Convention Reaction

Washington, D.C.
June, 1982

I would like to share some thoughts with you
regarding our 30th conference recently held in
Santa Rosa, California.

On the bright side, I met many warm and friend-
ly people whose kindness and social interest
were more than considerable. The accommoda-
tions, too, I found first rate.

It is my belief that our annual conference
should promote and encourage the ideologies of
Alfred Adler and Rudolf Dreikurs, as well as be
a forum for new ideas and directions that can
be explored using their ideas as a foundation.

Unfortunately, many of the programs I attended
seemed to me to radically depart from such a
foundation. Some programs were heavily influ-
enced by Eastern philosophies, psychoanalytic
theories, or other more popular current theo-
ries. It would be acceptable to me if such
programs are shown to be reasonably connected
to our basic tenets. However, it was obvious
that some presenters were basically or totally
unfamiliar with the teachings of Adler and
Dreikurs.

Of course, we need to be open to new ideas and
change, but I believe we can go too far and
lose sight of our goals. Dreikurs himself, as
well as other founders of NASAP, would not
have recognized nor appreciated much that was
presented.

I strongly recommend that papers and workshop
abstracts for future conferences be adequately
screened for relevance to Adlerian/Dreikursian
principles before they are accepted into the
conference program. Such screening can be
performed by a group appointed or elected by
NASAP officers. If standards for relevance do
not exist, I urge that they be formulated. If
they already exist, I urge that they be applied
more strictly in the future.

Distinguished Lecture

Corporation Book Chosen by Two Book Clubs

NASAP member Allan J. Cox is author of *The Cox Report on the American Corporation*, to be published in late October by Delacorte Press. The book answers five main questions: 1) What do corporations value? 2) How do corporations function? 3) How do corporations succeed and fail? 4) What are executives like? 5) How do executives succeed?

Treating these questions in depth, and presenting more than its share of surprises, *The Cox Report* is based on survey results from a 400-plus item questionnaire given to 1,086 anonymity-assured top and middle executives in 13 major American companies. An astounding 93% response to the questionnaire was received.

The Cox Report is a Fortune Book Club main selection and Book-of-the-Month Club alternate. Cox, a Chicago-based management consultant, is a member of the Community Advisory Board of The Americas Institute of Adlerian Studies.

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Single Father Research Grant

Ann Parks, NASAP member, writes that Parents Without Partners, Inc., has been awarded a foundation grant to study fathers who are raising their children alone following separation or divorce.

Research on this fast-growing family style is sorely needed. This project will be the first national research sample and promises to add significantly to the knowledge about fathers raising children alone.

The project involves a questionnaire that has been designed to reveal what supports were/are effective in helping fathers with sole, full-time custody of at least one child 18-years old or younger. The research investigator, Geoffrey L. Greif, MSW, ACSW, is a doctoral candidate at the Columbia University School of Social Work. 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Adler/Dreikurs and Suzuki
