

Fort Wayne--A new position has been added to the private practice of Dr. Ron Pancner in Fort Wayne, the position of "psychologist intern." It provides one of the few opportunities for someone trained in Adlerian Psychology to receive "hands on" clinical experience.

The first intern is Steve Langenfeld, who completed his doctoral studies at the University of South Dakota under the direction of Frank Main. He reports that most of his time is spent on the 38-bed psychiatric unit of Lutheran Hospital. The internship provides contact with patients suffering from a wide range of difficulties from situational stress to schizophrenia. Some of the experience offered by this position include the following: interviewing patients upon admission to the hospital, accompanying the psychiatrist on daily rounds, assisting in group therapy, interviewing relatives of patients, administering psy-chological tests, life style assessments, and selected individual therapy. In addition to the hospital experiences, he has been involved with outpatient group therapy.

The position also provides an opportunity to work with a number of professionals, including two psychiatrists, two psychologists, two therapists, a counselor, social worker, occupational therapists, and nursing staff. Finally, I am involved in parent education through the AAI of Fort Wayne.

STEP Visits the Pacific

The following is a report from <u>Don Dinkmeyer</u>, <u>Sr.</u> on his trip to Japan, New Zealand, and <u>Aus</u>tralia with <u>Don Dinkmeyer</u>, <u>Jr.</u>--

I spoke at a large meeting in Osaka, which is the second largest city in Japan. This was for the purpose of creating an interest in parent education. I then keynoted a large meeting of people who have facilitated growth groups throughout Japan. There was a great interest in the concepts of Encouragement, Parenting and Adlerian Psychology. For two full days, Don, Jr. and I trained 42 leaders in STEP, Parent Education Leader Skills.

The Japanese approach to parent education will be unique. It is going to originally be disseminated through large companies similar to our IBM, Motorola, etc. The plan is that the courses will be made available through the company, perhaps on company time or as an added fringe benefit. The anticipation is that this methodology will move STEP rapidly through Tokyo and eventually other parts of the country.

The program STEP has already been translated, and our appearance there was based on stimulating interest. I had a large number of newspaper interviews with publications such as Time, the Japanese Betten Homes and Gardens, etc., as well as the 5 or 6 major newspapers in Tokyo. There is a great interest in learning more about the concepts that I presented, and eventually we may devevlop a summer training program.

The contact in Australia was with the Australian Council for Educational Research, which is the publisher of STEP in Australia. I was informed that STEP is now the number one parent education program in Australia as it has received official support. I met with the Director of the Association for Family Living and the Editor of the Australian Journal of Marital and Family Therapy. Australia, of course, has already had Adlerian contacts through Mike Nystul and Ray Lowe, and I found the climate for the ideas very receptive.

In New Zealand, there is some dissemination of parent education but it is a rural country and not too much has occurred at this time.
