As I complete a two year term as President, allow me to reflect on our collective ambitions and accomplishments.

Neva Hefner and Marie Stacel do a tremendous job maintaining the organization from our offices in Chicago. But NASAP is much more than their efforts.

Where are we headed? NASAP is gathering momentum and moving forward. Sometimes, it seems, not quickly enough. But trust the movement!

- * We have hired a professional convention coordinator. This reduces enormous demands on the host group and minimizes major financial risks for the Society.
- * We have made significant steps toward financial responsibility, but annual income from memberships and conventions still falls below ever-increasing overhead. The solution, in part, is to increase membership.
- * The new membership brochure is beginning to draw qualified professionals into the Society.
- * We will begin to use the video format to record convention presentations, a significant step toward making our assets competitive with other psychology resources.
- * We are recognizing contributions with the Continental and local Social Interest Awards.
- * The Journals continue in the capable hands of Guy Manaster and Jon Carlson, and the quality of articles continues to increase.
- * This Newsletter has returned to monthly distribution, allowing more space and timeliness for events and information.

I have been impressed with the dedication of our staff, Executive Committee, Delegate Assembly, and the membership. Everyone is not expected to serve on committees, volunteer time and energy, but those who do are magnificent, and draw others into the organization. Our momentum is building.

I believe the following can be accomplished in the next few years:

- * Create and distribute a video training library, including convention programs and workshops. Make the current audio and video resources more accessible.
- * Cooperate more actively with established and emerging Adlerian Institutes, training and perhaps certifying professionals in Individual Psychology.
- * Increase the quality of publications such as this newsletter, and create new ones to serve the members and their populations.
- * Achieve a greater measure of financial stability by increasing membership. This effort must recognize the importance of spending funds wisely to attract members. It must also recognize the value of quality, not quantity.
- * Continue to actively solicit the ideas and needs of the membership, and create the vehicles for accomplishing these tasks.

For most of you, the specifics may be less important than the theme. I am grateful for this opportunity to work with other capable professionals, and look forward to the future.

Adleriana

One day when Dr. Adler was in Boston I asked him to come to the City Hospital and give a clinic there. He did this and when the clinic was over we were talking about the case, which had been a case of voyeurism.

We were talking about some detail when Adler interrupted me and said, "I think of it in this way. Suppose you come into the room and see a man jumping up and down against the wall. You might think he was crazy, but if you knew he was trying to sit on top of the mantlepiece, you wouldn't think that his behavior was so peculiar. You have to understand the person's behavior in terms of what he is trying to do. You have to know his aim before you can understand his conduct."

The vividness with which he said this and used the illustration reminded me that I had been "on the wrong track" in trying to think of the patient's behavior in terms of psychopathology per se.

Adler pointed out what the boy was interested in.

Investigation of this clue lead to a discovery of the patient's deeper and concealed wishes of which the behavior had been an expression.

Of course every psychologist and every physician interested in psychological problems knows these things, but we tend to get lost in the routine of examination and diagnosis. It was Adler's first task always to shepherd the thoughts back to their proper pasture.
