'94 Convention Features Special Entertainment

Attendees of NASAP '94 in San Diego, May 19-22, will be treated to some special entertainment at the Friday banquet (May 20) and the Saturday luncheon (May 21).

Friday night's Mexican fiesta banquet will feature the "Hispanic-Mexican Ballet", a group which performs authenic folklore dances. Following their performance, the "Mariachi del Pueblo" will provide festive music for listening and dancing.

Saturday's luncheon highlights a teen theatre troupe, called "Images," which performs skits that entertain and educate about today's teen issues. Each vignette seeks to bring awareness about such issues as sexuality, HIV/AIDS, substance abuse, incest, decision making and more. The group's performance serves as the inaugural project of the Social Equality Section to financially support a program or effort in the local area in gratitude for the host community's hospitality.

An appeal for contributions will be made to participants during the luncheon. This year's recipient is the "Youth Services Network, a coalition of countywide youth serving agencies and programs in the private nonprofit sector which offer numerous youth services including counseling, parenting, diversion and delinquency prevention, shelter, tutoring, employment and recreation.

President's Message:

LRPC Requests Member Input On Goals

In the last issue of the Newsletter, I outlined Goals 1 and 3 of the Long Range Plan (LRP) for NASAP. This issue I will outline Goals 2 and 4. Let me emphasize that the LRP is still a *Draft*. The purpose of presenting it to you in Draft form is to elicit feedback so that it can represent the best ideas of all NASAP members. The LRP will also be discussed at the NASAP General Assembly to be held Friday May 20 from 12:50 to 2:20 p.m. at the Convention in San Diego. We request that all feedback be sent to the central office by June 15, 1994 so it can be considered by the LRP Committee. They will then put together the final Draft for the Delegate Assembly (D.A.) meeting November 4 in Chicago. We will also be convening a "Business Panel" very shortly to recommend processes that we can use to ensure that the LRP does not become an interesting exercise which never reaches the implementation stage.

You may note that as you study Goal 2 below, there is considerable room for further input. This is because it was revised by the D.A. from the initial Draft of the LRPC and has not been throughly "worked through" at this point. Get those red pens out!

Goal 2: To develop procedures to 1) increase membership that includes diverse populations, and 2) to enhance members' sense of affiliation and Adlerian identity.

Strategy A: To increase members' involvement in the Society.

Tactics: 1) Provide a Committee of Greeters at each convention to welcome and assist attendees. 2) Identify convention First-Timers with special tags, and encourage other convention attendees to be inclusive of First-Timers. 3) Develop a New Member Letter that asks for information about new members' interests, talents, and what they want from membership in NASAP. 4) Involve General Members in Delegate Assembly committee work. 5) Provide leadership training courses at conventions for members interested in serving on the Delegate Assembly. 6) Disseminate throughout NASAP operations, presentations, and literature, an emphasis on the theme of members giving back to the Society.

Strategy B: To provide networking opportunities.

<u>Tactics</u>: 1) Use the existing forum of the NASAP Newsletter to announce and discuss member activities, concerns, and accomplishments. 2) Offer guidelines to local, regional, and continental groups for providing networking opportunities at meetings and in print. (For example, encourage cross-sectional gatherings at local, regional, and continental meetings for those with mutual interests and concerns beyond the professional focus of each section.) 3) Provide for Section hospitality suites at conventions. 4) Invite well-known Adlerians to be available at conventions at given times and places to greet and converse with attendees.

Strategy C: To provide for sharing of members' contributions, connections, and out-reach, and how Individual Psychology has influenced theirs and others' lives.

<u>Tactics:</u> 1) Charge each Section with identifying the accomplishments of (Continued on page three)

individuals within its membership for recognition at the Annual Meeting and in the NASAP Newsletter. 2) Provide opportunities for individuals with outstanding accomplishments to teach and inspire others to make use of their experiences (e.g., someone who has established a day-care center, sharing experience with someone wanting to establish a day-care center). 3) Publish members' significant life events in the NASAP Newsletter (geographic moves, promotions, births, local or other recognitions, accomplishments).

Strategy D: To provide opportunities for members to learn, teach, and have fun together.

<u>Tactics</u>: 1) Organize and offer tours with an educational feature. 2) Promote the organization of recreational activities among members on the local and regional levels (group attendance at cultural events, sports events).

Strategy E: To provide opportunities for members to participate in racially and culturally diverse activities.

Goal 4: To establish a process that fosters implementation of Individual Psychology in a growing number of local communities.

Strategy A: Establish twelve or more additional state, provincial, or regional conferences to increase the dissemination of Individual Psychology.

1) Promote the growth of state, provincial, and regional conferences by vesting this responsibility primarily in the Delegate Assembly's Committee on Development/Public Relations/Membership, and by making this 3) Establish a Conference goal the Committee's highest priority. on Development/Public Committee a) The Development Fund. shall develop and implement a plan for soliciting Relations/Membership contributions and other sources of financial support for the development of b) NASAP, at the recommendation of the Development/Public Relations/Membership Committee, shall make loans to local and regional groups to help fund their first annual conferences. Such loans are to be forgiven if these conferences fail to make sufficient profit to repay the loan. c) After seed money is repaid, the Committee will evaluate and recommend to the Delegate Assembly whether or not the local conference organizing group will be asked to commit to an annual contribution to NASAP of \$500 or ten percent (10%) of the profit, whichever is less. 3) The Development/Public Relations/Membership Committee will communicate with organizers of each established conference at least annually to elicit their cooperation and financial support in stimulating the development of new conferences within or adjacent to the area served by the established conference. 4) In cooperation with groups sponsoring established conferences, and in cooperation with the Assembly's Committee on Convention and Workshops, Development/Public Relations/Membership Committee shall develop a list of presenters of continental caliber, willing to make presentations at fledgling conferences, either at their own expense or with token compensation, during the first two years of such conferences. (Sponsoring organizations will also be encouraged to make use of local talent for conference presentations.)

Strategy B: Facilitate the establishment of new local organizations, and strengthen those in existence.

Tactics: 1) The Development/Public Relations/Membership Committee and the Constitution Committee will collaborate to develop a manual outlining procedures and guidelines to be followed when establishing a local organization. 2) Regional Delegates will have the responsibility for developing and publishing lists of local Adlerian organizations in their regions which agree to serve as mentors to new organizations. 3) The Newsletter will develop a regular column to highlight new organizations, to promote the benefits of establishing local groups, and to provide information and guidance.

Strategy C: Identify and encourage opportunities for collaboration among local resource people, institutions, and agencies.

Tactics: 1) The Convention Committee and the Development/Public Relations/Membership Committee will develop a one-page handout for local organizations and Regional Delegates, to include a list of ideas for collaboration (e.g., co-sponsorship of conferences) and the names of organizations they might approach (e.g., local affiliates of ACA, AAMFT, APA, etc.). 2) Add a checklist of professional organizations to the membership directory information sheet, and request that members identify those to which they belong. Add this information to members'profiles. Regional Delegates and local Adlerian organizations can then enlist the support of NASAP members who are members of other organizations in targeting other organizations for collaborative efforts. 3) Use the "New Organizations" Newsletter column (Strategy B, Tactic, 3) as a forum for information on collaborative efforts that work. 4) Develop and organize, at the continental level, a method for targeting local media. Disseminate this strategy to local groups to assist them in gaining media access to increase public relations and marketing effectiveness.
