PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear fellow members:

NASAP conventions held in Canada are something special! The Semi-Annual Meeting in Ottawa was no exception. From all aspects it was a success. Approximately 450 people attended, the hotel and service was superb, the food at the hotel also was excellent. We were within walking distance of the Parliament Buildings and the down town shopping center. Even the weather cooperated with unseasonably warm, pleasant, sunny weather. NASAP owes Marian Balla and her committee a hearty vote of thanks for the superb job of organization. There were TV and radio interviews with Frank Walton, Oscar Christensen and myself. Local people were interviewed for a week prior to the convention. There was even a reception graciously hosted by Governor General Schreyer at his home. The Semi-Annual Meeting was indeed a memorable experience.

Some important steps were taken by the D.A.

1. The proposed dues change was adopted--this abolishes the sliding scale but establishes a Sustaining Membership fee that covers the cost of services provided. It is hoped to have a budget that does not rely on contributions for operating expenses.

2. It was voted to continue fund raising efforts for this next year; however, for specific projects which may be designated by the donor.

3. The D.A. favored a proposal to support the establishment of family education centers on Air Force bases as suggested by Dick Betts.

4. The Publications Committee moved and the D.A. voted that abstracts of all papers and summaries of presentations given at the Annual NASAP Convention be published in the *Journal*.

5. The D.A. also decided to continue to have Semi-Annual Meetings associated with a convention and presentations.

6. The Public Relations Committee agreed to develop further the idea of having a NASAP sponsored newsletter for parent educators based on Ken Marlin's Parent Educators' Exchange.


Joe Meiers, M.D., has asked NASAP to obtain copies of Heinz Ansbacher's article in the *Archives of General Psychiatry*, which introduced Adler's preface to Nijinsky's Diary, and distribute them to each of the local groups and to the five regional committees.

Quoting Dr. Meiers, "The reason why I consider the excellence of Adler's preface and its potential usefulness for strengthening NASAP in the U.S. and Canada so highly is that Dr. Ansbacher has been able to bring out, in his commentary, several important points: 1) that Adler was the only one who some 50 years ago dared to tackle the potential role of psychotherapy even in paranoid schizophrenia, when no medicines were known; 2) that he, then too, adumbrated the underlying genetic part of the illness; 3) that the follow-up as shown by Ansbacher quite perceptively justified Adler's recommendation of cooperative support in any possible psychotherapy." Dr. Meiers further points out that "it is remarkable that the *Archives'* editor, who heretofore never appeared inclined toward Adlerian matters, in this case gave so much space and interest to an outspoken Adlerian article."

The Executive Committee endorsed Dr. Meiers' suggestion and copies of the article will be obtained from Heinz Ansbacher and distributed to local groups, regions and to people holding academic positions with the suggestion that they may wish additional copies to distribute to students.

I wish to thank Dr. Meiers for his suggestion and for reminding NASAP last year that this coming year is our 30th anniversary. Preparations are being made to commemorate the event.

Word from Manford Sonstegard on his travels--
