PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear fellow members:

It is a pleasure to announce the establishment of a grant by the *Seymour E. Clonick Estate* for the development of Individual Education. The materials to be developed include a one-hour introductory tape. Mr. Sydney Roth presented the check to the Executive Committee at a luncheon on February 6. This grant is the fourth gift awarded to NASAP by the Estate of Seymour E. Clonick. (see p. 6)

The Executive Committee met in Chicago February 5 and 6 for a most productive meeting. In dealing with the 1983 budget we are attempting to maximize our standard income sources, including conventions, membership renewals, and fund raising. We are also exploring new sources of income for NASAP, including publications with NASAP utilizing the Seymour E. Clonick Memorial Publications Grant. We are investigating means to reduce our expenditures, including the possible purchase of a computer for the central office. This would reduce the annual costs of computer services and would have the potential to ease the work load in the central office.

The reorganization proposal is in its final stages with plans to bring necessary By-Law changes for approval to the DA in Boulder, Colorado. In conjunction with this reorganization the Executive Committee is establishing committees to begin work on sectional development.

Regional development is also being encouraged. The DA voted in California to discontinue semi-annual meetings in order to emphasize regional meetings. The DA's decision also took

into account the increasing difficulty for members to attend two conventions per year with increased travel expenses. In addition, it has been difficult to find host groups for the semi-annual meetings. At the present time two regions are having regional meetings-- Region III and Region V. It is hoped that the other regions will schedule meetings.

Tuscon Convention Coordinator, Brenda Even has presented the final check for a total profit to NASAP of \$5,000. We wish to extend sincere appreciation to the Adlerian Society of Arizona and the Adlerian Institute for counseling and Therapy for hosting an excellent semi-annual convention, and for their substantial contribution to NASAP.

A proposal submitted by Frank Walton for a Spring Membership Campaign was approved. Additional information is given in the body of this *Newsletter*.

I'd like to recognize the Executive Committee members: Ron Pancer, Jim Bitter, Marion Balla, Guy Manaster, Don Dinkmeyer, and our Executive Secretary, Neva Hefner. The meeting was both productive and enjoyable because of the great cooperation and willingness of all members to share the responsibilities in conducting the Society's business.

The final reports from Colorado look most inviting. I look forward to seeing you in Boulder for our Annual Convention.

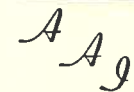

Tribute to Ken Long

"The Death of a Counselor: Ken Long Left a Legacy of Love," so read the headline of a January issue of the *Omaha World Herald*. There followed a tribute to the counselor who "confronted people with love." Although tough-minded, Long "genuinely accepted you for whatever you were and cared about you. The caring didn't end when people went out the door." "Ken lives on in the hearts of those he touched. What he gave can't be taken away." So spoke former clients or colleagues.

According to Maxine Ijams, Ken "almost single-handedly brought the Adlerian concept to Omaha and began to teach it." He was one of the founders of the Nebraska Society of Adlerian Psychology and served as its first president. He was instrumental in developing their training program and the second year program in therapeutic counseling and was providing the impetus for possible development of an Alfred Adler Institute of Nebraska.

Ken died of a heart attack at age 41 and about 250 of his former clients and colleagues came to his funeral because, as many said, "He was my friend." Dick Slama, President of the Nebraska Society of Adlerian Psychology, reports that in spite of their loss of Ken, the Nebraska Society will continue in its efforts to promote and disseminate the philosophy of Individual Psychology and NASAP.

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Book Review

Alfred Adler's book, Co-operation Between the Sexes: Writings on Women, Love and Marriage, Sexuality and Its Disorders, edited and translated by Heinz and Rowena Ansbacher, was the subject of a review in the January, 1983 issue of the *American Psychiatric Association's American Journal of Psychiatry*. The reviewer is Carol Nadelson, M.D., Vice President of the American Psychiatric Association and member of the Department of Psychiatry at Tufts New England Medical Center.

Dr. Nadelson writes that "Ansbacher makes a

strong case for Adler's pivotal position anticipating current feminism...Adler provided an important impetus for the study of the psychology of women and introduced many of the concepts that appear throughout current literature on that topic." Dr. Nadelson goes on to say that "the historical value and currency of much of [Adler's] writing is captivating. The limited data available at the time made it difficult to develop a consistent theoretical position, yet [Adler] effectively integrated a vast quantity of information and clinical data that are rich and insightful." In conclusion, Dr. Nadelman writes, "the book succeeds in intriguing the reader with the scope of Adler's contributions. The editors make it clear, by their selection and comments, that Adler's contributions have been underestimated. He emerges as an innovative and pioneering figure whose contributions have played an important role in shaping current thought and practice."

Region I - Far West

CALIFORNIA

On January 15, the Personnel Accreditation Institute (PAI) of the American Society for Personnel Administration informed AIAS that its programs and courses "fulfill reaccreditation requirements for accredited personnel professionals."

Applicants for PAI accreditation must meet PAI's standards for education and experience and pass comprehensive national examinations. Accredited professionals must be reaccredited every three years by PAI to maintain accreditation.

AIAS is the first Adlerian organization to be approved by PAI for the continuing education of accredited personnel professionals. Those who participate in AIAS Programs and courses will earn 1.4 RU (Reaccreditation Units) per course; or, 1.5 RU per course if they elect to take the course examination.

AAI of Chicago--For each of the past several summers, approximately 300 students have trained at the Institute, combining training in their own locales with one of the programs of the Institute. The 1983 Summer Schedule, designed to meet the preferences of out-of-town students who have been admitted to its programs, will be available in March.
