Raymond J. Corsini may be the only person in
history to edit three Encyclopedias! In 1984,
the Unabridged edition of Encyclopedia of
Psychology, edited by Corsini, was released.
It was named "Reference Book of the Year" by
the American Library Association.

Now, in 1987, an abridged edition of the award
winning Encyclopedia has been released. Cor-
sini has edited this one volume Concise Ency-
clopedia of Psychology, which contains 2,150
articles in alphabetical listing; covers 1,200
major topics by recognized experts; thorough
cross-referencing; balanced coverage of every
branch of psychology; 1,242 pages.

The Encyclopedia of Aging, with Corsini as
Managing Editor, was released in 1986. This
one volume reference work provides explana-
tions for hundreds of terms and concepts
relating to the life of the elderly and the
aging process as well as information on the
growing range of programs and services for the
elderly provided by the professions, the com-
munities and government agencies. It contains
over 500 articles from 225 contributors; 1,000
pages.

Lost and Found

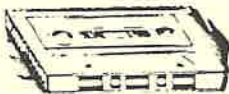
Adler's name appeared twice in the New York Times in the past two months in articles on information lost and now found. While he was not the subject of the articles, reference was made to him.

In March an article was printed on "Hundreds of Broadway's Lost Songs Found," including one of the unpublished lyrics of Ira Gershwin entitled "Freud and Jung and Adler." This particular song was printed on the front page of the Times, in other newspapers and magazines and was highlighted on TV and radio news programs.

The second article appeared in the February 10 "Science Times" section of the paper. The article was on "Lost Paper Shows Freud's Effort to Link Analysis and Evolution" and contained references to the defection of Adler and Jung and the effect on Freud.

"Teenage Suicide: An Approach to Prevention"

"Every day 18 young Americans commit suicide. The teenage suicide rate has increased 250 percent in the past 25 years. For every suicide committed, there are ten other attempted suicides."

LexCom Productions used these quotes to introduce the availability of the new two-part video series they have developed featuring Frank Walton. About 40 percent of Walton's private practice is devoted to work with troubled teens.

The warning signals issued by youngsters contemplating suicide are discussed in Part I along with reviews of many common mistakes unknowingly made by those in positions to influence young people. Part II focuses on actions that parents, teachers and other friends can take once suicide is identified as a possibility and deals with development of self-esteem and self-reliance in children and young people as one of the most important deterrents to suicide.
