Noel Coward, in "The Bar on the Piccola Marina", describes "an English woman who discovered in the nick of time, that life is for living."

Not very profound it would seem. Out of context, it is not even funny. So simple, it is likely to be followed by "everyone knows that." But not true. Everyone does not know, or live like, life is for living.

Adlerians can view people hiding, avoiding, contorting, distorting, while chasing their personal goals, with very little room for "living." The second volume provides a continuation of the first bibliography published in 1975 and includes over 5,000 citations of works published throughout the world. It covers the full range of articles and books dealing with Individual Psychology in all languages, beginning with the original writings of Alfred Adler and his coworkers, and including everything written and published on IP since that time. The extensive cross referenced index makes this an efficient, easy-to-use resource.

LETTERS

The Equal Rights Amendment, for a variety of reasons was never passed. I feel that the ideas imbedded in that amendment are worthy and even necessary to our democratic system.

I believe that this may be a good time to work toward the passage of a Human Rights Amendment, an amendment much like this one:

Human Rights Amendment

Section 1. Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of any characteristic such as age, sex, intellectual ability, sexual preference, religious preference, physical condition, place of origin, race or economic level, which distinguishes one person from another.

<u>Section 2.</u> The Congress shall have the power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.

Section 3. This amendment shall take effect two years after the date of ratification.

As those who are familiar with the original Equal Rights Amendment will note, it is

essentially the same format with the rights extended to virtually all persons.

It seems time to pass a Human Rights Amendment which says in effect, "Hey, we really do mean those things we said earlier in this document." Adlerians, it seems, ought to take some leadership in this effort and convert preachments to practices.

IN MEMORIAM--

Helene Papanek, M.D.

Dr. Helene Papanek, charter member of NASAP, died at her New York home the end of May, 1985. Dr. Papanek served on the Board of Directors of the American Society of Adlerian Psychology from 1961 to 1967 and was President of the Society 1963-65.

Dr. Papanek was Executive Director of the Alfred Adler Institute of New York for twenty years and was a psychiatrist on the staff of the Alfred Adler Center for Mental Health in New York for more than twenty years. An item in the New York Times indicated that the Institute noted "with deep sorrow the passing of this brilliant, unique professional, great teacher....She will be greatly missed."

There will be a memorial service in September. In lieu of flowers, contributions may be made to the Alfred Adler Institute of New York.
