## NASAP to Co-Sponsor Satellite TeleConference

NASAP will take part in a national videoconference, "Taking Time for Love: Moving Toward a Successful Marriage", on Thursday, November 15th.

This is the first teleconference which NASAP has co-sponsored. Other sponsors include professional organizations such as APA Division 43 (Family Counseling); Association for Couples in Marriage Enrichment (ACME); and the AACD International Marriage and Family Counseling (IAMFC) division.

The teleconference will be broadcast via satellite from Governors State University, located in the southern suburbs of Chicago. It will be sent as a live feed from a satellite from 10am to 1pm, Central time, including a 30 minute break.

NASAP member Jon Carlson will serve as moderator and participant in a panel. Carlson has co-authored materials such as TIME for a Better Marriage and serves as Editor of the Practice and Applications issues of the NASAP journal.

Other panel participants include Augustus Napier, author of The Family Crucible and Letty Cottin Pogrebin, author of Family Politics. Pogrebin was also a luncheon speaker at the 1990 NASAP convention in Philadelphia.

Prerecorded materials to be included in this program include demonstrations of marriage skills, documentary footage, and participation by a studio audience. Interactive segments from remote sites via telephone and fax response are possible.

Report to the Society 38th Annual NASAP Convention Philadelphia, Pennsylvania

This report was delivered at the General Assembly during the Philadelphia convention. Portions have been edited, and membership reflects information as of September, 1990.

The Society carried an \$11,000 surplus from 1988 which covered the above \$8,056 difference between the above 1989 income and expenses.

Although the deficit was covered, a \$10 increase in member dues for this year was approved by the EC and DA to strengthen the Society's financial position.

#### Scholarships and Grants

NASAP continues to offer scholarships to attend the annual convention. Scholarships have also been sponsored by interest sections.

The Theory and Interest section has created a Research Fund from which graduate students can receive small amounts of money to cover expenses in their research efforts.

#### Publications

\* The Newsletter is published 10 times each year. Improvements in the past year have been the "Book of the Month" at 20% discount (and income to NASAP), and the continuation of a column by Len Sperry, M.D., Ph.D. on contemporary issues.

- \* The Society publishes a quarterly Journal, <a href="Individual Psychology">Individual Psychology</a>. Two issues are edited by Jon Carlson and focus on practice and application; two issues on theory and research are edited by Guy Manaster. The Journal is a major strength of NASAP and the editors are to be commended for their work.
- \* The Resource Book has entered a third printing, and our reprint of Alfred Adler as we Remember Him is also available.
- \* A Media Resources List has been compiled and is now available to members. It lists all known videotapes and films, their price and publisher.
- \* Issues surrounding the disbursement of the Clonick publications fund have been resolved. We now have a procedure to evaluate potential publications. This fund is available for proposals.
- \* An effort to continue the translation of Adler's writings continues. At this writing, the effort is not formally affiliated with NASAP, although members are involved in this project.

#### Other items

Carol Arnold Memorial Bequest: We are placing advertising in professional journals to stimulate awareness of our convention and society. Expenses are paid from interest; the principal is untouched.

## On the Humanization of Psychoanalysis

Heinz L. Ansbacher, Ph.D. University of Vermont

(Editor's Note: Dr. Ansbacher has been invited to comment on the world of Individual Psychology in these pages. He chose to respond to Len Sperry's column on "Recent Developments in Psychoanalysis")

The humanistic psychology movement has since its inception been in many ways similar to Adler's Individual Psychology (Ansbacher, 1971; Obuchowski, 1988). The three main founders of the movement, Abraham Maslow, Rollo May and Carl Rogers, acknowledged Adler's direct influence (Ansbacher, 1990).

In view of this, an observation by Tom Greening, editor of the <u>Journal of Humanistic</u> Psychology, regarding the organizational development during the last decade of humanistic psychology relative to psychoanalysis is of interest also to the Adlerian psychologist. Greening (1990) writes: "Within the American Psychological Association, membership in the Division of Humanistic Psychology has dropped by 23% to 661 since 1980, while the Division of Psychoanalysis has grown by 167% to 2,470. Perhaps this is due to the humanization of psychoanalysis, now that many adherents are abandoning drive theory in favor of concepts that include the experiencing self, the primary of relationships and the key role of empathy...So there are signs that some old chasms are being creatively bridged. That still leaves an important role for an independent humanistic psychology, even while it enriches other fields" (p.5).

Greening's explanation of this development and the conclusions he draws appear applicable also with regard to Adlerian psychology. They are also quite in line with a recent paper by Len Sperry. Sperry (1990) draws attention to "the significant changes and developments among the various psychoanalytic schools" (Part 1, p.1), all indicating "emerging points of convergence between Psychoanalysis and Individual Psychology" (Part 2, p.3), of which we should keep abreast. Yet, "Clear differences remain" (Part 2, p.6).
