are offered to people who attend ICASSI in Winooski, Vermont, and are available not only for U.S. participants, but for those from other countries as well. They cover both tuition and room and board--no travel expenses.

The Rudolf Dreikurs Memorial Scholarship is for a professional person and is chosen on the basis of academic background, leadership potential, commitment for developing a project for promoting Individual Psychology, and a brief description of this project should be included with the request for the scholarship. Applicants are asked to describe their present involvement in Individual Psychology, if any, and to include references.

The Ruth Holger-Nielsen Memorial Scholarship

is offered for a lay person and is based on leadership potential, past and present involvement in Individual Psychology, and a proposal for a project is to be submitted along with the request. References should also be included.

The W. L. "Bill" Pew Memorial Scholarship is offered for a graduate student and is given on the basis of leadership potential, commitment for developing a project in the community or university, or conducting some action research in Individual Psychology. A brief description of the proposal should be included as well as present involvement in Individual Psychology, if any. References should be included.

Tuition Only Scholarships are offered at \$250 each. Four of these tuition scholarships will be awarded in the United States, four in Canada, four in Europe, four in Greece, and four in Israel.

The fourteenth Rudolph Dreikurs Summer Institute - ICASSI '81 will be held at St. Michael's College in Winooski, Vermont, U.S.A., August 2-16, 1981.

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Alcoholism Course Available

Helen Cooley, who will be presenting her course on the Nature and Treatment of Alcoholism for the third season at the Alfred Adler Institute of Chicago, would like to teach this course for other Adlerian Centers. The course is unique in the field of alcoholism training, in that it synthesizes the traditional treatment approach of Alcoholics' Anonymous with solid Adlerian philosophy and techniques. Of special interest is the use of mileau therapy along with psychotherapy. How to utilize dance, body movement sessions, as well as art sessions with a treatment program for alcoholics will be presented. Besides techniques for treatment, practical program development methods will be presented. Ms. Cooley has had experience in designing and operating education and rehab programs in high schools, hospitals, as well as in private practice.

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New Game

A new game that teaches children the importance of sound nutrition habits has been invented by a University of Missouri home economics specialist. Called the *Great Plant Race*, the game painlessly instructs players in the part each essential nutrient plays in developing both physical and mental health. Two versions: one for children under nine, the other for nine to 12-year-olds.

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Action Items from Delegate Assembly Meeting November 5-7

Delegate Election

Maurice Ouellet, Vermont, Region V, resigned from the Delegate Assembly. Marion Balla of Ottawa, Ontario was elected to fill out the remainder of the term until 1982.

Finances

Because of rising costs due to inflation, dues for 1981 were increased \$5 in each category.

The Financial Report for 1980 was accepted. Once again, expenses were greater than income, and there will be a slight deficit and no contingency fund.

The proposed 1981 budget was approved. The projected income will be slightly greater than the projected expenses, but there will be no contingency fund to carry over for 1982.

A Fund Raising proposal was adopted, as reported elsewhere in the Newsletter. It was agreed that part of the \$1,000 earmarked for fund raising from the Clonick Estate be used to employ Rex Corfman to help with the 1981 Fund Raising Drive.

Education Committee

Motion was passed to establish the following general procedures for certification of members of a special interest section: That each special interest section establish its own guidelines and requirements for certification; that these requirements and guidelines be submitted to the Education Committee for review and recommendation to the D.A. of NASAP. The D.A. will then take action upon the recommendation; approval of certification procedures will require acceptance by two-thirds of the quorum present.

The Adlerian Research Bureau will be ready for use in January, 1981. The D.A. approved a charge of \$10 per search with no charge for storage of material.

Convention/Workshop

A change was approved in the profit split for the Semi-Annual meeting: Saturday session--25% for NASAP, 75% for host (formerly 100% host), effective fall of 1982.

1982 Annual Convention--Accepted invitation of Family Education Center of Petaluma, CA to host the 1982 convention, June 10-14, 1982, at the El Rancho Tropicana, Santa Rosa, CA.

1982 Semi-Annual Meeting--Open

1983 Annual Convention--Accepted the invitation of the Boulder, CO group to host the 1983 convention.

Public Relations

It was agreed to grant a one-year membership in NASAP annually to four people in North America

whose beliefs and principles are compatible with Adlerian Psychology.

The D.A. authorized the purchase of 50 copies of the reel-to-reel master tape of radio spot announcements plus ten cassette copies; to be offered for sale through the Newsletter at a cost of \$7 per tape. The maximum amount to be spent will be the \$400 still remaining in the Clonick Estate fund for the spot announcements.

The Executive Secretary was authorized to pursue the possibility of securing a public relations consultant from the Executive Services Corps in Chicago, if available on a volunteer basis.

Development

The committee recommended that leadership development activities be included in each annual and semi-annual meeting.

The committee further recommended that an evaluation plan for workshops be established to develop quality offerings.

Publications

Change-over of name of journals will take place in 1982 instead of 1981.

It was agreed that fliers or other printed matter on events not sponsored by NASAP should not be included in Newsletter mailings.

IAIP Filming Project

The D.A. endorsed the IAIP Filming Project and will help arrange for filming of Adlerians at the Cleveland convention.
