PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The 30th Annual Convention of NASAP in Santa Rosa is rapidly approaching. We can look forward to visiting the sunny wine country of northern California, for some learning, some sharing, some comradeship, some relaxing and sightseeing. However, now is the time for some preparation. Now is the time to send in agenda items for the Delegate Assembly and/or the appropriate Standing Committees.

One agenda item that will be discussed is the possibility of changing regional boundaries and even creating a greater number of regions. At the last Delegate Assembly meeting, Jim Bitter served notice that he will propose that Region I--Far West be divided into two regions. We were grieved to hear the news that Paul Rom, long the Editor of *IPNL*, organ of the International Association of Individual Psychology, died at the age of 79. Paul has been a dedicated, hard-working contributor devoted to Adlerian ideas. He will be sorely missed.

It is also the time of the year when the new Membership Directory is being readied to go to the press. There are still members who have not renewed their membership. Perhaps we can encourage those members in our own areas to send their dues. I personally find the Direc-

tory useful in referring friends and patients who are relocating, as well as a way of contacting people. It is regrettable that some of us put off renewal until it is too late to be included in the Directory.

We received the good news that NASAP has been given a grant to develop presentations for the purpose of obtaining corporate gifts. Sydney Roth has personally made this contribution in order to aid NASAP in broadening its base of funding. Again, our thanks to Sydney for his good encouragement, support and guidance.

From a brochure describing the 4th Annual Conference of the University of Wisconsin-White-water on the topic, *Issues in the Treatment of Those Who Are Different*, it was noted that Rollo May, Ph.D., one of the speakers, is described as follows: "The most widely recognized exponent of Existential Therapy writing today. A student of Alfred Adler." This is the first time that I can remember anyone being cited as a student of Alfred Adler in recent times. This may signify a greater acceptance among mainstream psychologists and psychiatrists of Adlerian ideas or it could represent increased interest because of Heinz Ansbacher's recent article in the *Archives of Psychiatry*, mentioned in earlier newsletters. In any case, it confirms Adler's influence on Rollo May and his writings.

1. *Individual Psychology: Theory and Practice*, by Guy J. Manaster and Raymond J. Corsini, 336 pgs., \$12.50 paper, F.E. Peacock Publishers, Inc., 115 N. Prospect Ave., Itasca, IL 60143.

This is an introductory text to Adlerian Psychology, introducing the basic concepts, tracing its history and current status as a base for explanations of the biological, social and individual dynamics of personality, and the development, maintenance and types of structure of personality. In these explanations Adler's main concepts, such as inferiority and compensation, social interest, cooperation, life tasks, movement, strivings, and goals, are elaborated to their contemporary meanings and integrated into a complete statement of Adlerian theory.

The theory then stands as a base for descriptions of the processes and goals of the prac-

tice of Adlerian Psychology in psychotherapy and counseling individuals and groups, families and couples, and education from an individual, classroom and school level. Ending with a case study and an Appendix of abstracts of research in Adlerian Psychology, the book covers the full spectrum of thought and activity in Adlerian Psychology.

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2. *Adlerian Counseling: Proven Concepts and Strategies*. 2nd Edition, Thomas J. Sweeney, 318 pgs., \$13.45 paper, Accelerated Development, Inc. 2515 W. Jackson, Muncie, IN 47303.

The author, an experienced Adlerian counselor, has applied concepts to situations in counseling and consultation in family, career education, and in other group procedures. His first edition was well received. In this second edition he has retained those concepts so clearly stated and has expanded the Adlerian strategies to illustrate application in a wider range of everyday life.

There is a complete typescript of an Adlerian counselor conducting a family interview and another typescript of family council so that the reader can gain a better understanding of applied Adlerian concepts and strategies. Natural and logical consequences, purposes for disruptive behavior of individuals of all ages, principles of encouragement are some of the areas covered by this publication.
