Endowment To Insure NASAP's Future Growth

NASAP means so many things to so many people: a home for a theory which is powerful and accessible; the publisher of a Journal providing useful information and stimulating arguments; an organization of like-minded individuals; sponsor of an annual convention where friends and colleagues gather to learn from each other ...and so much more.

Executive Director's Message: DA Takes Many Actions In Toronto

We are still feeling the after-glow of the Toronto convention. Each year the convention provides stimulation and nourishment to sustain us through the heavy work load that follows the convention!

Enthusiasm, energy, encouragement, cooperation, willingness to share ideas and to work together so that Adlerian principles will become better known -- these were exhibited as we gathered together to "celebrate diversity and encourage connection" at the Convention and Workshops and at the Executive Committee (E.C.) and Delegate Assembly (D.A.) meetings.

The E.C. met on Wednesday, June 9, just prior to the convention. New Delegates began their work on Wednesday evening at an orientation session and the full D.A. deliberated all day Thursday, June 10. Action and information items included:

• The Education Committee will develop and implement a <u>Continuing Education Needs Assessment</u> questionnaire and design a process whereby training institutes may apply for NASAP sponsorship and/or financial support.

Publications Advisory Committee (P.A.C.) was approved. Members: Robert Armstrong (President), Linda Page (Chair of Publications Committee), Joyce McKay (Past President), Heinz Ansbacher (Past President and former editor). The P.A.C. will review applicants for Theory & Research journal editor and make its recommendation to the Publications Committee by October 1; the Publications Committee will make its recommendation to the D.A. in November.

• Term of office for <u>Practice & Application journal editor</u> expires the end of 1995. The process for filling the position begins with a call for applications in the Newsletter.

• Responsibility was added to job description of D.A. member: to submit a brief article for Newsletter during the Delegate's term of office.

• The Journal is now being included in APA's <u>Psychology Abstracts</u>.

Minneapolis was designated as the 1995 convention site.

• The Convention/Workshop Committee will look at restructuring the conference format to: (a) allow individual to attend more than one section meeting, (b) include presentations on social equality/diversity, and (c) allow for sections to have more meeting time if they choose. Proposal will be presented to D.A. in November.

• Procedures for <u>Convention</u> scholarships were approved: (a) applications to be in central office by March 15; (b) notice of approval sent by April 15; (c) up to 8

Claiming Research

For many years in psychology, the methodology of the natural sciences was taken as the standard against which to measure research. The implication was, among other things, that Adlerian life style interpretation was not seen as research. Indeed, we who use life style assessment have been hard pressed to have it recognized as "real" assessment compared to MMPI and other psychometric approaches.

Following the cognitive science "revolution" in the 1950's, psychology has increasingly borrowed from hermeneutics, grounded theory, and ethnography in recognition of the need to find methodological models which encompass human subjectivity.

This trend is illustrated by the meeting of the Society for Psychotherapy Research which was held in Pittsburgh in June of this year. The Society began two decades ago with an emphasis on quantifying measures of psychotherapy process and outcome. Members were instrumental in investigating the concept of the "therapeutic" or "working" alliance between therapist and client, and in demonstrating its importance to therapeutic outcome. The NIMH study on depression also drew upon Society members.

However, this year I was struck by the number of papers which used qualitative rather than quantitative methods, as well as by the attention accorded these considerations. It seemed that everyone was talking about qualitative research. One of the sessions was taken up with proposals for evaluating qualitative research for use by journal editors.

Unlike experimental research which uses "subjects", qualitative methods of ethnography ask "informants" to take the role of teacher, informing the researcher about their (the informants') view of the world, themselves, and others. In grounded theory development, the researcher observes phenomena, classifies and categorizes them, looks for relationships, then goes back to observation to check on validity, all the while guarding against assumptions which might intrude on the data. Techniques have been developed which are systematic and may in fact provide a more relevant understanding of human behavior than quantitative investigation, especially for some issues and for some purposes. 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These techniques were very familiar to me. They are, in fact, isomorphic with good life style data gathering and interpretation. I concluded that the time is right for Adlerians to claim a more prominent place in the field of research, first by recognizing the similarity of what we do to what is becoming acceptable methodology in the field.

Region/Section Reports

Region I (Northwest) reported that their annual conference will be held in Seattle during the coming year; date and location still to be determined by the Seattle group. At their Toronto meeting, June 12, Region I members recommended that a Region Conference be held somewhere within the region each year, rotating responsibility among established centers of activity. Residuals will be shared with NASAP.

Region I members voted to publish a newsletter three times a year and to establish dues of \$3 to offset the cost of mailings and initial distribution of a newsletter. Publication of the newsletter will be added to the list of Regional Delegate responsibilities in the future, the group decided.

The Family Education Section voted to increase their dues to \$12. FE Section members also voted to again offer scholarships to two students who want to attend the NASAP 1994 Convention in San Diego. It was noted that no applications were received for the Toronto Convention scholarships and that a greater effort will be made to inform M.A. students.

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
Future NASAP Convention News

Constitutional Amendments Passed

The two constitutional amendments sent to members in May passed by a large margin. Out of the 319 votes returned, 266 voted yes to delete the sentence from Article VII Supension, Expulsion, Section 1, which provided for a termination notice to be sent to delinquent members after three reminders.

Regarding Sections, 291 members voted to delete the word "interest" from the term "interest section" when it appears in Articles IV, V and VIII.

MEMBERSHIP: At the end of July NASAP membership totaled 1,203, which was greater than any of the past 10 years. It was 8% higher than 10 years ago and 11% higher than 5 years ago. Using end of the year figures, membership has not exceeded 1,200 since 1982. Student membership has shown the most significant increase -- 90% higher than 10 years ago and 85% higher than 5 years ago.

In Memoriam - Edith Dewey

Edith Dewey died in a Toronto hospital in August. Edith was introduced to Adlerian psychology by Dr. Rudolf Dreikurs back in June of 1952 while living in Toronto. She invited Dr. Dreikurs to Toronto, arranging his schedule and supplying families for his public demonstrations. In 1958, Edith and Milton Dewey moved to Wilmington, Delaware, where they remained until 1965. During that time, they organized the original Adlerian association in Delaware, called "Associates for Study and Action." They led parent study groups and Edith wrote "handouts" she shared with other Adlerian organizations.

The Deweys moved back to Toronto in 1965 and Edith again invited Dr. Dreikurs to Toronto for public lectures, professional workshops and demonstrations. The Deweys helped to found the Toronto Association of Individual Psychology and Edith was actively involved in training parent study group leaders. She was coordinator for the first Family Education Centre in Ontario in 1971 and helped to organize the Alfred Adler Institute of Ontario that same year and served as its first Dean.

In 1973, Edith and Milton retired, cruising on their boat, Sanderling II, which then became their home in Fort Myers, Florida. Edith continued to teach Adlerian psychology, obtaining a part-time Florida Teacher's Certificate. She not only worked with elementary schools but also with senior citizens groups.

Edith joined NASAP in 1965 and served on the Delegate Assembly from 1977-1983. Under her leadership, a Convention/Workshop Guidelines Manual was developed to assist local host groups. In 1978, her book, Basic Applications of Adlerian Psychology was published. This was a revision of outlines of a course she developed when teaching in Toronto.

graduate students for student forum will be accepted; (d) up to 5 applications for general student scholarships will be accepted. Other applications will be referred to regions and sections. A flyer with scholarship criteria and procedures will be prepared.

- 14 scholarships for convention registration were awarded for the 1993 convention in Toronto.
- Audio tapes -- top ten for past two conventions will be made available at the next convention.
- The D.A. will meet an extra half-day at its November meeting in order to receive and discuss report of the Long Range Planning Committee.
- By-Laws changes approved: (a) to remove "interest" from the term "interest section" wherever it appears in the By-Laws; (b) a new Section 4 was added to Article III Elections to provide that an individual may stand for election in only one section or region.
- Two amendments to the constitution concerning the eligibility of officers to run for re-election were approved by the D.A. and will be sent to members for ratification.
