# Two-Day Workshop Features Training Parent Educators

A two-day workshop (June 9-10), called **Teaching Parenting**, will be offered at the 1993 NASAP Convention in Toronto. "The workshop is geared toward nurses, parent educators, counselors, school personnel and anyone wishing to start or enhance parenting classes," said Lynn Lott who will be presenting the workshop with Jane Nelsen.

Lott and Nelsen have been parent educators for over 23 years and will use eight major parenting resource books in conjunction with their training materials. "We are not promoting one particular course, but a way to get parents involved in the Adler/Dreikurs materials and keep them coming back for more," Lott explained.

The presentation will feature several demonstrations of experiential activities and role plays which seek to take parents beyond intellectual learning into practical application of various teaching points. Demonstrations will include a process which Lott and Nelsen call "Helping Family Problem-Solving Steps", This process focuses on providing parents with help in solving their specific problems.

Part of the problem-solving demonstrations will seek to reach parents with cultural differences, limited reading skills and/or special problems with children. Recommended reading before the workshop: Positive Discipline by Nelson and/or I'm On Your Side: Resolving Conflict With Your Teenage Son or Daughter by Nelsen and Lott.

Members wishing to attend Teaching Parenting should note it is the only workshop on June 9, preceding regular convention dates of June 10-13 at the Four Seasons Inn on the Park Hotel.

# **Empowerment and Social Interest**

Empowerment seems to be the word for counseling process in the nineties, and like other words and phrases that have been used to capture themes in the helping professions, empowerment will be significantly useful, then over used, and finally misused many times before the quality of its meaning fades. It is no coincidence that the concept has gained popularity as counselors begin to meet the challenge of incorporating gender awareness and an appreciation for cultural diversity into their practice.

Different cultures (especially those easily identified by race and color) and almost all women have long experienced disempowerment at the hands of a dominant culture and that part of the male population in control at any given time. In one sense, empowerment makes it possible for people to take charge of their lives and feel capable of meeting life's tasks with a new confidence and even optimism.

#### **Courage Reflects Social Interest**

The link between courage and power is very important, since courage is often a reflection of at least some social interest and the optimism that can be generated when a person perceives that s/he is not alone in life's struggles. A sense of courage helps people to meet the challenges that must be faced. It is the lack of courage which can very easily lead to misuse of power. Such people lack what Adler called psychological tolerance. When faced with threat, a lack of courage, and diminished social interest, they too often over compensate.

Counselors often work with couples and families when the difficulties that must be faced seem insurmountable to the people involved. The couple or family has used whatever resources were immediately available; tried to apply whatever coping could be generated; and now most everyone is feeling stuck, at a low level of psychological tolerance, and lacking a sense of power over their lives and their situation.

#### What Adlerians Can Offer

Adlerian counselors have many role-functions which contribute to empowerment with social interest. The role-function of providing an enlarged focus, for example, can serve the purposes of taking the pressure off a given situation, creating options, or replacing a negative and critical assessment with an understanding of perhaps benign motivation. The notion that everything can always be something else, "everything can also be different," is not only encouraging; it is also the basis for reframing intentions, problems and process into opportunities for change.

Empowerment coupled with social interest reconnects individuals to their personal strengths and resources; reconnects partners building a life together; and invites harmony in formerly distressed systems. Like all great learnings, empowerment is more often "caught" from the counselor than taught.

### **NASAP Initiates Summer Institute**

In the summer of 1993 (August 1-14), the North American Society of Adlerian Psychology is offering a two-week training experience for professionals in, and those training for, the helping professions. Held at the University of British Columbia in Canada, the institute will be led by Oscar Christensen, Clair Hawes and Jim Bitter. Training will feature demonstrations, didactic presentations, and live supervision in facilitating growth, empowerment, and change with individuals, couples and families. A preview of the training will be offered in preconvention workshops for the American Counseling Association in Atlanta, March 1993 and for NASAP in Toronto, June 1993. ### ICASSI To Be Held In Czech City of Brno

(For the first time in its conference history, ICASSI will hold its 1993 sessions in an Eastern European city. The University of Marsaryk in Brno, Czechoslavakia will host the 1993 ICASSI event, July 18-30. Most attendees will be visiting an Eastern European city for the first time. NASAP member Bill Linden was in Brno last summer and provides the Newsletter with a description of the city.)

The Czech Republic is much more like Austria than Russia. There are banks and currency exchanges, the shops are filled with consumer goods and the grocery stores are like our old supermarkets. Privatization has gone a long way and there is a stable currency. One can use credit cards in the better restaurants and hotels. But there is no escaping the United States. When we stopped in Prague for lunch, the St. Louis Blues were playing the Toronto Maple Leafs on TV. I had traveled half-way around the world to see my hometown team.

Brno is a bustling city of 350,000-400,000 people. It has a sparkling new trade center and there is a strong drive to make foreigners know that Brno is on the map. The Rector of the University went out of his way to impress me that Prague is not the only city in the Czech Republic. I told him as an Adlerian he should not suffer from inferiority feelings.

One thing the communists did that has not changed: they heavily subsized the arts. Hence, art is cheap and easily accessible. The best seats at the

symphony cost 12 crowns...about forty cents. Those seats would cost over forty dollars in the U.S. A Coca Cola costs eight crowns, a beer six crowns, so that gives some idea of comparative prices.

They are quite proud of their wines and their wines are inexpensive. The food in the restaurants is excellent. It is also inexpensive by American standards...three or four dollars for a complete meal, a dollar for a litre of wine.

There is much interest in Adlerian Psychology. Articles on Adler are now appearing in Czech professional journals. The Russian editions of *Happy Children (Children The Challenge)* is available.

### **Letter To The Editor**

#### TO STRAIGHTEN THE RECORD:

My students were fond of saying that it took Adlerians at least twenty years to pick up on some of my ideas, if they ever did so. So I was delighted to see the first mention of Stroking and Two Core Adlerian Spitting: Counseling Skills in Eckstein, D., Baruth, L., & Mahrer, D., An Introduction to Life-Style Assessment, Third Edition: Dubuque, Iowa, 1992, Page 112. Unfortunately the authorship of the Stroking and Spitting was inadvertently given to Arthur Nikelly. Here is its history, just to keep the record straight.

Stroking and Spitting was introduced in my paper at the American Society of Adlerian Psychology annual meeting (May 1967) in my paper, "Team Therapy: An Antidote for the Double Bind." Stroking and Spitting became the title of my paper in The Individual Psychologist, 1967, 5 (1), 29-31.

I was asked by Arthur Nikelly to contribute a chapter to his 1971 book, Techniques and Behavior Change: Application of Adlerian Theory. I wrote a chapter entitled, "Action-Oriented Methods. Unfortunately I could not meet his deadline on changes. I asked him to do so and make himself co-author. When Eckstein et al made the bibliographic citation, they did so using the book title, and not the chapter (pgs 85-90).

In the spirit of Alfred Adler, I consider my work to be "an open quarry" where one may mine at will. However, I believe social interest implies that an author should be considerate of future miners, and cite correctly the claim that was worked.
