

Executive Director's Message

We are pleased to report still another important fact about the 1991 NASAP convention held in Tucson. In addition to the favorable comments reported in the last newsletter, the convention was a financial success!

The line item in the 1991 NASAP budget for NASAP's share from the annual convention is \$25,000, which represents 20.5% of NASAP's total budgeted income. Proceeds from the Tucson convention netted NASAP slightly more than that budgeted amount.

NASAP is indebted to the Adlerian Society of Arizona (host group) and Centennial Conferences for holding the line on expenses and managing the financial affairs of the convention so prudently. And, of course, we are grateful to all those who showed their support of NASAP by attending the 39th annual convention and workshops.

Program art work

To follow up on the President's final paragraph in her August-September message, what was unusual about the art work in the convention program booklet? Did anyone notice the symbolism expressed?

The cover used the same logo that was on the preliminary flier and the convention registration flier--line drawing of a family of four. Father and mother had arms around each other, daughter was holding mother's hand, the son was next to father but not touching him. The logo was repeated on first page of convention program and the son was reaching towards the father. On the last page, the son was holding his father's hand so that by the end of the convention, the family of the 90's was connected.

Membership

After June 1, new members may join as half-year members, paying half the dues. We looked back at our records and noted that 302 people joined as half-year members over the past 7 years and 45% of those people are still members of the Society. We also observed that 13.5% of our current membership began their association with NASAP as half-year members.

1991 membership, as of August 21, stands at 1,169, which is greater than the total membership for any of the past seven years. Total membership for each year ranged from 1,042 to 1,143 since 1984. This is encouraging news.

Executive Committee and Delegate Assembly

The Executive Committee is scheduled to meet September 28 and 29 and again on November 1. The Delegate Assembly will meet November 2 and 3. Anyone who has suggested agenda items should see that they reach the central office a minimum of two weeks prior to the meeting.

Focus On: Marti Wilson

Recently back from several weeks in London, Marti Wilson, M.A., told the Newsletter she was on a business counseling mission "to maximize the potential of every employee at British Petroleum Exploration", one of the largest firms in Great Britain. She called her work there "an exciting, challenging and thoroughly enjoyable experience". Her original six week assignment was extended by three weeks and she expects to return again in September.

Such success is not uncommon for Marti because she knows first hand how valuable Adlerian ideas are to corporations. "As Adlerians we have not been as active in the workplace as we could be," she commented. She has proved to be the exception -- for the past nine years corporation clients have comprised greater than 90 percent of her counseling business.

Marti calls her program package for these clients, "Quality of Worklife". She finds most Adlerian principles translate well in the corporate environment. Principles such as cooperation, encouragement, mutual respect and social interest are very much a part of a "corporate culture" she is working to develop. In corporations, the ideas are not initially presented as "Adlerian", she notes. "Business people want to see results...then they ask questions about theory and background. Of course I always build into the discussion an awareness of Individual Psychology, since it is the foundation of my work."

Marti's business clientele includes all types of corporations -- financial institutions, hospitals, architectural firms, out-placement agencies, and several international companies. She says corporations are different from her other clients because they are "wary about a lot of psychological (fluff). In addition to caring for their employees, they want to see results, read excellent evaluations, and get their money's worth."

Within the corporation, Marti enjoys working with all levels of employees but especially appreciates her contact with CEO's and senior management. Senior management is sometimes a neglected group, she says. They are often excluded from these activities because of their schedules and the demands of their position.

"I've found working with senior management is a special challenge and also very enjoyable. They're the ones who can make it happen." A multitude of problems within the corporate structure are addressed by her business seminar. She presents workshops dealing with issues such as: courtesy under pressure, turnover, performance reviews, team building, problem solving, stress and time management, life style design, negotiation, motivation and goal setting. Another successful part of the program are brown bag discussions on parenting, self-esteem, and relationships."

Marti has found the need for psychological counseling in business is so great that she hasn't had to advertise. She receives her clientele entirely through word of mouth. It's an open field. Progressive companies are very interested in this sort of program. Now more than ever, corporations are tuned into human dynamics...sensitivity to people and their problems.

Her awareness of corporate needs surfaced 15 years ago when she was working as a psychological counselor at a private girls school in Columbus, Ohio. "I realized that I was working with families representing the stress of 'corporate Columbus'".

One weekend while attending a counselor's conference, she heard her first lecture on Adlerian psychology. "I felt that this theory (addressing life tasks) would be an excellent place to start." A few weekend courses in Cleveland, taught by Leo Gold and Harold Mosak, convinced her that she was on the right track. A few months later she enrolled in the Alfred Adler Institute of Chicago and received her masters degree in 1982.

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Letter to the Editor

I have pondered for some time now on Dr. Len Sperry's essay, "NASAP As A Professional Organization: To Be Or Not to Be?", which appeared in the NASAP Newsletter, and the subsequent response letters that were published.

While I appreciate Dr. Sperry's concern and interest in our Society, I have some differing perspectives to share.

His visions about NASAP being consulted by the United Nations and compared in a research study to Prozac are not shared by this Adlerian. This would not be my criteria in measuring how successful NASAP is. I hope that more meaningful and realistic objectives are possible.

Dr. Sperry's reference to the American Psychological Association and its development into a "Professional Organization" as a means of assessing NASAP's development, is in my opinion a poor comparison. The APA, and other such organizations (the other APA, NASW, NBCC, AAMFT, etc.) represent professional disciplines, and as such command by their very definition, a large membership body and the significant financial resources that such a body generates. Each are "Professional Organizations" as they each represent professions. These organizations properly move toward an administrative structure characteristic of large institutions. NASAP, on the other hand, is a membership society centered around a particular historical figure, theory, values, and principles. We are proud to note that the applications of our common philosophy cut across the professional disciplines, and in addition, para-professional and non-professional areas of human life. The very nature of our society keep it from being

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at work as well, or parented my children with the kind of respect that allows them to grow and prosper. We cannot expect NASAP to do it! NASAP is a membership society that provides us with the nourishment to better do our work of applying and promoting Adlerian Psychology. I do believe our expectations of what NASAP should do is often beyond the scope of a membership society, and may act as a compensation for our own sense of incompleteness.

While I am satisfied with our current administrative structure, continuing development is essential. The strategic planning process that Dr. Nicoll so ably pointed out is fundamental to any progressive organization. We must make our goals and expectations clear and realistic. In addition, to balance what our professional paid staff is able to do, we must make our volunteer structure more efficient and accountable. As a consequence, our D.A. and E.C. members could follow more projects to completion as opposed to making recommendations and expecting our central office staff to do the follow through. I saw

encouraging evidence of this in our last D.A. meeting, where we were very conscientious about turning recommendations into motions into action plans, and where we are clarifying the job descriptions of delegates, which will allow more to get accomplished between meetings.

Finally, I have to say that one person comes to mind as I reflect on this dialogue that Dr. Len Sperry initiated, our Executive Director, Neva Hefner. I have had the privilege of working closely with Neva through our work on the Executive Committee and Delegate Assembly. I also had the benefit of working directly with her throughout the hiring process of our Administrative Assistant. My points are these - We are lucky to have her! She is an exceptional Executive Director! She is dedicated to Adlerian Psychology and to NASAP! She works long hours and has accepted a salary far below what she could command elsewhere! I highly respect her!

Let's not allow our ambitions to get in the way of recognizing the realities of what we are, and what we have.

a "professional organization". As Guy Manaster so appropriately pointed out in his letter to the editor, there is not such thing as a "Professional Adlerian." Therefore, Dr. Sperry's call for a new administrative structure, more specifically "appointing" a highly respected Adlerian as CEO, to move us toward becoming a professional organization is based on a false premise. The result would be, in my assessment, an administrative structure not appropriate to our membership society.

As a current member of the Delegate Assembly and Executive Committee, I have a close working knowledge of the structure, development, and financial status of NASAP. By reviewing the NASAP budget, Dr. Sperry's proposal is further hampered by financial realities. Our 1,000 plus membership organization is able to generate enough revenue to hire our Executive Director, part-time Administrative Assistant and part-time Secretary. These three individuals are able, through their maximum effort, to keep up with the tremendous volume of work our Society produces. Since the only real sources of revenue for our Society are membership fees and convention proceeds, I am alerted to the fact that to generate the necessary funds to hire a highly respected Adlerian as CEO, would be to significantly raise dues and/or convention registration fees. Based on the feedback we have received from members, these

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increases would significantly over-burden our membership, and likely result in membership decreases rather than increases.

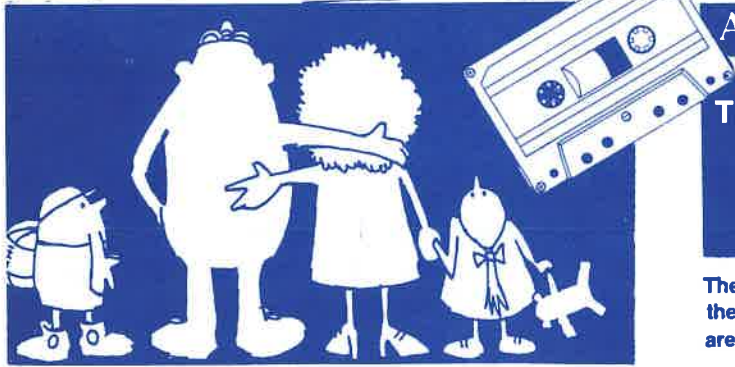
I also take exception to Dr. Sperry's implication that our annual convention somehow falls short of being "enjoyable and professionally challenging." I have attended many conventions and find the NASAP convention to be as enjoyable and professionally challenging as any, and continually receive this same feedback from others.

I, for one, find NASAP to currently be an effective and contributive membership society. I do fear that some Adlerians look to NASAP to make things happen, to make Adlerian Psychology acceptable and perhaps even the "superior" system that would stimulate organizations like the United Nations to choose us to consult with. Conversely, these same individuals so easily blame NASAP for insufficient recognition of Adlerian Psychology (and therefore their own work). As Dreikurs so wisely pointed out, "the more we don't know what to do, the more we know what others should do." This is a "pampered" perspective, and one I recognize frequently in professional circles.

I'd rather see the membership look to NASAP to provide the necessary stimulation, affiliation, education and support which allows us each to make a greater impact through our own work in our own community. Without NASAP's support, I would not have founded the San Diego Society of Adlerian Psychology, developed the San Diego Branch of the Americas Institute of Adlerian Studies, published an Adlerian-based parenting book, been as effective as I am now as a therapist, supervised and managed my counseling component (continued on page 6)
