#### OREGON SOCIETY DONATION

The Oregon Society of Individual Psychology donated early newsletters of the Oregon Society and the very first newsletters of Region I for the NASAP archives.

Maurice L. Bullard preserved and assembled the issues of the Oregon Society of Individual Psychology Newsletter from Vol. III, No. 1 through Vol. XVII, No. 5; Sept./Oct. 1962 through May/June 1977. These newsletters provide a record of the early struggles of the Dreikurs/Adler education movement, according to Mr. Bullard.

The Relay was the newsletter for the first Region I of NASAP, when there were three provinces of Canada and thirteen western states of the U.S. The issues assembled by Mr. Bullard include Vol. I, No. 1 (Sept./Oct. 1976) through Vol. IV, No. 3 (May/June 1980). In the presentation letter, Mr. Bullard states, "The Relay originated with the stated purpose relaying messages from its [NASAP Region I] Board to the membership and from the membership to the Board. It was successful in this mission in unifying a Region almost as large as the other four Regions. It exchanged news, promoted conferences, publicized a Constitution, assisted in delegate elections, and publicized two materials sales centers."

NASAP is grateful to Maurice L. Bullard and the Oregon Society of Individual Psychology for this substantial donation to the archives of NASAP. A good deal of time, effort and monies were expended to bring this project to fruition. Thank you!

In the future: plans to continue to expand, adding a functioning lecture-counseling center each year in several different metropolitan locations. Co-sponsoring agencies provide the space, the FEA Division does the rest.
