Workshops will have programs for psychotherapy, marriage and family counseling, personal growth and educators. The authors will be present to discuss their publications or for just plain camaraderie. Alexander Adler, M.D., will give the opening address of the Convention. 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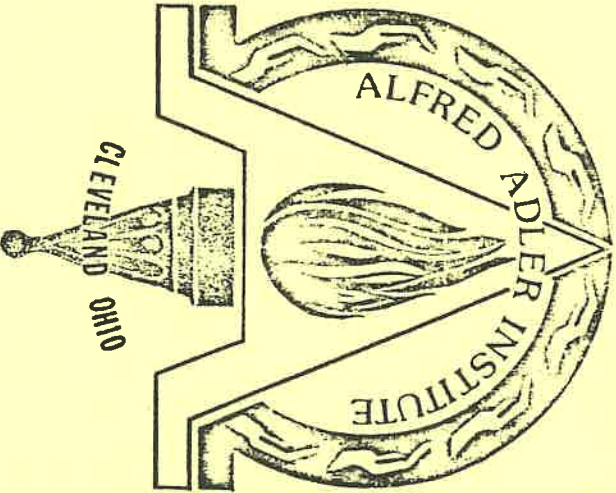

AD HOC COMMITTEE FOR THE 80's

Want to Stimulate Your Next Meeting?

Here is a way you can insure that your next Adlerian meeting is full of excitement and a dynamic sharing of ideas. It also could be a way of helping chart a course for the NASAP ad hoc "Committee on the 1980's."

It would be most helpful to us if you could set aside at least 10-20 minutes of your next meeting to explore your group's concerns and suggestions for NASAP as we enter the 1980's. We could suggest the following brainstorming procedure to help your group focus its thoughts in a systematic way:

1. Ask members to close their eyes and focus on what the ideal/perfect NASAP would look like. (If people don't want to close their eyes that's o.k. - some people think better with their eyes open.) Give people a few minutes to describe to themselves what the ideal NASAP would be all about. What would it be doing? Who would be the members? What issues would dominate its meetings or conventions in, say 1983? Give people an opportunity to let their thoughts rise into the future.

2. After this, brainstorm your group's concerns for NASAP. (Visualizing the ideal NASAP helps people focus on goals for the future and gives rise to concerns/ideas without value judgement. The idea is to collect as many ideas and concerns as possible in a set period of time (at least 10 minutes).

3. Once your list is complete, restate the list (combining some items as appropriate) and ask the entire group to prioritize them. Do this by asking each person to list his/her top five most important concerns ranked in order of priority from 5 to 1 (5 being the most important). Collate these responses and share with the group what appear to be the major areas of concern.

Send this material to me, John Symynkywicz, 126 West School Street, Woonsocket, RI 02895. We need your group's ideas and suggestions. This also can be helpful to your own local group in sorting out your own priorities...

A three page brief on the work of the ad hoc Committee on the 1980's is available from John Symynkywicz. We are planning to set aside 1 1/2 hours for a presentation/report by the Committee at the NASAP annual meeting which can move the planning process even further. Right now we are still fact finding, and we need your ideas. Together we can chart a bright future for the spread of Adlerian ideas across Canada and the United States.

"How do we learn to be involved in a meeting where we begin where we are and not rush off into the future? How do we encourage the social interest of ourselves to focus on the task at hand...We need more practice in agreement." (Anonymous suggestion at General Assembly session, June 14, 1980.)
