The Selling of NASAP?

I have been a card-carrying Adlerian ever since I heard Dr. Dreikurs in 1969. It was his ideas (ok, and his splendiferous personality) that attracted me. I doubt-nay, I can say with certainty-I know that a tote bag, no matter what the words or design on it, would not have piqued my curiosity to follow it anywhere. It was ideas, thoughts, imagination, and people that stirred my soul and led me to Adler, AAI of Chicago, NASAP, and to any workshop of Dr. D's I could attend.

I am against the marketing of tote bags, beach towels, etc. for NASAP for the same reasons that I argue with my 12 year old daughter about wearing clothes with other people's names on them, or purchasing a shirt only because it has a horse and a polo rider on it. The fact that "everyone is doing it" does not mean NASAP should do it. We, too, do not have to be slaves to the gods of marketing and advertising.

Why are we doing this? Are we doing this to "get out the word?" When I joined NASAP I did not sign up to proseletize or convert. Through my work as a mental health consultant, counselor and lecturer on child rearing, people have often asked me for more information. People have inquired about books, groups, educational facilities, and organizations that espouse the same ideas that I shared with them. I directed them to NASAP, the AAIs, book lists, etc. It seems to me that once again the common bond is ideas, useful ones, ones that stir us to move and act. The "word" gets out through so many our lives, our work, our writings, our groups and discussions. Not our tote bags. (cont'd)


