PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear fellow members:

The Executive Committee had a very productive two-day meeting in Chicago August 21-22. Our major efforts were directed twoard the proposed re-organization plan for NASAP written by Guy Manaster. Our ideas are being incorporated into the plan. This revised plan will be submitted to Delegate Assembly members prior to our meeting in Tucson for their advanced study. It is our goal to make final decision on the re-organization plan in Tucson in order to make it operational in 1983. The direction of the re-organization has been reported in earlier newsletters.

The Executive Committee is also moving ahead with arrangements for the publication of a Family Education Manual by Edna M. Nash, Robert Armstrong, Weltha J. Logan, William E. McKelvie, Manford A. Sonstegard. This is the first publication to be published by NASAP utilizing the Seymour E. Clonick Memorial Publication grant.

The Executive Committee is recommending that the central office and the Executive Committee be responsible for organizing convention programs and workshops in the future. Our goal is to provide a quality program that is representative of all sections to enhance members' training and professional growth. The clinical

area has been repeatedly cited as weak in the past. As we approach the task of improving the clinician programs, I would like to quote from a recent letter addressing the issue by Harry A. Olson, Ph.D.

"If we want excellence in clinical programs, we can't sit back and scoff from the sidelines and withdraw our support. Rather, I would urge every disappointed clinician to roll up his or her sleeves and pitch in; to channel dissatisfaction, and perhaps anger, into useful, positive energy for the whole Society's good. We have to set the example ourselves; others won't take the lead if there is no one to model."

To provide clinical programs and workshops, we will need the acceptance and support of our efforts by the clinicians. Ron Pancner has been working dilligently to increase the number of clinical programs for our 1983 convention and will continue to do so for our 1984 convention.

NASAP is at a crossroads. The Executive Commettee and D.A. are committed to providing a sense of direction that is attractive to all members.

My view is that:

(a) uncommitted people are most influenced by the atmosphere of acceptance and openness prevailing at Adlerian conventions rather than by orthodox stance.

I believe that departures from Adlerian foundations allow for fruitful confrontations and may enhance our impact rather than lessen it. In

Parenting In China

Harriett E. Kaplan, Child Psychologist at the University Hospital in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan (Canada), recently visited the People's Republic of China. While there, she gave a seminar to about 75 pediatricians and pediatric nurses at the Pediatric Hospital in Guilin, China. Following her talk, Harriett questioned the Pediatricians regarding current parenting issues in China. The following article written by Harriett discusses several of these issues.

On August 16, 1982, I spoke to a group of 75 pediatricians and pediatric nurses at the Maternity and Child Hospital in Guilin, People's Republic of China on my work in parenting at University Hospital, Saskatoon. The hospital Director, Dr. Min Tseng, a kindly, middle-aged woman, was educated at Yale in China. My talk was translated into Mandarin Chinese, and I was told by the Deputy Director of Public Health for the District, Dr. Mai Wen Kui, a physician educated at Columbia University, that the trans-lation was clear and accurate. This was the first time a psychologist had spoken at the hospital he said. I covered Adlerian theory, our Family In Focus technique, common parenting concerns in the United States and Canada, and suggestions we give to parents. I also mentioned study groups, parent education programs and STEP, as well as suggestions and studies on raising Then, I was allowed to the I.Q. in children. ask questions of the Director, Dr. Tseng.

I was interested in learning more about child rearing methods in China; Dr. Tseng told me that people marry late, the woman usually in her late twenties and the man at about 30 years of age. They are encouraged to have only one child due to China's overpopulation problem. Most people obey this rule, which went into effect a few years ago. Before that, people were allowed two children. There are more problems in enforcing this in the country side; but, in general, extra pregnancies are aborted. Many benefits are taken away from families if a second child is born and social disapproval is strongly expressed.

Regarding child rearing, most people do not move to other localities so the parents are usually close to other family members. Also separation and divorce are not common. Thus, we do not see the one parent or blended family here as a rule. Another difference is that in about 50% of the families, the child is given to the grandmother to raise. This is an old custom, as child rearing is considered an honourable profession for the elderly. Also, it frees the mother to work. Often, women do not nurse their babies very long if the children are being raised by the grandparents. Children usually stay with grandparents until they start school at the age of seven years.

The natural parents might only visit once a week or less (depending on distance and desire) during this time. With regard to the other 50% of the children, the mother is allowed shout six weeks off work after birth, and works only part-time for the first year after she gives birth. The child is then placed in day care. If the mother is lucky, it could be at her place of employment. Unfortunately, China is plagued by similar problems to ours--over-crowded daycare facilities, too few and poorly trained attendants, etc.

Dr. Tseng said parenting is not taught as such in schools; but, pregnant mothers do have their questions answered at prenatal visits. There are some booklets and articles on child rearing. The doctor relies on her own experiences to help new mothers who come with their children for postnatal check-ups once a month for the first three months, then every two months until the age of one year. After that, visits are made twice a year until the child reaches the age of seven years. Another help for parents having child rearing problems is visits by women who successfully raised their own children. These women offer practical advice. Billboards in the park and other public places give child rearing ideas for enrichment; such as, how to teach the child various skills.

The one-child family opens a new era in China. Professionals are concerned as to what will happen with a nation of "only" children and they hope to expand more in psychology to study the effects. It will be most interesting to see how a generation of "only" children will fare and I hope that further research will be allowed in this area.
