REGION V--NORTHEAST

Regional members meeting in Fort Wayne recommended that more emphasis be placed on regional meetings at the Annual Convention--perhaps using a program slot within the Saturday/Sunday program for regional meetings in order to highlight the importance of regional development.

There was discussion about regional and local development and about how to best foster growth within the region. Regional conferences were seen as a valuable way to create information exchange and to provide encouragement to local groups; one annual regional event to be publicized at the national convention would be essential.

Much of the meeting time was focused on issues related to regional meeting parameters. Seed money is usually available through the region to encourage local groups to sponsor such an event. Sylvia Robbins continues to manage the region funds and she will be contacted regarding the bank balance. Her commitment to regional and local development was applauded.

Marion Balla announced that Ottawa will be hosting a regional meeting in March, 1988. It was proposed that we attempt as a region to create a calendar of regional meetings which could be advertised year to year. It was hoped that a site for a regional meeting for 1989 would be found prior to the March meeting. Profit sharing was discussed.

The following proposal was made: All seed money be returned to the region prior to profit sharing. Profits would be divided 75% to host, 25% to region. This proposal is to be reviewed annually at the May convention.

The group decided against holding a Region-wide conference. There are a number of workshops and conferences held throughout the Region that could be publicized to the membership.

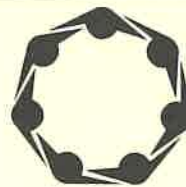

Sadie "Tee" Dreikurs was selected for induction into the 1987 Class of the City of Chicago's Senior Citizens Hall of Fame. Tee was honored in the City Council Chambers, was chosen to be the spoke person for all the honorees and in her inimitable fashion, had a ready response for the Mayor!

Leo Gold

The Margrit Egner Foundation of Zurich announced that Leo Gold has been selected as one of three prizewinners in 1988 for his work in the development of dream theory, originating Dreamodrama, a group psychotherapeutic technique, as well as the therapeutic use of guided dream imagery in dream therapy.

The Egner Foundation was founded in Zurich in 1983. Its goal is to encourage new ideas in psychology, anthropology, philosophy and medicine which benefit humankind. The annual prize is given to those whose work contributes to a more humane world in which the difficulties of the human condition are the center of attention.

The presentation of prizes will be held at the University of Zurich on November 17, 1988. The winners will present lectures and discussion of their views before an international audience.

Edna Nash

Edna Nash was one of the recipients of the First Distinguished Service to Families Award presented by the British Columbia Council for the Family in early May. There were 60 nominations from every region of the Province and five were selected to be honored at a reception at the Government House, hosted by the Lieutenant Governor of British Columbia.

The B.C. Council for the Family indicated that the quality of family life and the ability of countless numbers of parents in B.C. to be more effective parents has in great measure been due to the innovative and pioneering work of Edna Nash; she helped to make parent education a household term in B.C.

Edna's work in B.C. began in 1970 after studying with Rudolf Dreikurs. She was so impressed with the vision she received of the possibilities for helping families find ways to raise responsible children who would also have a strong sense of their own worth that she began to establish programs in Vancouver and the surrounding area that have continued and expanded through the years.

Congratulations to each of these individuals for this significant recognition!

Note: A \$5,000 donation from Region IV is not listed in this budget. It is being used for marketing and development, such as membership brochures, Interest Section publicity and research.

This budget was approved by the Delegate Assembly in May, 1987.

Membership

NASAP has 969 members, including 80 student and 28 life members. Total membership remains about the same as in 1986. The 97 new members this year represents a 25% increase in new membership.

In the past nine months, 134 inquiries to the Chicago office concerning membership have resulted in 34 memberships. This is a 25% rate of application. It is our intention to increase new memberships and retain present members through: 1) increased services to

Interest Sections, 2) improved newsletters which feature Interest Sections, and 3) the new membership solicitation brochure.

Interest Sections

Five Interest Sections now exist, with the following memberships:

Adlerian Counseling and Therapy	193
Family Education	89
Clinicians	68
Education	63
Theory and Research	55

With few restrictions, membership in each section is open to all NASAP members. A sixth section, Business and Organizations, has collected necessary signatures and will present itself to the Delegate Assembly for approval in November.

Delegate Assembly

The Delegate Assembly consists of 22 members; 2 delegates from each of the six geographic sections of North America and 2 delegates from each of the Interest Sections. The number of delegates has been reduced the past three years by reducing the number of delegates from each region and section, from three to two.

The D.A. meets for two days in Chicago each November and for one day as part of the annual convention in May. There are five standing committees and special committees may be formed.

Executive Committee

The President and other officers of NASAP are elected from the Delegate Assembly membership. The E.C. conducts the affairs of NASAP when the D.A. does not meet. Meetings of the E.C. are held quarterly, including just prior to the November D.A. meeting and May Convention, and meetings in Chicago in March and September.

1986-1987

The following major items are brought to the attention of the membership as a summary of NASAP activities during the past twelve months:

1. Offices of the Society were moved in January, 1987, to 202 S. State Street, Chicago. Through a settlement with the new owners of our previous location, the move was accomplished at no expense to NASAP. The move was necessary due to unacceptable conditions at the old offices.

2. Convention management was shifted to a professional convention services company, effective with Seattle in 1988. The complexities of convention management are now shifted from host groups to Centennial Conferences. It is noted the convention is a significant income item for NASAP and this move to professional management should stabilize this source of income.

3. NASAP was a partner in "Tee Dreikurs --Partner in History." a two-part videotape co-sponsored with the Adler Institute of Chicago. The tape was premiered at the Fort Wayne Convention, and is available to NASAP members at a 50% price reduction.

4. The importance of making ourselves visible in the professional community was recognized by the establishment of a fund to increase our marketing and membership efforts. A new membership brochure will be the first result of these efforts, and will be distributed beginning this summer.

5. The recognition of social interest by non-NASAP members was initiated with the Continental Social Interest Award. The award is voted by the Delegate Assembly and presented at the Annual Convention. The 1987 recipients were President and Mrs. Carter, for their work on Habitat, low-cost housing across the United States. Local Social Interest awards can also be made by regions and local NASAP groups.

6. Our ability to present CEU credits for attendance at annual and regional conventions and workshops is now expanding. We are a provider of National Board of Certified Counselors (NBCC) credits, and other credits are now being evaluated.

7. A task force from the Delegate Assembly is moving forward on a project for Day Care Providers training. The work of the committee is ongoing and participation from the membership is welcomed.

8. The Executive Committee has approved a Past Presidents Council, to be chaired by the immediate Past President. The purpose of the Council is to inform the past presidents of the current activities of NASAP governance, and to seek their opinions on these matters.

9. NASAP has reached some measure of financial stability through membership dues, convention income, and lesser amounts from other sources. We are also fortunate to have Clonick Estate grant monies totalling \$113,265, which have been set aside for future projects.

Summary

The activities of NASAP are highly dependent upon volunteer work in the Journals, Executive Committee, Delegate Assembly, Regions and Interest Sections. We are fortunate to have many people serving in these capacities. In addition, we have a strong central office which administers the affairs of the Society on a day-to-day basis.

I believe any increase in our activities and services to members will be guided by the answers to this question: "What are we doing for others?" From these answers, our goals will become clear. I look forward to the future.
