#### LETTERS TO THE EDITORS

#### Adlerian principles at work at DA meeting

Most of us work in jobs where Adlerian principles of cooperation and encouragement are unknown and in which the principles are often violated. What a satisfaction it was for me to witness Adlerian principles fully operating during the difficult and long hours of deliberation of the last Delegate Assembly (DA) meeting in November, 1983.

The DA had very real problems to be resolved in formulating the new NASAP By-Laws. Competition and discouragement could have characterized the two days of meetings. Instead, the meetings were filled with cooperation, encouragement, sharing and continued attempts to clarify goals. We were tired and weary, but instead of a divisive group we felt a sense of belonging and togetherness, of moving toward solutions that all could really accept as valid and fair.

That Adlerians heed their own words, working cooperatively together in difficult circumstances, needs to be told. For this reason. I wish to share the experience with other NASAP members, and to credit the leaders of the group, (the Executive Committee, especially President Kathy Walton) as well as the Executive Secretary (Neva Hefner) for helping to make an Adlerian work experience so richly rewarding. -- Eva Dreikurs Ferguson Edwardsville, IL

#### OF GENERAL INTEREST

#### Manes Sperber, Adler associate, dies at 78

Prize-winning author, psychologist and an Alfred Adler protege and associate, Manes Sperber died Sunday, February 5, 1984, in a Paris hospital of heart disease. He was 78 years of age.

Born in 1905 in the former Austro-Hungarian village of Zablotov, Sperber moved with his family to Vienna in 1914, where he studied psychology and later worked with Adler. By the time he was 16 years old, he was assisting Adler in his psychological studies and the two became close associates. His essay, Alfred Adler, the Man and His Teachings, was published in 1926, a year before he began teaching psychology at the University of Berlin. Heinz Ansbacher has noted that this was the first published biography of Adler. More recently, Sperber authored Masks of Loneliness: Alfred Adler in Perspective (New York: MacMillan, '74).

After 1940, Sperber wrote what has become his best known work, an autobiographical trilogy, Like a Tear in the Ocean, which traced in personal terms the individual's struggle against Fascist and Stalinist repression. Upton Sinclair compared one book in this trilogy to the writings of Theodore Dreiser and John Steinbeck. In October, Sperber was recipient of the 1983 Peace Prize given by the West German Book Industry.

#### O'Connell featured

Walter E. "Buzz" O'Connell and his work in humor was featured in The Houston Digest, a weekly newspaper, in November. #### NASAP member lectures in Pakistan

In November, 1983, NASAP member, Anna Sten, lectured at the International Conference on Science held in Pakistan. Her paper, "Inventive Psychotherapeutic Approaches to Human Needs and Feeling," was well received in an Islamic country where Freudian ideas of the libido are often feared. And, although Dr. Sten was the only Adlerian present, three hundred copies of her recent articles were distributed and accepted by the non-Adlerian conferees. Dr. Sten notes that both occurrences are unusual and examples of a significant step forward for the Pakistani.

Dr. Sten explains that the highlight of her trip was her private audience with the President of Pakistan. She was the only woman given such honor.


