PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

My message in the last issue has created an unprecedented outpouring of support for NASAP, suggestions, and opportunities. In letters and phone calls, I have heard from well-known and "unknown" members. All were helpful, and I will share some of their concerns in next month's newsletter.

Newsletter increases frequency

With this issue, the NASAP Newsletter returns to 10 issues-per-year (with the July-August and November-December months combined). The increased frequency will allow for more timely and informative newsletters.

Seattle Convention

A survey of 1987 convention presenters indicated dissatisfaction with the 45 minute program length. The Delegate Assembly has created a new schedule for the Seattle Saturday/Sunday presentations:

- * "short" sessions are increased to 60 minutes
- * "long" sessions remain at 90 minutes
- * total number of programs remains at 80
- * Interest Section meetings have been moved to Saturday

These changes will improve the quality of the convention. Make plans for Seattle, May 27-30. Convention registration brochures will be sent in late January.

Conventions 1990-1992

Convention sites were selected, pending final approval from the host committees:

- * 1990 Philadelphia
- * 1991 Tucson * 1992 Chicago

The Delegate Assembly approved a rotation of the convention through western, central and eastern portions of North America every three years.

Convention Survey - Presenters

All Fort Wayne presenters were asked to complete a survey. Their dissatisfaction with the 45 minute time-slot has prompted an increase to 60 minutes for the Seattle convention. Other interesting results from this survev:

- * 1 in 3 presenters indicate they came to the convention in order to present
- * 2 of 3 presenters indicate they plan to present in Seattle
- * 86% of presenters would agree to videotaping of their presentations. (The D.A. has recommended some programs be videotaped in Seattle, and we are working to make this happen.)
- * Presenters listed 31 other conventions at which they presented in the past year. also indicated 68% of these conventions require presenters to register, similar to NASAP policy.

Convention Survey - Membership

More than 450 replies to the survey on conventions were received. Results presented to the D.A. meeting include:

- * Memorial Day Weekend--19% indicated it was an advantage to attending the convention; 39% indicating it a disadvantage; and 37% neutral on this point.
- * Reasons for attending NASAP conventions: Program (231 replies), philosophy (227), presenters (202), camaraderie (191), location (107).
- * Compared to other conventions, 74% indicated our registration fees are average, 13% higher, and 13% lower than other events.

IN MEMORIAM--Anna Sten

The New York Committee of NASAP, Region V regrets to announce that Anna Sten, Sc.D., died unexpectedly on November 13, 1987. She was a concentration camp survivor with no living relatives. Besides membership in NASAP, she was a fellow of the Royal Society for the Promotion of Health, a member of the N.Y. Academy of Science and the National Academy of TV Artists.

Anna was devoted to the Individual Psychology of Alfred Adler and his philosophy and was on the staff of the Alfred Adler Institute of New York. As an international lecturer of "Inventive Therapy" (her creation), she used her unique methods in her work with adults, children, the blind and the handicapped. Anna was a loyal devoted member of the N. Y. Committee. She was an unusual person and we shall miss her.
