### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear fellow members:

The Convention in Boulder was a most pleasant and rewarding experience by virtue of the opportunity to visit and study with fellow Adlerians. This opportunity was enhanced by the well organized, smoothly operated convention with its many special touches. I wish to thank Kathy and Bill Kvols-Riedler of the Rudolf Dreikurs Institute of Colorado for hosting NASAP '83 and their able assistant, Linda Wise.

The Delegate Assembly Meeting in Boulder was quite ambitious in its agenda, and through diligent efforts was most productive. The D.A. reviewed the necessary constitutional changes to implement the Reorganization Plan for NASAP. (The Reorganization Plan had previously been approved by the D.A. in Tucson.) The D.A. ratified the numerous constitutional changes, in most instances unani- mously, indicating the strong support of the new directions of NASAP; namely, the establish- ment of sections with sectional representa- tion on the D.A. and support of regional development. These constitutional changes will be submitted to the membership at large and will require a two-thirds vote for ratifica- tion.

The NASAP members who attended the meetings for sectional development shared this enthusiasm. They foresaw sections as an opportunity to connect, to have a stronger influence in their

fields, and to assist in their own development through recommendations for programs and train- ing at our conventions. Several sections formed committees to organize themselves and to write charters.

Regional meetings were also enthusiastic in attempting to establish networking via regional meetings: Region III and V are presently conducting annual meetings; Region IV has scheduled a fall, '83 meeting; Region II has scheduled a fall, '84 meeting; Region I will be divided upon ratification of the new Consitution, which will greatly assist this large region. Region I presently has elected officers and publishes a newsletter.

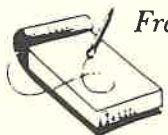

ances to help NASAP carry out its work in North America.

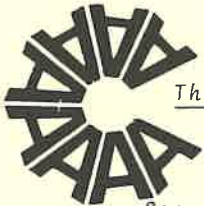

Committee Reports

The Delegate Assembly met May 26-28, 1983, in Boulder, Colorado. Minutes, financial statement and budget are available upon request from the central office. Action items from the various committees follow.

Executive Committee

1. A deficit budget was approved. The deficit will be covered by the cash balance brought forward to 1983 plus the interest received from the Clonick Estate monies and Challenge Grant donations.
2. It was agreed that the Convention/Workshop Committee be responsible for recommending site selection for conventions to the D.A., and all that is involved with that process.
3. It was further agreed that the Executive Committee be the ongoing liaison with the convention host group, including approval of all convention contracts.

Convention/Workshop - Clair Hawes, ch.

1. It was agreed that the Executive Committee member who liaisons with the Convention/Workshop Committee also will be NASAP's liaison with the Convention Program Coordinator.
2. It was agreed that presentors of the Saturday/Sunday programs at a convention will not be considered to be accepted until registration is paid. If the registration is not paid by the deadline set by the program coordinator, the presenter will be contacted, reminded, and a decision made about the presentation.
3. Invitation to hold the 1985 NASAP Convention in Atlanta was accepted.

Development - Sylvia Robbins, Ch.

1. The committee recommended that half-year memberships be discontinued. The matter was tabled.
2. Delegates were asked to contact people in their regions who have not renewed their membership for 1983.

3. It was recommended that an item be printed in the Newsletter that controversial items are welcome but that the article be limited to 150 words or less.

Education - Frank Main, Ch.

1. Motion regarding continuing education and certification through the Interest Sections was tabled until the November meeting.

Publications - Eva Dreikurs Ferguson, Ch.

1. Guidelines for the Journal of NASAP were presented and motion for adoption will be considered at the November meeting.
2. Thomas Schramski, Harry Olson, Stan Skars-ten, Timothy Hartshorne and Arthur Horneke were approved as members of the Editorial Board of INDIVIDUAL PSYCHOLOGY: Practice and Application. Robert Aird's term on that Editorial Board was renewed for another three years.

Appreciation was expressed to the following Editorial Board members who have completed their terms: Sue Johnson, Michael Nystul, Merle Ohlsen, Warren Rule.

3. It was agreed that abstracts of Convention presentations should continue to be published in the Journal.

Public Relations - Maxine Ijams, Ch.

1. It was recommended that any audio-visual materials owned by NASAP be brought to Conventions so they may be heard, seen and purchased.
2. It was recommended that members submit articles to other journals reflecting Adlerian philosophies and give credit.
3. It was agreed that the following statement should be printed in minutes and newsletter:

*In order to promote the knowledge, training and teaching of Individual Psychology, defined as the psychological theory and practice created by Alfred Adler, we strongly endorse the following:*

*"Any publication that reflects Adlerian philosophy is to include an express statement giving credit to Alfred Adler."*

Challenge Grant Committee Report

NEWS NOTES from The Regions

Region II - Midwest

ILLINOIS

Chicago--The AAI of Chicago reports that on May 31, 1983 it applied to the Illinois Board of Higher Education for doctoral degree-granting authority. Present plans call for a post-Master's program to be offered in cooperation with a school of professional psychology. The degree would be offered by the Institute. The proposed program would begin in 1984, after the Institute's site visit and reaccreditation by the North Central Association.

Eleanore Redwin, charter member of the Institute's Board of Directors and faculty, died in May. Hundreds of families in the Chicago area attest to her influence on them through the Family Education Association which she directed with boundless energy and enthusiasm for many years. The Institute is planning a memorial in her honor in September.

Institute alumni and students have raised over \$11,000 towards the Seymour E. Clonick \$50,000 Challenge Grant.

Sixteen courses are being offered at the Institute this summer. The Summer Program is set up primarily for the benefit of students who live outside the Chicago area.
