Psychotherapeutic Interventions with the Elderly: Are Adlerians Gerontophobic?

Today, about 13% of the U.S. population, more than 26 million persons, are over the age of 65, with forecasts of 20% by 2030. Estimates are that 20-30% of the elderly suffer from a psychiatric disorder but only 2-4% receive mental health outpatient services. That so few seek professional help has less to do with ability to pay and more to do with underavailability of services and the "gerontophobia" of mental health providers.

Gerontophobia refers to the health professional's pessimistic outlook about achieving therapeutic success with persons over the age of 65. Mosak and Nystul (1985) noted the paucity of Adlerian contributions to the literature on treatment of the elderly. A relatively small number of articles -- 33 --are referenced in volumes I and II of Harold and Birdie Mosak's <u>A Bibliography for Adlerian</u> Psychology. Many of these are in foreign language sources.

When this is compared with the several thousand other Bibliography citations is it proper to conclude that Adlerians may be as gerontophobic" as other health professionals? NASAP members need to ponder this question. Following are highlights from the work of some Adlerians who have met the challenge of providing psychotherapeutic treatment to the elderly.

Early Adlerian Contributions to the Care of the Elderly

Alfred Adler wrote relatively little about the elderly, but what he did say was extraordinarily perceptive. He said:

"Not much is done for old people in our culture...Many persons seem to be changed when they are older, and this is mainly due to the fact that they feel futile and useless. They try to prove their worth and value again in the same way as adolescents do. They interfere and want to show in many ways that they are not old and will not be overlooked, or else they become disappointed and depressed."

(Adler, 1965, p.443)

Adler's general theoretical approach has been found to be quite useful with the elderly. In his review of nine representative theories of personality and psychotherapy, Brinks (1979) concluded that the Adlerian approach was the

most comprehensive approach to understanding and treating the concerns of the elderly.

Little is written about Adler's own therapeutic endeavors with the elderly. Nevertheless, some with beliefs similar to Adler have written about their work with the elderly. One of these was Lillian J. Martin (1944). Dr. Martin, an early pioneer in geriatric psychotherapy, developed the "Martin Method" in the 1930's. Her approach was rather brief, lasting only about five sessions, problem-focused, and centered around a comprehensive assessment of the individual's strengths and encouragement. Needless to say, her method was largely ignored by the medical and psychological professions, in favor of the psychoanalytically-oriented approaches of that

Today our psychoanalytic colleagues continue to develop and expand their theory and methods with the elderly. I am aware of only three recent efforts to translate Adlerian theory and interventions to the elderly. They have been described by J. Keller and G. Hughston (1980) T.L. Brink (1979), and B. Shulman and R. Berman (1988)

Counseling The Elderly: Keller and Hughston

Keller and Hughston developed an approach targeted to the fairly well functioning, non-psychotic, and non-demented elderly. Taking a systems approach to the elderly, Keller and Hughston modified Dreikurs' Four Goals. The specified four levels of unproductive behavior: attention, bossy, counterhurt, and disablement of ingenious intervention strategies. Two types of strategies are described: generic and specific, are provided to reverse these levels.

Generic strategies are efforts to promote social interest, self-esteem, encouragement and family involvement. They describe numerous ways of promoting these four factors. Keller and Hughston also describe several specific intervention methods. Some of these are reminiscence exercises, contracting, group assembly, and couples conferences.

Geriatric psychotherapy: Brinks

T.L. Brink is the editor of the well respected quarterly, the Clinical Gerontologist. Brink's book (1979) addresses the more dysfunctional psychiatric presentations in the elderly such as major depression, anxiety and delusional disorders, and organic brain syndromes. He reports that various combinations of individual and group (Continued on page 2)

approaches can foster and maintain self-esteem and social interest with the most dysfunctional and discouraged patient. Interestingly, he reports that such therapeutic interventions can actually slow the progression of chronic organic brain syndrome like Alzheimer's Disease.

Brinks has found that the primary reason for the success of geriatric psychotherapy is that a long life constitutes valuable experience in effective coping, and that brief, problem-centered therapy provides the individual the additional training they need to cope with the problems of aging. He believes that the mechanism for therapeutic efficacy lies in training the patient to think and act nonpathologically. He describes a variety of innovative, problem-focused psychotherapeutic interventions that can be utilized in individual, family and milieu contexts.

Supporting the Families of the Elderly: Shulman and Berman

Like Adler, Shulman and Berman attribute many of the problems of the elderly to a loss of a

(--Continued from Page 2--) sense of belonging in their social structure leading to a loss of self-esteem and meaning in life. The ways in which the elderly compensate for this loss can baffle, frustrate, and infuriate their younger relatives and loved ones. These authors tailor Dreikur's scheme of four goals of child misbehavior to three common goals of the elderly: excessive demands for attention, love and service; power display to retain status; and, getting even or revenge.

Shulman and Berman provide adult children information, suggestions and encouragement for restructuring their relationship with their elderly parents so that both can cope and enjoy life and each other with less conflict and guilt. The authors provides answers to the most often asked questions for dealing with the needs of the elderly; and provide information on the indications and referral procedure for psychotherapy.

Concluding Comments

While awaiting response from NASAP members to my initial query, I believe the concluding observations can be made. First, while the extent of the literature in Individual Psychology regarding the condition and treatment of the elderly is indeed modest, its contributions are noteworthy and significant. A review of this literature suggests that the high quality of these contribution, particularly by Keller, hughston and Brinks, is probably without peer among other psychotherapy systems. Shulman and Berman's contribution to the families of the elderly is

likewise exceptional. Secondly, the Adlerian approach is exceedingly positive and hopeful in its prospects for treating the elderly. part this is related to the growth model rather than disease model that forms the basis of the theory. But equally as important is the fact that this approach does get results! Initial reports of the effectiveness of Adlerian-oriented programs are very encouraging. Finally, there are needs. One is for more widespread application and evaluation of the existing treatment models and programs. Another is the need for further development and translation of other Adlerian concepts and therapeutic interventions to the concerns of the ever growing number of elderly in our midst.

Book Review

Edith A. Dewey, <u>Basic Applications of Adlerian</u>
Psychology for self-understanding and Human
Relationships. CMTI Press, 1978. Paperback, 52
pages. List price, \$6.95.

Edith Dewey's work has become a classic introduction to Individual Psychology, used by dozens of students in Institutes across the continent.

She approached me with an intriguing opportunity: a collection of notes, summaries and clarifications of coursework she had taken with teachers such as Rudolf Dreikurs, Bill Pew, Harold Mosak, and the Ansbachers. Would we be interested in publishing these materials?

One glance at the manuscript made it clear Edith had a firm grasp of the Basic Concepts, and she had arranged them in a logical sequence for a course she and her husband Milton taught across the country.

Since its publication more than 10 years ago, I've frequently referred to it when preparing for an introductory lecture. Topics include "Five Basic Principles of Adlerian Psychology formulated by Dr. Rudolf Dreikurs", "Early Recollections", "Adlerian Theory of Dreams", and "Early Recollections".

The success of this booklet probably parallels the success of Adlerian Psychology -- modest, sustained, and substantial. We've had calls to order this book that ask for "That orange-covered manual that's a Cliff's Notes of Adlerian Psychology." An accurate description!

If you've never seen this material, your Adlerian library is not complete. Whenever I open the book, I feel privy to years of attention and understanding in classrooms I'll never be able to visit. Dreikurs and Pew are gone, but their teaching lives on in this publication.
