PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The recent mid-winter meeting of the Executive Committee was a productive weekend. As I drove home in a snowstorm, I was grateful for the front wheel drive of my car as the backroads became more difficult.

Perhaps NASAP can consider itself a "front wheel drive" organization. We are not pushed by our past, but pulled toward the goals we set. The past, our foundation, is the basis for the new structures, new services, and new publications we can create. We cannot distort this rich psychology which is ours.

But this organization cannot sustain itself in the "blizzard" of new psychologies, services, and therapies of the 1980's if we rely only on our past. We must continue to see the needs of our members and their populations as opportunities for NASAP.

Your reactions to the comments from members (see page 6) are welcomed. There are many "drivers" within NASAP, we have the vehicle, and we are ready for some additional destinations. Newsletters, Journals, Conventions will continue to improve. What else should we be doing for ourselves, and others?

One answer is to bring additional members into NASAP. More than 100 members responded to the initial mailing of brochures, requesting more than 3,700! Please make the personal contact necessary to increase membership. See page 7 for a request form for brochures.

The Executive Committee, made the following decisions during their Chicago meeting last month:

- * Two NASAP members have been selected for the Meritorious Service Award, to be presented at the Seattle convention.
- * Three Convention presentations will be videotaped and made available at low cost. See page 5 for details. The videotaping of convention presentations was established by the Delegate Assembly as a priority at the November meeting.

- * A media room for the display of audio and visual Adlerian materials will be included in the Seattle program. If you would like to be included in this opportunity, see page 5.
- * The dates of the 1989 Minneapolis St. Paul Convention have been confirmed as Thursday through Sunday, May 25 28. The Delegate Assembly had instructed us to move off the usual Friday Sunday of U.S. Memorial Day weekend, perhaps even to a mid-May or Mid-June timeframe. Scheduling conflicts with hotels made the May 25 28 dates the best available time for the convention.
- * A report from the University of Texas Press (publisher of the Journal) was accepted, indicating we are on budget and within deadlines.
- * The annual review of central office personnel again shows a significant work overload on the staff. We have shifted the newsletter duties (see page 2) and instructed Neva Hefner to seek outside assistance for lower-level tasks.

REGIONAL ELECTIONS

Nomination forms for Regional Delegates have been sent to all members (Except Region 6, Far West, which does not have a vacancy). To be placed on the ballot, a person must receive at least five nominations and express a willingness to serve on the Delegate Assembly.

Delegates must attend two meetings each year, on the Friday of the annual convention and the first weekend in Hovember (in Chicago). Delegates serve for three years and are eligible to serve on the Executive Committee after one year on the Delegate Assembly. If you are willing to serve on the DA, make sure others in your geographic region know of your interest and place your name in nomination. You may also nominate yourself.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ELECTIONS

The two-year term of the NASAP Executive Committee expires in Seattle. All members of the Delegate Assembly having served at least one year are eligible for election to this important group. Nominations will be accepted on Friday and the election will be held on Saturday of the convention weekend.

NEWSLETTER EDITOR APPOINTED

Dr. Don Dinkmeyer, Jr., has been appointed Editor of the Newsletter for the next six months. This appointment was approved by the Executive Committee at their January meeting, and will be reviewed at the Seattle convention.

The shift in Newsletter duties from Neva Hefner to Don is consistent with the Delegate Assembly's request to relieve the central office workload. In addition, Don has been instructed to improve the format of the newsletter, including a possible shift to typeset format.

Don has extensive publishing experience, from editing a college newspaper for three years to authoring educational programs during the past decade. He welcomes comments on the NASAP Newsletter format and suggestions for improvements.

RESPONSES TO PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The President's Message in the November - December issue of the Newsletter has created a wide and varied response. Portions of letters are reproduced on this page.

#

"I am not a 'joiner' type of person. Perhaps that is one of the reasons I enjoy NASAP. There is no indoctrination process to become a member. The organization is very tolerant of widely differing viewpoints and as such epitomizes the notion of our creative response to our condition. To me that is the beauty of Adlerian psychology.

The problem, of course, in such a system is that people become terribly individualistic, and lose sight of their need to develop social interest...We have lost our focus on the need for others to help us in our individuality. If we persist, we may find ourselves unable to be individuals because we lack the social support necessary to do so."

"...[T]here are only a few universities which teach Individual Psychology. It was only by accident that I obtained a copy of Ray Corsini's text on the fundamentals of counseling. That lead to obtaining a number of books on Adlerian psychology and my eventually becoming a member of NASAP...I concentrated on learning all I could about IP from the textbooks. But I did not, and do not, feel that was adequate for me to be truly an Adlerian.

It would be very helpful to individuals like myself if we could obtain training on the weekends from those few universities which teach IP. I would be happy to spend one weekend a quarter on concentrated courses of instruction, with or without academic credit from the insititution."

I am an officer in the state counseling organization and frequently present at local workshops. I find that many of the participants have a mind set which is very compatible with IP, but are totally unaware they are. If I could get a few basic courses under my belt, I would feel much more comfortable in spreading the word. I would also feel I was making the best use of my knowledge for my clients.

"I have watched good people leave (NASAP) who tired of the battle for involvement,...whose ideas were not just cast aside but stomped on...I am more than ready for changes. More professional staff; more collaborative and cooperative efforts with Institutes, associations - formal and informal set up now; working with other psychological and educational organizations and professional groups to market our ways...Have you asked members why they stay members? What does this society do for them? What do they get from it and what do they want?"

"I have been a member of the Adlerian movement for a quarter century. NASAP has been like a family to me. With these siblings, I have had many days of warm, loving, laughing and learning...

When I joined NASAP, Dreikurs was the yeasty catalyst' exhorting us toward action. Now I find so many Adlerians who know little of Adler's basics...

We do not own gemeinschaftsgefuhl (social interest), we merely have it on loan. It does not belong to family, friends or students for their power or priviledges. If NASAP does not act "as if" our concepts are worth modeling in our behaviors, polishing them through close study, and then giving them away, NASAP will not survive."

"A word of encouragement. I went to a two-day Institute sponsored by AACD on the DSM III-R and treatment plans. The presenter was competent and thorough...She made the point that Adlerian psychology was making a comeback' and is having a "resurgence". She included the Adlerian approach as one of seven theoretical models to use in treatment."

"I claim that the various Adlerian groups are under the control of single individuals or cliques...that they are polarized...ICASSI runs as a private club. Adlerians are fragmented with a number of sub-groups each pursuing its interests and having nothing to do with other groups. In other words, we are a house divided."

"The demand for Adlerian Psychology seems to be lying dormant. We simply need to awaken it! Spread the word...let more people know about the effectiveness of this approach. We can encourage more speakers to go out, round up more parents for a parent study group and encourage parents to speak up and request democratic teachers. When the demand for Adlerian Psychology is created, the supply (of professionals) will take care of itself"
