PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear fellow members:

The Executive Committee met via conference call in late March. Among the issues raised was that the recent change in our dues structure has netted an increase of income of 9%. However, the bad news is that we projected a 22% increase from dues. Therefore, at this point in time our income is not meeting budgetary goals. Thus far, ninety-one (91) of our members dropped to the Participating from the Sustaining category and we have seventy-nine (79) fewer memberships compared to a similar period last year. Part of this may reflect a tighter economy. There is concern that if the trend continues it may lead to cash flow problems in July or August. The central office will obtain computerized lists by region of those members who have not renewed their memberships so that there can be follow-up by the Delegate Assembly persons in their own locale.

Another point is that \$10,000 was budgeted to be received from contributions and undesignated contributions to date have totalled \$1,600.

Marion Balla is making plans for a fund raising effort although plans have not been finalized at this time. Designated gifts are, of course, also welcomed. Two suggestions that would help NASAP budget are designated gifts toward the *Membership Directory* and the *Newsletter*.

Work is still being done to develop formal presentations to enable NASAP to apply for funding from foundations. However, grants take time and are long term projects so offer no immediate remedy to the anticipated cash bind.

This is a last minute reminder to make travel arrangements to the 30th Annual Convention of NASAP in Santa Rosa, California. Usually considerable savings can be obtained by making reservations at least thirty (30) days prior to departure. I am looking forward to renewing old friendships, hard work, and emotional and professional growth. See you in Santa Rosa.

In Memoriam PAUL ROM, 1901-1982

Paul Rom was for thirty years editor of the bi-monthly *Individual Psychology News Letter (IPNL)*, which he founded in 1951 and which was published by the International Association of Individual Psychology. His term ended by his sudden death on February 23, 1982. On March 2 he would have celebrated his 80th birthday.

Through the *IPNL* and its friendly tone, Paul became so-to-speak a key person in Individual Psychology. For many Adlerians a trip to England became unthinkable without a visit to Paul and his helpful wife, Elfriede, at their bungalow in London, which was very dear to him. He died in Israel where the Roms had been spending the winter months for a number of years, although only his wife was Jewish. Paul's death is an immeasurable loss to Individual Psychology.

Born in Breslau, Silesia, Paul was from 1927-1933 a high school teacher near Dresden. The reading of Adler's *Understanding Human Nature*, which had just appeared, brought him to the intensive study of the theory and practice of Individual Psychology, including a "training analysis" with Dr. Hugo Freund, a student of Adler's. Paul first met Adler at the 5th International Congress of Individual Psychology in Berlin in 1930. At the ascent of Hitler, Paul was jailed for three months for political reasons. He had been a member of the independent socialist party, being of the third generation in a family of socialists. After his release came thirteen years as an emigre: tutoring in Athens, studying in Paris at the Sorbonne, joining the Foreign Legion at the outbreak of the war, spending years in a concentration camp in the Sahara desert under the Vichy regime, and after the liberation of North Africa, joining the British and American

soldiers in Italy. In 1946 he settled in London as teacher, writer and psychotherapist.

Writing had been Paul's flair from his youth, beginning with feuilleteons for socialist news papers. He wrote his first book, on Adlerian psychology, in French, while in the Sahara concentration camp. Between 1966 and 1981 he published five more, popular books, in German; four on Adlerian psychology and one on Freud. Beyond this, over 700 entries under his name are listed in the Mosak *Bibliography* of 1975, mostly the small items which he provided for the IPNL. Paul was a member of PEN, the International Association of Poets, Playwrights, Editors, Essayists and Novelists. But he was also fascinated by music. He remembered going as a youth to the nearby cathedral to listen to the weekly rehearsals of its famous boys' choir. In his last year he wrote "Now, near eighty, I sometimes feel 'like in paradise' when listening to a record of Bach's *Musical Offering*. This mighty, unearthly, absolute music fills me with indescribable joy....I feel a spiritual brother of great poets and composers."

Paul related that Adler once told him on occasion, "All my life I strove to bring people together." Paul valued these simple words "like a personal legacy." As a fitting way to honor the memory of Paul Rom, we may take these words as his legacy to us--"to bring people together."

- 6. Newly elected Delegates shall be seated at the beginning of the meeting of the Delegate Assembly.

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Well-Travelled Contribution

A check was received in the mail in early April for a contribution to the 1981 Fund Raising Drive that had been on its way since October 13, 1981. It was sent by Manford Sonstegard from Edlesborough, England to Sylvia Robbins at 159 N. Dearborn, Chicago. Since NASAP did not appear on the address, it was not delivered to this office but was returned to England. It was received in England on 3-17-82--QUESTION: which little slot in Chicago post office housed that letter from October 1981 until March 1982???

At any rate, it was prompt service after the March 17 date. The people at the England address sent it on to Sonstegard in West Virginia; he sent it to Sylvia in New York and she sent it to NASAP. A persistent and well-travelled contribution--thanks to all who had a hand in the contribution arriving at its final destination!!!

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The following article by Heinz Ansbacher was printed in the "On the Other Hand" section of Contemporary Psychology, the book review monthly of the American Psychological Association and is printed here for your information and perhaps amusement!

On a false Adler anecdote in recent personality textbooks

There are (a) an anecdote about Freud referring to Alfred Adler and (b) one on William Stekel and Freud, which (c) were apparently merged into a false anecdote about Adler. This false anecdote has found its way into at least two, otherwise excellent, recent textbooks of personality theories, one by Schultz (1981, p. 78), the other by Hjelle and Ziegler (1981, p. 75). My purpose is to point out and document the error, in the hope that it may be recognized as such and no longer be repeated.

(a) In the first anecdote, which has been reported by Wittels (1924), Freud remarked to Stekel about Adler, after the latter had

separated from Freud: "I have made a pigmy great" (p. 225). Puner (1947) repeated: "Of Adler, after his secession, Freud had made in private conversation a typically Old Man remark: 'I have made a pigmy great,' he said" (1949, p. 175). This reputed comment by Freud is quite plausible, it being in line with his reflection at the time of Adler's death in 1937, when he wrote to Arnold Zweig: "The world really rewarded Adler richly for his service in having contradicted psychoanalysis" (Jones, 1957, p. 208).

(b) The anecdote regarding Stekel is reported in two quite different forms, that, however, share Stekel's half-modest claim to recognition. In the first version--by Carl Furtmüller, Adler's closest friend--Freud's reply is rather good-natured, whereas in the second version--by Ernest Jones, Freud's biographer--Freud's reply is very sarcastic. Furtmüller (1946, pp. 309-394) wrote:

One evening, both Adler and Stekel expressed independent views--independent from each other's, as well. Freud answered with some irritation. Adler always strictly avoided deviation into the personal field, but Stekel thought that for once he would express the admiration everyone felt for Freud in the style established by the extremists. He compared himself to a sparrow which had been carried by an eagle skyward and when the eagle was at the top of its flight tried a few yards more for himself. Freud's answer was, he now saw that the vice-president (Stekel) was willing to accord him a first-class funeral while the president [Adler] thought a routine funeral would be good enough. (pp. 343-344)

Jones's (1955) story reads:

Stekel's success in the field of symbolism made him feel he had surpassed Freud. He was fond of expressing this estimate of himself half modestly by saying that a dwarf on the shoulder of a giant could see farther than the giant himself. When Freud heard this he grimly commented: "That may be true, but a louse on the head of an astronomer does not." (p. 136)

(c) Subsequently, Selesnick (1966, pp. 76-86) apparently merged Freud's statement about Adler, on the one hand, with Stekel's reputed statement about himself and Freud's reply, on the other hand, replacing Stekel's name with that of Adler. The anecdote in its merged and distorted form thus reads as follows:

Freud later referred to Adler as a "pigmy," saying, "I made a pigmy great." In turn, Adler countered that even a "pigmy" perched on the shoulders of a "great giant" could see farther than his supporter. When Freud heard of this statement, he chided that this might be true of a pigmy but not of a louse in the giant's hair. (p. 83)

From the internal evidence alone the first two anecdotes must be given the greater credence. But they also somehow do justice to the individuals concerned, whereas the third anecdote

is quite contrary to Adler's personality. Adler would not, even in jest, have referred to himself as a pigmy. He had a good deal of self-esteem and took himself seriously. Self-deprecation was foreign to him. The reason why Selesnick could go so amiss with his anecdote is probably that, born in 1925, he could not possibly have had first-hand knowledge of Adler who died in 1937. However, three of the authors of the first two anecdotes, Furtmüller, Jones, and Wittels, were contemporaries of the individuals concerned and had frequent close contact with them. Selesnick's error is all the more deplorable as it detracts from Adler. Unfortunately, Selesnick died at the young age of 42 in 1967, so that no further clarification with him was possible.
