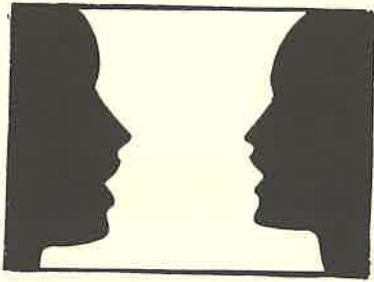

Social trends: seeing it the Adlerian way

Recently the organization of social and behavioral scientists celebrated their 50th anniversary at a symposium in Washington, D.C. Neil Smelser, professor of Sociology at the University of California at Berkeley, compared the Hoover commissioned Ogburn report, *Recent Social Trends in the United States in 1933*, with new developments and knowledge.

At the time of the Ogburn report statistics were believed to be sufficient to document social problems. He stated, "we now understand that social problems emerge as a complex problem between objective social conditions, the criteria people bring to bear in evaluating those conditions, and success or failure of efforts of interest groups to push their particular criteria forward."

We note here that social and behavioral scientists as a whole have come a long way towards Adler's original contentions and no longer attribute "all" of human behavior to environmental "facts." They now see the interaction of various factors including the individual evaluation of situations, and we would add, "according to their individual lifestyle."

Smelser stresses his view further by stating that social investigators "have come to view the world of imperial facts not so much as a realm of observable and measurable things," as Ogburn's committee did, "but rather more as a purposeful creation of human agents and investigators."

It feels good to no longer be so isolated with the theoretical concepts of Individual Psychology!

On giving ulcers: Rudolf Dreikurs and Ed Koch

Rudolf Dreikurs has been quoted as once telling a colleague: "There are two kinds of persons in the world, those who get ulcers and those who give them. I give ulcers." (Terner and Pew, *The Courage to be Imperfect*. N.Y.: Hawthorne Books, 1978, p. 193).

In view of this it was a great surprise to find Edward I. Koch, Mayor of the city of New York, quoted for the expression: "I'm not the type to get ulcers. I give them." This quotation from Koch's recent and enormously successful book, *Mayor: An Autobiography* (N.Y.: Simon and Schuster, 1984), was reported by *Time Magazine*, Feb. 27, 1984.

The questions now arise: Could it be that Koch got the expression from Dreikurs? Or could it be that Koch arrived independently at the same expression? Or could it be that both Dreikurs and Koch go back to a common older source?

Page one by-line, headline stories, flashing cameras, interviews...It's a celebrity! It's a head of state! No, it's an Adlerian!

That's right. When Manford "Sonste" Sonstegard visited Ireland's Counties Kerry and Cork, the local press was there with full coverage.

Newspapers report a new interest in issues related to the family, child raising and parenting. Local governments and communities see the complications of modern day life affecting the family unit, and they do not see parents being very well equipped to handle such problems. They see that the times demand a new approach. Parents, too, recognize that the old autocratic approach to parenting just doesn't work.

Common opinion in Ireland overlooks the value of counseling at the family level, favoring its use only in criminal and psychiatric cases. But, people are fighting this, as can be seen in County Kerry's town of Tralee, where John and Hilary Murphy started a parent study group, which is now made up of an enthusiastic group of concerned parents.

Sonste's presence in Counties Kerry and Cork reinforces the efforts of parents such as the Murphys. In fact, Sonste was met enthusiastically at every stop on his tour. Over three hundred parents attended one meeting, where questions from the audience ranged from toilet training, dealing with teenagers, to full-time working mothers and marital separations. It seems from the parents' questions that these were concerned adults taking their parenting very seriously.

Newsletter readers will cheer to the fact that both Rudolf Dreikurs and Alfred Adler were mentioned on several occasions in each local news article. Perhaps the most impressive press coverage was an article appearing in the *Cork Examiner*, where the reporter described in detail and in, what she coined, "laywoman" terms, major tenets of Adlerian thought, quoting Adler frequently.

It is impressive to note that the local Irish press gave such serious and thorough coverage to each issue raised by Sonste's visit. Readers clearly come away with a good idea of what constitutes the Adlerian/Dreikursian approach to parenting.

Perfection is found in its title, *So...Why Aren't You Perfect Yet for \$4.95?!*, and from cover to cover, where--of course--immaculate spelling and grammar prevails. A perfect sample: one of the "darkest moments in the history of perfectionism" is in 1965 when "Adlerian Psychiatrist, Rudolf Dreikurs coins the phrase, 'The Courage to be Imperfect.'" (pp. 50-51)

This completely unblemished example of the perfect written work leaves more than just a cosmetic impression--those imperfect little smile lines. In fact, this humorous approach to helping people overcome perfectionism does give the reader an opportunity to feel the courage needed to admit imperfection.
