DA Selects 80 Programs for Minneapolis; Book Discount for Members Approved

Eighty programs for the 1989 Convention were selected during the Delegate Assembly meeting in Chicago last month. The programs represent 96 hours of demonstrations, discussion, and presentations across 32 90-minute and 48 60-minute time slots.

Interest Section Delegates selected programs from more than 120 proposals. Highlights of the two days of programs include:

- \* An invited therapist conducting open forum family counseling
- \* Presentation of a clinical case on the first day, followed by discussion of possible treatment plans at a session on the second day.
- \* Ten selected programs for each of five Interest Sections (Clinical, Family Education, Education, Theory and Research, and Business and Organizations).
- \* Twenty programs for the Adlerian Counseling and Therapy (ACT) Interest Section.
  - \* Ten "classic" presentations

Convention registration entitles participation in all 80 programs. Registration brochures will be sent in early 1989 to all NASAP members. Programs will be held on Friday, May 26 and Saturday, May 27 at the Marriott City Center Hotel, Minneapolis.

Fourteen workshops were also announced. See page 2 for a listing of these workshops.

#### Book Discount Program Announced

The Delegate Assembly also authorized a new benefit for NASAP members, effective with the January, 1989 Newsletter.

Selected Adlerian publications will be available at a 20% off list price discount for NASAP members. NASAP will also receive a portion of the proceeds, with income going to the general operating fund. Each book in this program will be available for a limited period of time.

Books will be listed without editorial comment, and must have Adlerian content. Members who wish to have their books listed in this program should contact the central office for specific details of the Book Discount Program.

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#### Convention Video Policy Outlined

The increasing cost and demand for videotape players at Convention programs and workshops has resulted in a new policy. Presenters received a letter this month outlining the following procedures:

If a videotape player is needed, the presenter must pay a rental fee of \$35 per presentation, \$70 per workshop by the deadline in the letter. This fee is far less than typical hotel charges. If a presenter does not follow these guidelines, NASAP cannot assist in the rental of equipment. The person will be instructed to contact the convention hotel to make more expensive direct arrangements.

#### Alfred Adler: As We Remember Him

A book of anecdotes and stories about the man, Alfred Adler, told by those who knew him: his family, his friends, his students and his colleagues. Opening with a short biography, the book concludes with a previously unpublished fable by Alfred Adler.

Edited by Guy J. Manaster, Genevieve Painter, Danica Deutsch and Betty Jane Overholt, the book has just been republished in paperback by NASAP.

From the book:

"Try to see with a child's eyes," Dr. Adler suggested, "hear with a child's ears and feel with a child's heart."

"Adler told the story about a woman who was evidently very annoyed with her husband and who could not sleep. He said to her, "Tonight when you cannot sleep think of some very nice things you could do for your husband. Call me in the morning and tell me about them.

The next morning she phoned and said, "Oh, Dr. Adler, I am sorry I have nothing to report. I slept so soundly through the night."

I remember when I asked Adler when it was too late for a man to change. He said, "Oh, maybe 1 or 2 days before he dies."

On an occasion, somebody asked, "What is the meaning of life?" Adler answered, "There is no general meaning of life; the meaning of life is that which you give to your own life."

#### Maurie's Legacy

[Maurice Bullard, a distinguished NASAP member, was profiled by Wendy Madar of the Corvallis, Oregon <u>Gazette-Times</u>. Excerpts from her article are reprinted with permission.]

Maurice Bullard, 80, got my attention by writing: "I have had the noted orchestra conductor, Jacques Gerschovitch, scream at me, 'I keela you!"

I'd never heard of Gerschovitch but I could tell Bullard would give me a good story. He did.

He told about sharing licorice with FDR's private secretary and about how the controversial counseling program he instituted in Corvallis schools years ago has become mainstream.

"I grew up on a farm near Estacada where I knew people who'd crossed the plains by covered wagon," Bullard told me when I visited him and his wife, Eva.

"My goal was to be a safeway manager. My people didn't go to college but those were depression days and there were no jobs. Finally, it dawned on me that there were jobs - for people with skills."

He enrolled at Oregon State College and earned a degree in industrial arts with a minor in music. It was there that a "fiery Russian" conductor from Portland nearly attacked him.

"He told us to play a quiet passage but I didn't understand him and played one marked double fortissimo - I blared. He broke his baton over the stand and came for me..."

Bullard returned to Corvallis [after World War II] to get a master's degree in education and study psychology. He became a follower of Alfred Adler, the father of group counseling and enemy of Freud, who believed individual psychoanalysis was the only way to treat emotional problems.

That interest still echoes in Corvallis schools because, when Bullard became guidance director for Corvallis in 1959, he used Adlerian methods to straighten out difficult kids.

"Adlerians recommend a solution - they don't just analyze the problem. We were accused of just treating symptoms. But ordinary people don't have medical problems, they have behavior problems!"

He hired Yvonne Thomas, now assistant principal at Crescent Valley High, School, to start the first class in Oregon for kids with behavior problems.

"Maurie wanted to help kids become responsible for their behavior," Thomas told me when I called her later. "He got us out front and running. For kids, he was a positive dreamer, always saying `What if. ."

The methods sound familiar now, but were progressive in the 1960s. He believed that kids - and their families - needed help in

identifying why they misbehaved and clear solutions.

"We worked with parents and teachers to see that kids got attention at the proper time," Bullard said. "If they whine or cry, you stiffen your backbone and walk away - but you make sure to do nice things when they're not misbehaving...Most districts had no counseling in elementary schools. But if you can get them going in the right direction then, they won't need your help later."

Bullard also pioneered parent groups, used now around the country, and started the first classes for handicapped and teachable mentally retarded kids.

I parted from Bullard with a deepened sense of the way one generation's efforts build invisibly on the next. My kids are affected by the work this man did years ago, and yet, I might easily never have met him.

If you do good work it will live on - whether or not your name makes it into history books.

#### In Memoriam

Nicholas S. Ionedes died November 8th in Arlington, Virginia. He was an Adlerian psychiatrist practicing in Washington, D.C. Nick was a well-known and respected member of NASAP, having attended 17 consecutive Conventions before illness prevented his attendance at the Seattle Convention.

Catherine Kenneth, a Montessori teacher who was a dedicated supporter of the Adlerian movement, died after a long illness. She received training at the Alfred Adler Institute, and trained her teachers and parents in Adlerian-Dreikursian principles.

#### Letters to the Editor

My good friend, Ed Kal, in a letter to the editor (October, 1988) makes an assumption that "FREE" in the name of the organization Adler founded after leaving the Freudian group was "in contrast...to the requirements of "orthodoxy" he experienced in Freud's Psychoanalytic Society." If one grants Kal's assumption, then his conclusions may logically follow. However, I question the validity of Kal's assumption.

For one thing, I am not certain that this society was an Adlerian society. It may merely have been a splinter Freudian group. For a second, I raised the question of the meaning of "FREE" with Professor Ansbacher publicly at a meeting of the International Association of Individual Psychology in Montreal. I told him that I had never been able to determine the meaning of that word in the name of the organization and that for years I had been telling my students that "FREE" probably meant free of Freud.

In other words, it was another Freudian society; it was merely free of Freud's direct influence. While I said this facetiously, Ansbacher confirmed that this is what it probably meant. Given this alternative interpretation of "FREE", Kal's argument collapses.
