"Is It True What They Say About Adler's Individual Psychology?" *Teaching of Psychology*, (a publication of the American Psychological Association), vol. 11, No.3, October, 1984; Norman N Silverman & Raymond J. Corsini. This article is the product of an extensive research project. Drs. Silverman and Corsini discuss how Adlerian ideas are treated in introductory psychology textbooks. This work represents the study of 57 college texts published in the period of 1974-1982, evaluating entries in terms of twelve basic Adlerian propositions and four common misconceptions.

Encyclopedia of Psychology, edited by Raymond J. Corsini; J. Wiley & Sons, four-volume set, 2,000 pages, \$249.95.

This four-volume reference set was written by 500 contributors and guided by 50 consulting associate and foreign editors. The major fields covered include applied, clinical, cognitive, developmental, educational, measurement, personality, physiological, social and theoretical psychology.

Book Misrepresents Adler's Beliefs

The April, 1985 issue of the *American Journal of Psychiatry*, (142:4, p.517) contains a letter to the editor penned by Heinz Ansbacher in response to a review of Paul Stepansky's book, *In Freud's Shadow: Adler in Context* (Hillsdale, NJ, Analytic Press, 1983) by James Lieberman, which appeared in the Journal's December, 1984 issue. Ansbacher raises some interesting counter-arguments to what he describes as "utterly absurd statements" by Stepansky. Ansbacher notes that Stepansky's book and Lieberman's review are both good, the former being "important, excellent and well-researched" up to the point where "Stepansky discusses Adler after his separation from Freud. At this point he turns Adler virtually upside down." Furthermore, Lieberman "uncritically accepts Stepansky's rendition of Adler."

Among Ansbacher's criticism of the Stepansky work is Stepansky's apparent "erroneous hypothesis that Adler's life development was from radical socialism to extreme conservatism," a hypothesis Stepansky seems to support by "forcing the data to fit" his own interpretation.

Following detailed point-by-point criticism of the Stepansky book, Ansbacher concludes that "although Stepansky's book offers an excellent analysis of the Freud-Adler interaction, it is unacceptable as an account of Adler's thinking and his system of Individual Psychology." Ansbacher encourages NASAP members to take a closer look at the Stepansky book, the Lieberman review, and his own counter-arguments.

Adlerian Article Inspires Workshops in Ireland

An article by Polly de Sherbinin appearing in the October, 1984 Northern Ireland periodical, *Lynx* published by Extern, an organization committed to crime prevention and the development of community-based alternatives to custody and prison, inspired a recent series of Human Services Workshops led by Ms. de Sherbinin in Belfast. The workshops were similar to those offered in the United States through the Adlerian Counseling Center of Amherst (Massachusetts). Ms. de Sherbinin presented the workshops before an audience made up of staff members from Belfast residences for inmates entering the community after incarceration and for court-adjudicated persons. The workshops were designed to teach staff members skills toward assisting the inmates in taking an increased responsibility for their own actions.

Ms. de Sherbinin's article outlined Adlerian principles for fostering cooperation and responsibility. The application of such Adlerian principles were presented in the workshops. Ms. de Sherbinin reports that workshop participants, although not familiar with Adlerian Psychology, responded well.

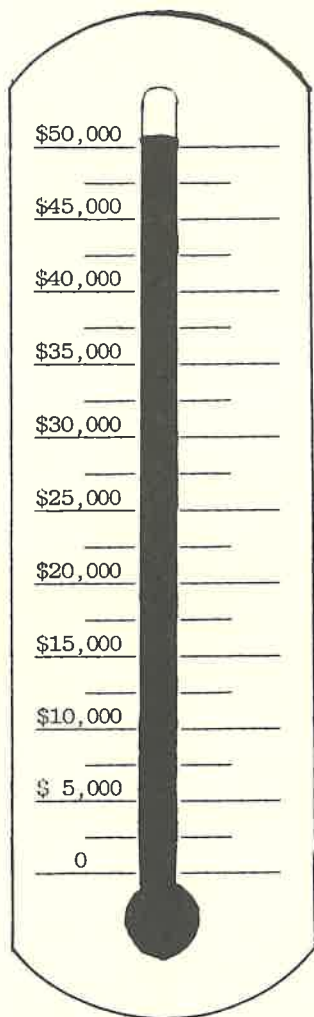
Yugoslavia
