President's Message

The Executive Committee and Delegate Assembly met in Chicago the first weekend in November to conduct the business of the organization.

- * Fifty-six programs for the 1991 Tucson meeting were selected, The increase in $90\,$ minute slots enhanced our ability to select programs which emphasize training. The addition of Poster Sessions also enabled us to include a larger menu of short programs.
- * Preliminary plans for the '92 Chicago convention were discussed. This convention will mark the 40th anniversary of the foundation of both NASAP and the Alfred Adler Institute of Chicago. Initial discussions focused on in-depth training opportunities for members. You will be hearing more about this in the coming months.
- * A major block of time was devoted to setting a course for the future. In order to accomplish this, it was necessary to define and prioritize our organizational goals. The next step was to develop a systematic plan to address these goals.

Since 1991 marks the end of NASAP's fourth decade, the Delegate Assembly selected the following goal to prepare for the fifth decade:

TO PROVIDE A CONTEXT FOR AFFILIATION, NETWORKING AND BELONGING FOR THOSE INTERESTED IN ADLERIAN PSYCHOLOGY

During 1991, NASAP will work to increase services to current members, and identify and communicate with existing Adlerian organizations, institutions, academics and faculty involved in Individual Psychology training. A section of the Newsletter will be devoted to the "search for missing Adlerians". You will learn of old friends found and be asked to help locate those who are still missing.

Two additional goals were identified and will be addressed in future programs of work,

* The Delegate Assembly is exploring the possibility of creating a NASAP foundation. This would enable us to develop programs which meet the needs of the membership.

The '90's are shaping up to be the most exciting decade of this century. The iron curtain has been flung open and many autocratic governments seek help in instituting democratic reforms.

Adlerians can provide a model which will assist the people of these nations as they struggle to learn democratic principles.

Your Delegate Assembly believes NASAP is the organization to help you meet this challenge.

DA Selects 56 Programs for Tucson; Poster Sessions Added, Slots Shifted

More "longer" sessions; fewer "shorter" sessions; and new "poster" sessions were created for Tucson '91 by the Delegate Assembly.

The changes reflect increased requests for program space, and feedback from convention participants. In the 1991 Tucson convention, there will be 35 ninety (90) minute programs and 21 sixty (60) minute programs. More programs will be added as the convention program is finalized.

Poster Sessions

Additional presentations will be offered as "poster" sessions. These sessions will run concurrently in a single room, allow for informal interaction between presenter and participants, and allow more information to be presented at the convention. There may be as many as 36 poster sessions.

Program proposals for the convention were considered for either traditional or poster session status. If a program was considered appropriate as a poster session, the presenter was asked to approve this designation.

Track Allocations Shifted

The number of programs in each Interest Section track has been changed. In past years, tracks were allocated "equally" with ACT receiving a double allocation and a track set aside for classic and other selections. This system, however, created inequalities in the allocation system.

For example, in past years, some tracks were allocated 10 slots and received 11 proposals, while others were allocated 10 slots and had 22 proposals. This imbalance made quality control and fairness an issue during EC and DA discussions earlier this month.

Programs for Tucson '91 were allocated to Interest Sections based on number of proposals. The track allocations are: ACT 18, Education 5, Business and Organizations 5, Clinicians 6, Family Education 6, Theory and Research 10, and Potpourri 6.

Some scholarships to offset registration fees will be available. An endorsement by a graduate faculty sponsor is needed, regardless of scholarship.

Deadline for submission of proposals for the Graduate Student Forum is December, 1990. For additional information and an application form, contact the Chicago central office.

Book Review

Raising Kids Who Can. Betty Lou Bettner, Ph.D., & Amy Lew, Ph.D. Connexions Press, 1990.

Adlerians have a longstanding commitment to working with families. I know, because my life was touched by Rudolf Dreikurs decades before I became President of NASAP. Our family had family meetings, and our family has family meetings; two families and three generations touched by Adlerian parenting concepts.

Betty Lou Bettner and Amy Lew have created a fresh, insightful synthesis of strategies for becoming a more functional, responsible, and capable family. I learned, in part because they have added to the Adlerian formula (their entry level is not the four goals of misbehavior, but the three C's) so familiar to many of us. They also deal with parenting issues of the 1990's. Sections of the book briefly deal with single parenting, foster families, the only child, and other derivations of the nuclear family.

This is a book about family meetings, but it is also a book about the bigger picture that makes family meetings (and families) work. In my professional experience, many families use the concepts of encouragement, consequences, and communication, but fall short when it comes to actually having family meetings. The authors have practical, encouraging suggestions for making the meetings work, and outline the consequences when families choose not to hold the meetings. The book has a practical approach with a clear writing style.

This book gives professionals and families insight into the specific methods of making meetings work. For example, Bettner and Lew have sample agendas from their family meetings, as well as an agenda for families with young children. There are many practical suggestions throughout the book, such as this on chores:

"There is no one way or one best way to set up a system for doing chores. The goal of getting the work completed is secondary. The primary goal is to find ways that all members can feel they contribute to the welfare of the group and are needed, valued, and appreciated."

Bettner and Lew have more than 35 years of experience in conducting family meetings, have raised six children and provided care for 15 foster children. The book is filled with practical examples but is not limited to their own families. Separate and substantial sections on encouragement and logical consequences are also part of this book.

We can choose how our family lives, and the ways we live with each other. Bettner and Lew prove this through deed and spoken word. Raising Kids Who Can is a welcome addition to the Adlerian parent education library.
