PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

This summer has reinforced for me an irony well known to most of us: Adlerian psychology works, but few know about it. Allow me to share several experiences from the past few months.

I spent several days with a state-wide coalition of shelters for battered women. In the shelters women and children find refuge from an intolerable domestic crisis. One of the shelters' rules becomes an enormous challenge-they cannot discipline the children through hitting (spanking).

Alternatives to spanking—natural and logical consequences—are proving effective. Other parenting challenges, such as bedtime, are magnified when your family is in one room and under the same roof with perhaps a dozen other mothers and children. The shelter workers and mothers seem very receptive to the underlying theme of consequences, choices. Even in crisis, parents can be educated.

I also spent a week with teachers from elementary, middle, and high schools. On Monday morning, one in sixteen had heard of the four goals of misbehavior. You can imagine the excitement as they "were fitted for glasses" in the areas of misbehavior, motivation, and discipline. When you ask teachers how many received course work in understanding groups (otherwise known as classes!), I rarely find more than 1 in 5 with such training.

We have all had similar successes in sharing our knowledge and skills with others. Let's look to the next year as an opportunity to expand our influence in our communities.

Our Next Year

We have spent the past year stabilizing our financial situation and identifying (and correcting) problems which should be addressed. Many people have contributed to these efforts, from convention hosts to editorial board members. Our Society works because of the self-less efforts of the membership.

In the next year, I want NASAP to move in at least two new directions:

- l. Expand the frequency and content of this Newsletter.
- 2. Identify education projects NASAP can fund and support.

I have a broad definition of education projects--from possibly computerizing the Mosak bibliographies to creating a resource center for the Adlerian videotapes and cassettes.

CONTINUING EDUCATION CREDITS

NBCC

The North American Society of Adlerian Psychology has been approved by the National Board for Certified Counselors (NBCC) to offer continuing education for National Certified Counselors (NCC). NBCC approval is limited to the sponsoring organization and does not necessarily imply endorsement or approval of individual offerings.

Attendees at NASAP's Annual Convention and Workshops, who are NCCs, may now receive Continuing Education Units (CEUs) that may be applied towards re-certification. Credit will be given for sessions attended in their entirety, but credit is not granted for breaks or meals. A maximum of 23.5 contact hours may be earned at a NASAP Convention/Workshop weekend.

Conforming to the Guidelines of the Council on the Continuing Education Unit, NASAP will award .7 CEU for each one-day workshop and .5 CEU for attending all five sessions each day of its Convention.
