In Memory of Eleanore Redwin

In May, 1983, a woman who was to many a dear friend and respected colleague and to others a cherished and admired counselor and teacher, Eleanore Redwin, passed away.

Ms. Redwin grew up in Vienna during the 1920's While at the University, studying to become a counselor, she attended Alfred Adler's seminars. In 1933, she opened a nursery school in her home, where Adler referred his more difficult pre-school aged patients. In the beginnings of the Hitler years, Ms. Redwin took several positions in and around Austria working with mentally ill children and adolescents. As the political environment became more restricting, she found the need to leave the troubled region and took refuge in England. It was there that she contacted Rudolf Dreikurs, who suggested she continue her work in the U.S., in Chicago. In 1945 she instituted the first Child Guidance Center in Chicago and later, with Dreikurs, set up the Adler Institute, followed by the establishment of the Family Education Association.

Elly Redwin was described as follows, in a tribute written by Eleanor D. Laser and Barbara Steiger, "Her life and her effect on the lives of others (families in general and women in particular) is significant. As an Adlerian counselor with both private and public practices, she has greatly influenced patients and teachers alike...She has always lived what she counseled—go out into the world and do something; dare to be what you can. There are so many people throughout the world who hold their heads higher because of Elly Redwin."

"Dr. Walter E. O'Connell's clinical experience and research efforts on humor, psychotherapy, psychodrama, experiential learning, encouragement, death and dying workshops, and experience with drug abuse patients have come together in his 'Natural High' theory and practice. This theory, with its emphasis on teaching and learning encouragement and humor and a strong focus on positive elements such as esteem and belonging, is one of the early appearances of holistic medicine in institutional psychiatry. He is internationally regarded as perhaps the most productive explorer of the adaptive functions of wit and humor..."

Book Trade Prize to Manes Sperber

Heinz Ansbacher submitted the following piece of information to be shared with Newsletter readers.

Manes Sperber has been awarded the 1983 Peace Prize of the German Book Trade Association. Sperber, "an early student and protege of Adler," published the first biography of Alfred Adler in 1962 and, more recently, Masks of Lonliness: Alfred Adler in Perspective, New York: Macmillan, 1974.

Born in 1905 in the former Austrian province of Galicia and reared in Vienna, Sperber now lives in Paris. He is probably best known for his novel trilogy, Like a Teahdrop in the Ocean," which was dramatized on German Television. In his novels and essays, according to the statement announcing the award, Sperber "has recorded the central experiences of his generation of Europeans."

The Peace Prize, which honors literary, cultural and political achievement, is one of the most prestigious awards in West Germany. It carries a stipend of DM 25,000. Last year's recipient was American diplomat and author, George F. Kennan.


International

International newsnotes cont'd

ENGLAND

Thomas G. Schramski, NASAP member from Tucson, reports that he was invited to present a series of workshops on psychodrama and Adlerian counseling for member groups of the Adlerian Society of Great Britain. He further reports that Dr. Lilian Beattie and Sheila Fairbrother have developed a very active association in Buckinghamshire. They are working in concert with Jeff Aitman, ASGB President, to develop an Adlerian counselor and psychotherapist training program in England. Anthea Miller in Cambridgeshire has facilitated the growth of parent education.

Manford Sonstegaard will be returning to England again this year to conduct workshops and teach classes.

GERMANY

Aachen was the site of the Eighth Annual Meeting of the West Deutsche Pychotherapie Seminar earlier this year. Dr. Lucy Ackerknecht presented one of the three main lectures. All schools of psychotherapy participated in the seminars.

Dr. Ackerknecht spoke on psychotherapy with the elderly from the Individual Psychologist

point of view and was thus able to spread Adlerian ideas to the seven hundred people in the audience. In addition to the lecture, Dr. Ackerknecht conducted a twenty-hour workshop on life style analysis with a large group of seminar members.

VENEZUELA

Caracas--Clara de Barranco and Sarita
Kramer, from Caracas, attended the NASAP Convention in Boulder, Colorado in May. During the
General Assembly, Sarita told something of the
work that is being done in Venezuela. About
10,000 parents have been reached through STEP
during the past seven years; 700 teachers are
in STET programs and they have 130 STEP leaders.
In addition, 50 colleges have been influenced
by Adlerian psychology.
