PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

New constitution approved

I would like to report the results of the revised Constitution ballot mailed to you recently: 1,125 ballots were mailed to the membership body; 385 ballots were returned; 376 ballots favored the Constitution revision; 9 ballots did not favor it. This strong support was encouraging to the Delegate Assembly (D.A.) members when it was reported at the opening of our recent D.A. meeting in Chicago in November. The D.A. completed changes in the By-Laws necessary to implement the revised Constitution.

Delegate Assembly actions

As a result of the recent changes all committees had as an agenda item to review their goals and make recommendations to the D.A. Consequently, the Development Committee and Public Relations Committee have been combined due to their frequent overlap. A separate Membership Committee has been established.

The <u>Publications Committee</u> presented their proposed <u>Guidelines</u> for Journals, and they were unanimously approved.

The Education Committee reports the Adlerian Research Bureau is continuing to store and retrieve. They are also planning to solicit host groups for the Alfred Adler Memorial Workshop Series.

The Convention-Workshop Committee reviewed

the Toronto Convention report. The report indicates a great deal of planning and enthusiasm at work in Toronto. The Atlanta host group informs us the Omni Hotel has been selected for their 1985 site. The Convention-Workshop Committee strongly recommended to the Executive Committee(E.C.) that they decide to hire a professional convention coordinator to organize future conventions. This co-ordinator would work with local host groups. The E.C. will review proposals to this effect at their January meeting.

Balla passes baton to Bettner

Fund Raising Chair, Marion Balla, reported \$14,696.70 had been donated by 108 contributors towards the \$50,000 Challenge Grant from the Seymour E. Clonick Estate.

Congratulations to Marion for her enthusiasm and energetic leadership. She has passed the leadership to the capable hands of Betty Lou Bettner. Sincere thanks to this Committee for their creativity and hard work. Good luck in meeting the challenge.

D.A. agrees to repeat fall meeting

At the conclusion of the November meeting in Chicago, the D.A. discussed the impact of meeting apart from a Semi-Annual Meeting. The reaction was positive. The D.A. recommended the same type of meeting and same location for the 1984 fall meeting. We were delighted to have the opportunity to meet at the Alfred Adler Institute of Chicago, and express our sincere thanks to the Institute.

New volumes of Adler's papers published

Three volumnes of the selected papers by Alfred Adler, covering the years 1919-1929, 1930-1932 and 1933-1937, have recently been published in German, the last one completed in the autumn of 1983. The volumes are edited by Heinz L. Ansbacher and Robert F. Antoch, and are entitled, Psychotherapie und Enziehung. These volumes are a continuation of Heilen und Bilden and Praxis and Theorie der Individualpsychologie, which consist of Adler's selected papers of the years 1904-1913 and 1909-1920, respectively. The new volumes complete a series of nineteen, through which practically all of Adler's writings have now become available in German.

Commenting on the significance of these new German publications editor, Heinz Ansbacher, writes: "The series is just one reflection of the progress of Individual Psychology in the German-speaking countries, [where] the German Society now [has] 1600 members."

Author, Manes Sperber, an early student and protege of Adler, was reported in the September-October, 1983 issue of the Newsletter as having been awarded the 1983 Peace Prize of the German Trade Association. At the time of the October 17, 1983 35th International Frankfurt Book Fair, where the award presentation was made, Sperber(77) was unable to travel from his Paris home due to a heart condition. A fellow German emigre and publisher, Alfred Grosser, represented Sperber and read his acceptance speech, where Sperber urged Europe to unite as an "exemplary power of peace."




Adlerians on tape....

Ackerknecht will represent Individual Psychology in a 13-part television documentary on the comparative schools of Psychotherapy. Dr. Ackerknecht will not be the only familiar face. A German television crew traveled to the Alfred Adler Institute of New York to interview Alexandra and Kurt Adler. Heinz and Rowena bacher also participated in the filming.

Dr. Ackerknecht reports that her segment will last twenty minutes, although it was drawn from a full four hours of filming sessions at the Rehabitational Clinic of the University of Cologne. Her sessions involved both individual and family counseling.

This T.V. series was sponsored in part by the University of Würzburg, the West German Government and various television and radio enterprises.

Chicago-On January 14, 1984, the Family Education (FEA) Division of the Alfred Adler Institute of Chicago (AAIC) will resume its training program in Parent Education Study Group Leadership. Mr. Shnueli states that the decision was made on the basis of IE's "democratic egalitarian philosophy," and that IE is "a system of education that motivates children... challenges teachers and pleases parents."

The Ministry of Education and Culture first learned of IE through a Tel Aviv school principal, who became aware of IE from a special issue of Individual Psychology.

Mr. Shnueli adds that he has brought IE to the attention of officials in the U.S. Department of Education who "showed great interest."
